

# From the Rector...

Welcome to this edition of the Blyth Valley Churches magazine. I am glad you got as far as picking it up, opening it, and beginning to read this section.

Welcome if you are visiting for family research or on holiday, or both. Welcome if you are looking for space to process hurt, cancer treatment or a new business offer. Welcome if you are here for a wedding or just whilst a friend or relative does something else.

Welcome is one of those things that the Christian church, and the Jewish temple before it, were called to offer. The blessing Jews had, and have, through God's relationship with them was not just for them, but so that they could bless others. In like manner, the blessing the church has through God's relationship with us is not just for us, but so that we may bless others.

This is not easy though. I am sure we have all experienced being at a reception desk at an airport or hospital, where the clerk is so busy welcoming us by sorting our paperwork, that they forget to welcome us with a hearty hello or even eye contact!

Then there is the experience of realising we are not quite the right people for the event or occasion. I once turned up in my collar for a jar or two with some funeral directors with whom I worked. The bar staff were obviously nervous. They had Bishop's Finger and Rev James etc on the pumps. Somewhat sheepishly they welcomed me with the advice that I was late for the recently departed vicars and tarts stag party!

And, talking of weddings – if you're here for one, there is that mother-in-law thing where the welcome can be really tricky. Married, or not, both sides, to a greater or lesser degree, usually want the time spent together to go well. Yes, we want our child to be happy and succeed, but not too much without us. We may wish their parent shared our politics, or that they understood they way we discipline their grandchildren.

What is going wrong here? An answer may be that welcome needs love to make it work. Without love I'm a noisy gong or clanging cymbal (1 Corinthians 13). Complete love casts out all fear (1 John 4). If we feel in any way vulnerable it can be hard to accommodate the needs of others. If we know God has love enough for everyone, we will not lose out if we welcome the prodigal sibling, the refugee, the late co-worker, or the woman with endometriosis. If we know our employer is more concerned about overall patient experience than correct and timely data entry, we may offer a coffee and a biscuit before bringing up their file on screen. Once we

understand that our contribution to the visitor's memory of the event will be more appreciated if they find themselves in the right place at the right time, we can step out of our comfort zone and guide them appropriately.

Perhaps the most challenging, especially for church people is the in-law problem; the parent or coach paradox. We want the person in relationship, the child, the student to thrive, but can we cope with them doing things differently to us, being better than us, achieving that without us. As we welcome visitors or new worshippers, we needs must recognise that they may have happy children, leave the door open, sit in our pew, have odd accents, and the like. As we are welcoming, that is all right. They may be unhappy about the state of the church yard or the advertised service that didn't happen. As we are welcoming let us be affirming in our explanations and inviting in our encouraging them to help. They may have contacts and friends, they may have hymn preferences, they may have hopes for events, the like of which St Botolph's has never heard before. As we are welcoming may we have the confidence to step back and rejoice in their enthusiasm for our special place. Then may God bless it to be a blessing to our current and future village communities. Even if it is not how I would do it, I am content that I know I have played my part. You're welcome!

All are truly welcome to any event or service we offer as advertised in this magazine. Do let me know how the welcome went!

We have a lot of events coming up over the summer,

We hired a toilet for St Mary's to ensure that events and services are open to as many people as possible. It is wheelchair accessible and has a babychanging station. In future we are aiming to have permanent facilities inside the church, but this will have to do for the time being.

I have to say that the Lady Maisery gig in St Mary's Halesworth exceeded even my expectations and I was the one who was nagging everyone to come! It was a wonderful

evening and such a blessing to have so many people in the church being treated to beautiful music from gifted musicians.

Over the summer, in addition to our regular monthly Community lunch on the last Wednesday, we will be providing picnic lunches for families during the school holidays every Wednesday from 12.30pm - 2pm. # NEW LIVE STREAM SYSTEM AT ST MARY'S HALESWORTH

We all adapted to life 'online' during the Covid pandemic. Worshipping via Zoom and Facebook became the norm and worked well (although the 'mute' button will forever haunt me). Post Covid, we continued to use laptops and mobile phones which from a clergy stance was intrusive with all this equipment in their faces.

We approached a company called Audio Electric Design who had developed a very simple to operate permanent solution for churches, using off the shelf products and a custom built interface, to allow those with either very little technical knowledge or the need to operate without a trained operator, a solution with engaging live video stream. Following fundraising efforts, your generosity raised over £2300 towards the system and we used part of a legacy left to St Mary's to 'further ministry'. The system was installed in June and we went LIVE for the first time on Sunday 18th June.

