Remembering HRH Prince Philip, The Duke of Edinburgh



Happy Easter, Christ is Risen!

Eight of our churches rang to that great cry of acclamation on Easter Sunday, and rarely has it had so much meaning in everyday life as it has in our collective spiritual life and beliefs. Because of Covid-19, yet again all our churches had been closed until just before Easter and to re-open and welcome people into church on a lovely sunny, if perishingly cold, morning was wonderful. I felt my heart lift with joy that morning and by the end of the service I felt positively euphoric. We were back together again, worshipping God in person, collectively, albeit with the joy of Zoom and livestream to enhance it. We were celebrating together the resurrection of Jesus, he who through deep love, total selflessness and unquestioning obedience overcame the barrier of death and the loss and grief that goes with it. He died to bring us the hope, the promise of life in Christ, everlasting.

The hope of the resurrection was echoed for me in the whispers of hope that lockdown would ease safely, that we could start to live a more normal, if still restricted, life and could take time to be with those we treasure, admittedly outside. Whispers they were, rather than shouts or certainties, but the tentative evidence of change was enough. How much greater and stronger is the message of resurrection. This is what our Bishop, Bishop Martin said in his Easter sessage.

By Jesus' act of utter selfless love, Easter breaks down the barriers that prevent us being the people God made us to be – barriers like self-centredness, fear, hatred, mistrust, which flow from thinking we hold our destiny in our own hands – and therefore that death is the end.

We are not made to live divided and separated, each going our own way to our own fate. And we have seen during the pandemic, as people have been drawn together, a realisation, even if fleeting, that we are really all part of the same human family, and I would say, all God's children.

One of the most striking experiences throughout these times has been not just our sense of being together, but how people have reached out with selflessness and compassion for others. In our health workers and countless others we have seen selflessness and compassion rise above the anguish and suffering. Churches and community groups have organised meals and food banks, phone support networks, pastoral support and an array of other activities to care for those in need. And we have become determined to overcome other divisions exposed during this time, divisions especially about race and poverty.

Barriers between people are being broken down, and that is the vision and hope of Easter.

And not just barriers between people, but between us and God. We all carry on being human with all our limitations and shortcomings, our sinfulness, and for many of us it is only with God that we know that we are accepted, forgiven, and cherished in spite of ourselves.

A little while before he was killed, Jesus said his death was to draw all people into union with him, to restore and renew the unity and community for which God made human beings. Jesus' death and resurrection for me means the barriers that divide us from each other and from God are gone. That is the world we are called to live in, and God gives us all we need to do just that.

I decided to share that message with you all. It is in the hardest and darkest of times that we humans show the best of ourselves. We have, in so many ways, been Easter people over the long hard months since the pandemic began. Here in our beautiful Blyth Valley from Cookley to Thorington, Bramfield to Spexhall and all points in between we have shown love and compassion, generosity and care - we have laughed, as well as cried, together and across the many ways of communicating electronically. We have experienced deep sadness and pain, loneliness and anxiety and yet we have still managed to have hope for each other. Countless times in the last year when one person has been down, I have seen others "pick them up". People have shown ingenuity and creativity in finding new ways to be kind and to solve problems, and we have prayed, daily, regularly alone and together for each other.

And so, as we face towards Pentecost — which God willing will be collective outdoor worship as Churches Together, may we reflect on the many ways in which God has been present to us in these times, the coming together we have experienced, the changes we have generated — and may even want to keep and the hope that we have demonstrated. Each of us will have our own way of dealing with the current times, wearying though it is but Christ is with us and at Pentecost we will renew our energies, recollect the way the Holy Spirit came to the people, and the Christian church began, commit ourselves afresh to our lives of care, love, service and obedience to God, and to all of humanity in all its many glorious kinds.





Dear Friends,

A second Easter in lockdown inevitably resulted in the celebrations being more muted that usual. Nevertheless, we have celebrated! While all the 'normal' certainties in life, that we as a culture and nation cling to have been so shaken, the importance of the resurrection of Jesus Christ seems even bigger!

So, it was good to take part, jointly with other churches, in a small outdoor Good Friday Witness (also streamed) and our own Easter celebrations on Zoom. The joy of the resurrection, and the resultant assurance of our place with Christ for ever is, of course, an all year round 'thing'. And we are still in the *season of Easter*. As Christians, we are 'Easter People' and our call to celebrate goes on. Our call to be witnesses to Jesus Christ and bearers of Good News to others also goes on...