The system uses two cameras located either side of the font, with eight pre-programmed fixed positions we use a little controller to change the camera position. We have also been uploading slides of hymn words and the words to the Creed for example and other sections of various services. The system is very impressive, from the picture quality to the sound. Oh and we even have a fixed camera in the organ loft! THANK YOU to everyone who gave a financial gift to the project. We have been promoting the LIVE stream service all over social media and will continue to do so. We can live stream ALL services, events, concerts. One advantage of using YouTube - videos will be available for ever! You can already revisit past services already streamed and even watch a Baptism. Don't forget to go to the address at the top and 'subscribe' to our YouTube page. Look out for the weekly links to services. # The Secret Lives of Swifts

Over 100 people attended the first formal event put on by Halesworth Swifts on June 23rd in St Mary's church, Halesworth. They came to hear the illustrated talk by conservationist Simon Hooton, who has been involved with the Save Our Suffolk Swifts project for many years.




They were welcomed to the church with refreshments donated by the Co-op and cupcakes baked by Rhubarb and Rose, and were able to browse a table with nest boxes, decorative house tiles and books about swifts.

The talk was a resounding success, thanks to Simon Hooton's great knowledge and enthusiasm for swifts. He began by identifying swifts within the group of swallows, house martins and sand martins, just to be clear exactly which bird we were talking about. And then on he went, giving masses of fascinating information about swifts. Probably everyone learned something new about these "truly global" birds that never stop flying across continents except to nest and raise their young.

Things like how they sleep on the wing, shutting down one half of their brain at a time while the other side controls the flying, and then switching sides. How they make ethereal nests with feathers they catch floating in the skies. How they can leave their eggs and even their chicks untended and dormant for a week or so if the weather turns bad and they

beckycanham@mail.com www.beckycanham.com have to fly far to find insect food. Far could mean to France from Suffolk.

And, sadly, but we need to know... how swifts are on the endangered red list due to loss of traditional nesting sites under roof tiles. The other main problem swifts face is the dramatically steep decline in insect numbers. The talk suggested key ways in which we can help, by providing nest boxes or nesting bricks in new builds, by cultivating more wild in our gardens to support insects. And, of course, by just loving swifts and talking to everyone about them so that more and more people will notice them, care about them and support them as best they can.

In a Q & A session at the end, people were reassured that there is no need to clean out swift nest boxes, the mess is so minimal and returning birds will do the housework. But it IS necessary to play swift calls to attract them to a new site, so a little sound system should be factored in with a new nest box. And nest boxes DO need a decent height for swifts to drop out of without being grounded, bungalows sadly don't make the altitude.

Donations, a raffle and some sales of swift items raised over £250 for the Halesworth Swifts group, which will enable them to subsidise the purchase and installation of more nest boxes.

Heartfelt thanks from the Halesworth Swifts group to everyone who came along and for their generous donations. Also massive thanks to the Blyth Valley Team Ministry for providing a perfect venue for this event. It is a very good thing to see the church offering its space and facilities to lay events such as this, and to feel the welcome and support from the clergy for a subject also close to their hearts, the intention to better steward and care for the precious natural world around us.



# **HERITAGE OPEN DAY** 16th September 2023



This year's theme for the Heritage Open Days is "Creativity Unwrapped" and the Friends of St Mary's Church (FOSM) will be putting on a wide-ranging display of creative talents together with several live performances and demonstrations. Please come along to the church to sample these between 10am and 5pm on Saturday 16th September.

Please note there is only this one Heritage Open Day this year. Tea and coffee will be available.

Static displays will show photography and art from Bungay High School; art from members of Artbox at Chediston and Mencap; linocuts and handmade books inspired by nature from Lark Images (Chris and Valerie Wheeler); photos from Halesworth and Beccles Camera Clubs, with some prints made into cards to buy; colourful royal heraldry from 1066 to 2023, to celebrate the recent Coronation; and a rolling slide show of local artist, writer and eminent philatelist Gerald King's "Alice Through the Pillarbox" stamp designs.

The tower bell ringers will be demonstrating and teaching throughout the day.

There will be church tours at 10.30am (the church in the 15th century) and 11.30am (the stained glass); the Repair Café will be doing (domestic) electrical and sewing machine repairs and sharpening scissors and knives between 10am and noon, so please bring along whatever you have that needs attention.

The St Mary's handbell ringers will be giving a performance and workshop from 1pm to 2pm; at 2pm Gerald King will talk and answer questions about his Alice book (see above); and at 3pm Alan Greening, an architect who recently made an inspection of the church, will give a brief talk on the effect of rainwater on the walls which has to be dealt with before regeneration can be taken further.

Do come along on September 16th and admire and/or try the varied creative talents of so many local people.

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# Regeneration of St Mary's Church, Halesworth Exhibition of Proposals Saturday 9th Sept – Sunday 1st Oct 2023



## Doors into Heaven: the role of icons in worship

Around 25 MU members and a number of friends met in St Peter's Church, Holton to experience a Quiet Day led by Revd Margaret King all about icons. In her first session, Margaret gave us the background to icons in worship in the Russian Orthodox Church. Margaret had displayed a number of icons which she had painted or 'written' herself in recent years, along with photos, pictures and postcards of icons.