In recent prayer meetings we have been increasingly aware that the 'shaking' of assumptions everyone thought were reliable (from the pandemic) must result in at least some folk who have largely ignored God, faith, spiritual as well as material life, think again. 

The Pear Tree Centre re-opens

A vital resource centre which brings information and support closer to home for people with life-limiting illnesses and their families re-opened on Monday 12th April.

The Pear Tree Centre in Halesworth is now open on an appointment-only basis from 10am to 4pm, to anyone from north east Suffolk or south Norfolk after temporarily shutting its doors due to the Coronavirus pandemic.

The support available will include advice on finance and benefits, as well as help understanding a diagnosis, coping with bereavement, family services and complementary therapies. Counselling can also be arranged for people who have lost close friends and family as a result of Covid-19.

To book an appointment or get advice over the phone, call 01986 899655 or email peartreefund@peartreecentre.co.uk The charity is also continuing to work closely with Big C and would urge anyone who has been diagnosed with cancer and needs emotional or practical support to call 0800 0927640 or visit www.support.big-c.co.uk

Seva Newrick, Pear Tree Centre manager, said: "We are absolutely delighted that we are now in a position to safely reopen the centre and look forward to welcoming visitors again.

"We have continued to provide help and advice over the phone during the lockdown, but still feel that face-to-face contact is incredibly important. Re-opening the centre allows us to offer that personal touch once more, while anyone who feels more comfortable accessing our support remotely will still be able to contact us by phone.

"Anyone who does come to the Centre will be asked to sanitise their hands and wear a face covering or mask. Our staff will be following all of the latest government guidance to keep everyone safe, including wearing PPE where necessary, maintaining social distancing and regularly washing their hands. We have also introduced enhanced cleaning at the centre so that anyone who needs our support can be reassured that it is safe to visit us.

"As a result of the Coronavirus outbreak, we unfortunately had to cancel all of our planned fundraising events during the last year, which means the charity has suffered a considerable loss of income. We are appealing for the publics' support to help us through this difficult time by donating to us or supporting us in other ways so that we can continue to deliver vital services for the benefit of our community."

Dee's Den, the Pear Tree Fund's charity shop in Steeple End, Halesworth, also reopened on 12th April, and is open daily between 10am and 1pm.

His Royal Highness the Duke of Edinburgh

I am writing this immediately after the funeral of His Royal Highness, which, like much of the nation, I watched. A solemn but hugely personal service, designed over the years by the Duke, I was struck by how solitary and alone Her Majesty was — like so very, very many bereaved partners over this last year. Prince Philip was after all, first and foremost her deeply loved husband and companion over a lifetime (longer than mine!) and the only person who really truly knew her and could be himself with her. Deep grief and loss however, is common to all and, in a way, his funeral, like his life, was part of his loyal service to the nation. Unlike a huge and complex state funeral it was a simple family funeral, with 30 people and no communal singing. We could all empathise, relate to the family and share in the sense of loss

We honoured the Duke with a short service of prayer on Friday 9th April on Zoom, and a solemn Service of Commemoration on Friday 16th April. We were honoured to have Councillor Alison Cackett on behalf of East Suffolk District Council and Councillor Dave Wollweber on behalf of Halesworth Town Council, as well as Councillors Annette Dunning, Anne Fleming and Rosemary Lewis. Representatives of the business and voluntary sector and local schools also attended and the Service was led by Father Ireson and the

Revd Jon Sermon as well as the Revd Jane Held. Jason Busby, on the organ, played *Crown Imperial* by William Walton; *And Did Those Feet (Jerusalem); O God our Help in Ages Past;* and *Nimrod* from Elgar's *Enigma Variations*. Geoffrey Kiddy, Chair of the BVTM Team Council read Psalm 23; Alison Cackett read from Lamentations (3.22-26 31-33); Revd Jon Sermon read from Revelation 21 1-7; and Father Ireson led the prayers. The Revd Linda Berry read John Masefield's poem *Sea Fever*, in honour of the Duke's Naval Career.

Councillor Wollweber gave the address and shared his own recollection of the Duke's extraordinary commitment to the village of Aberfan and the disaster there, as well as recognising the Duke's life-long service to his Queen and country.

Whatever our own personal views (and as with any situation there will be a wide range), we can all agreed that the Duke gave above and beyond what would be expected of a husband in the service of his wife as the Head of State. A person of decided views, pithy remarks (sometimes ill-placed), many passions and interests, father, grandfather and great-grandfather, he was also a committed Christian of deep faith and a deep theological understanding. May he now rest in peace.

The Community Larder

The Community Larder continues to grow. In March, 306 people used it and it is busy every time it opens. It is still opening in St Mary's Church Hall on Mondays, Wednesdays and Saturdays in the morning, from 10.30am - 11.30am. Our wonderful band of volunteers (we have 16 registered with us, both churchgoers and non-churchgoers) is led by an experienced team who have been with us since early days. The Larder provides a bag of fresh food and extras to go out with the Foodbank boxes on a Wednesday morning. The Hall is now alarmed (thank you to Waveney Security) and we have received drawings for a major refit of the kitchen (and already received a very generous donation and a grant towards the cost).

We will no longer receive a monthly Fare Share delivery as the free Covid Scheme has ended, but we continue to have very generous help from Morrisons, the Co-op, Laxfield Co-op, Peasenhall General Stores, Melons Fruit & Vegetables and Allen's butchers. Regular individual donors are also just stunningly generous and we have lots of one-off deliveries from various organisations locally including FreshPac and Herrco.

Drop off points at Chediston telephone box, Rosedale's and Woolnough's are also very well used and donors seem to be

equally generously supporting the Foodbank and the Larder. The shed is also alarmed and has been cleared out by Ron and Jean Goodson's daughter Sharon and family, so we have extra storage space – many thanks for their hard work.

Whilst they lasted, we issued vouchers for meat, fruit and vegetables to those in extreme need on behalf of the Town Council. We have just received a very substantial grant of vouchers to be used to shop at Morrisons or the Co-op, again for those in extreme need who meet certain criteria.


We have big plans. Once the kitchen is finished, we hope to run cookery classes and community lunches. We have just had a hen coop donated, so we hope soon to be keeping hens with some of the Larder's key users helping us. Now we are hoping for donations of fencing materials (any shed owners and farmers out there?) as well as help to put it all up.

Soon pots of potatoes and carrots will be planted up too, each pot being looked after by an individual Larder user.

Eric Chenery

Eric Chenery came to Bramfield from Laxfield in 1948 with his parents and six other siblings. The family moved into Castle Farm, Eric went to Bramfield school for a few months and then on to Halesworth. He left school at 15 and worked with his father for Clydie Johnson, helping with milking cows in the morning and on the land in the afternoons with the Suffolk Punch horses.

Food was short after the war, Mr Johnson allowed the family a small field to grow potatoes, and the boys caught rabbits for the stewpot, Eric remembered the bread delivery – 40 loaves a week – 20 on Saturday and 20 on Tuesday!

When Eric married, he and his wife Shirley stayed in Bramfield for a while and then moved to Frostenden where Eric was head cowman for John Holmes, working there for almost 40 years until the herd was sold. From there he went to Sotherton, working for the Walker brothers with their milking herd.

In the 1980s, Eric had a bungalow built back in Bramfield, which he rented out for a while, before he and Shirley moved back to the village. Several years later, Shirley did not enjoy good health and Eric eventually finished work to care for her. He was well-known for helping people with their shopping. Gardening etc, any odd jobs that needed doing — call on Eric.

He passed away very suddenly from an aneurism and is sadly missed by family and friends.

Donations were received for the East Anglian Air Ambulance £140, and Suffolk Horse Society £225.



Friends of St Mary's St Mary The Virgin Church, Halesworth A little bit of history

"Music is the only language in which you cannot say a mean or sarcastic thing." So said John Erskine (1879-1951), an American educator and author, pianist and composer. What a thought-provoking statement – and, is it true? Either way, the church organ, ideally suited to accompany human voices, is backdrop to and encompasses services of worship in many churches, not least St Mary's.

The organ is an old instrument dating from the time of Ctesibius (285-222 BC), a Greek inventor and mathematician, who invented the water organ played during races and games throughout the ancient Greek and Roman world. Traditionally attributed to Pope Vitalian (657-672), the first introduction of organ music into the mass occurred in the C7, although it was the early mediaeval period before it spread from the Byzantine Empire to Western Europe where it gradually assumed a place in the liturgy of the Catholic Church. In music, the organ is a keyboard instrument of one or more pipe divisions or other means for producing tones, each played with its own keyboard, played either with the hands on a keyboard or with the feet using pedals. The pipes made from wood or metal, produce sound when air under pressure is directed through them; as one pipe produces a single pitch, multiple pipes are necessary to accommodate the musical scale.

Roy Tricker in his booklet, A Century of Change in a Suffolk Church: Re-Ordering at St Mary's Church, Halesworth, in the 19th Century*, draws from notes made by David Elisha Davy (1769-1851), a Suffolk antiquary and collector, who first visited St Mary's on 15 May 1806 and again in 1830 making careful notes about what he saw. Davy described the "handsome organ" in the gallery at the west end of the nave and Tricker writes:

"... a rarity and a luxury in a parish church — in fact at that time it was probably one of less than 20 in our Suffolk churches. *The Norwich Mercury* had announced that on 17th June 1785, the organ "lately erected" in the church would be opened with a concert consisting of an organ concerto and one on the Hautbois, under the direction of a Mr Beckwith. It

seems that this instrument must have had a short life because the Norfolk Chronicle reported that on 30th June 1803, the organ at Halesworth was again "opened" by Master John Parnell, organist of St George Colegate, Norwich. *The Ipswich Journal* for 6th June 1803 contained an advertisement for this function, the programme for which was to include items from *Messiah* and *Samson*. It is thought that the 1803 instrument was built by William Gray of London."

In July 1889, following a resolution by a Church Council, a rarity in those days and appointed by the new Rector, Reverend Abbot Roland Upcher, the church was closed again for further restoration at a total cost (including a new organ) of some £1900.

Again Tricker writes:

"The old organ was dismantled and the western gallery was taken down ... A new organ, by Hill, Norman & Beard, was placed (at a cost of £500) in the north chapel and the area behind it made into a choir vestry, separated from the north aisle by a carved wooden screen. The instrument then comprised eight speaking stops on the Great Organ, nine on the Swell and two on the Pedal Organ. Provision was made for the addition of a Choir Organ, when funds allowed. The grand Re-Opening took place on 16th January 1890, at 3pm, in the presence of the Bishop of Norwich. Professor H. R. Rose of the Royal Academy of Music presided at the new organ and demonstrated its versatility at the end of the service with J. S. Bach's Toccata in F major. A further service took place in the evening, at which Archdeacon Woolley preached and the congregation were treated to an organ recital at its conclusion.

In 1983/4 the instrument received its choir organ, adding a third manual, six more speaking stops and increasing its versatility, through the generosity of Mrs Helen Warwick and dedicated to her parents Robert and Hannah Burleigh. The Burleighs had taken over the brewing and malting business of Patrick Stead in the mid-C19. In 1986 a renovation of the organ was carried out by W & A Boggis of Diss, a firm of organ builders and restorers still in business since 1932.

Whilst Johann Sebastian Bach said:

"There is nothing to playing the organ. You only have to hit the right notes at the right time and the instrument plays itself."

and Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart said:

"To my eyes and ears the organ will ever be the King of Instruments."

George W St evens starts his poem, The Organist:

"I wonder how the organist, Can do so many things;

He's getting ready long before The choir stands up and sings; He's pressing buttons, pushing stops, He's pulling here and there,

And testing all the working parts While listening to the prayer."



"You had just one job..."



If you spend any time on social media you've probably been amused at one time or another by posts headed "People who had just one job..." which picture spectacular "fails" such as the road sign painter who painted SOTP at the junction.

Jonah had just one job: to go to Nineveh and proclaim its destruction in 40 days, so he did exactly the opposite, and we all know what happened next! Or do we? Have we missed the point too?

Timothy Keller has preached a series of sermons through the whole book of Jonah three times over a period of 20 years, in different locations, under different circumstances, to very different audiences, yet, he says, the text of Jonah was more than up to the task of powerfully addressing them all, and for some of them in a life changing way. More recently he has combined the insights from all three series into this book: *The Prodigal Prophet: Jonah and the mystery of God's Mercy*

The Assyrians are not the only sinners in this story, Jonah is a Pharisaical believer, keener on his own nation's specialness than on the God who made it so, sure that his mission was pointless and that he knew better, a way we often lead our lives too.

The book of Jonah is short but packed full of incident and powerful lessons, many of which I had never noticed until I read this very interesting, and, yes, enjoyable book.