In session two Margaret talked about the materials used for painting or writing icons; the egg-tempera, made from egg yolks; the different colours of paint which are earth colours; and the special wooden panels which her tutor gets from Serbia. You have to work from dark to light, expressing God bringing light into the world. Several layers of gold are used to allow the divinity of God to shine out. Blue is used to express Divinity and green for humanity and earthly things. Much in an icon is symbolic.

After lunch Margaret gave everyone a copy of the 15th century icon - Rublev's 'The Hospitality of Abraham' from Genesis 18, an early Old Testament Trinity. She talked about the various symbols and their significance.

After the third time for reflection, the culmination of the day the celebration of a shortened Eucharist, which included elements of the Orthodox liturgy alongside Common Worship.

It was indeed an awe-inspiring and informative day with time to be still and quiet, as well as time for learning and reflection. Margaret did indeed reveal 'Doors into Heaven: the Role of Icons in Worship'. Thank you so much Margaret for a wonderful Quiet Day.

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# Bramfield, Brampton and Ringsfield Primary Schools recognised for excellence in science

Bramfield, Brampton and Ringsfield primary schools have been awarded the prestigious Primary Science Quality Mark Gilt accreditation by the University of Hertfordshire in collaboration with the Primary Science Teaching Trust.

Primary Science Quality Mark (PSQM) is the only national award scheme to develop and celebrate the quality of science teaching and learning in primary schools. Schools achieve a PSQM through a year- long process of initial audit, followed by action and evidenced-based reflection.

Vicky Allen, Executive headteacher of Bramfield, Brampton and Ringsfield Primary Schools, said "We are delighted to have been awarded the PSQM GILT accreditation, the highest award each school could have achieved. As three small schools, this is a fantastic achievement and has only been possible as a result of cooperation and collaboration with the whole school community. It reflects the time and effort given by our staff engaging with our children, not only making science a really strong subject but, most importantly, making science an enjoyable and fun learning experience."

Samuel Batey, pupil at Bramfield primary school says "The STEM [Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths] after school club is my favourite. This term we are learning about light. Today we used special photo paper with leaves and flowers to create sun prints and next week we are making a pin-hole camera that will show us how our eyes see things, which will be amazing!"

Associate Professor Jane Turner, PSQM National Director said: "There was never a more important time for primary children to have a high-quality science education. The coronavirus pandemic and climate change crisis have made

everyone aware of the importance of science in our world. Primary schools have an important role to ensure that children understand how science works and keeps us and our planet healthy and safe. Schools that have achieved a Primary Science Quality Mark have demonstrated a significant commitment to science teaching and learning. The profile and quality of science in each awarded school is very high. Children are engaging with great science both in and outside the classroom, developing positive attitudes towards science as well as secure scientific understanding and skills. Science subject leaders, their colleagues, head teachers, children, parents and governors should be very proud."

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## DIRECT BUS SERVICE FROM HALESWORTH TO NORWICH

Halesworth now has a direct bus service to Norwich again, plus an enhanced service to Southwold. First Bus service X41 between Norwich and Bungay has been extended to Halesworth. It now runs every hour from 06.23 till 18.38, six days a week and take just over an hour for the journey. On Saturdays the first bus from Halesworth is at 07.23. Departures from Norwich (St Stephens Street) start at 0815 till 1825.

First Bus service 99A now operates from Durban Close Halesworth eight times a day starting at 08.06 for the 39-minute journey to Southwold with the last return bus departing from Southwold at 17.05. During school term times there are six buses a day, Monday - Friday with eight on Saturdays.

There are, at present, no plans by First Bus for paper timetables, but there are local discussions about the production of a simple timetable leaflet. Halesworth Library can provide copies of the X41/99A timetable. Both the Library and the Angel Hotel Visitor information Points can

She spoke for nearly an hour without notes on "Waveney Dexter Beef" traditionally reared quality beef from the heart of the Waveney Valley. Helen illustrated her talk with wonderful slides, she virtually grew up with the family herd of pedigree Dexter cattle (they come in three colours although Waveney Dexters are predominantly black or red).

An adult cow only measures between 92cm and 107cm at the shoulder (rather similar to measuring a horse). These small cattle have their own personalities and can be quite high spirited but what they are brilliant at doing is producing excellent beef. Helen's progress with her career began at Easton, then as a long term member and past Chair of Norfolk Young Farmers. In 2018 she won a scholarship to visit the USA, one of only five such awards in the country. She also received an award when she visited Buckingham Palace.

Helen brought some cuts of beef which quickly sold out. I have details for purchasing her beef at Alburgh, Harleston if anyone is interested.

ONE OF THE VAGARIES OF history that Linstead church is only in the parish of Linstead as a result of a bit of medieval gerrymandering. It is on an parochial peninsula, more or less surrounded by Chediston. Since our other church, St Peter's Linstead Magna (which was in the geographical centre of the two Linsteads, fell down about 100 years ago) we have learned to be philosophical about this slight anomaly.

IT IS WITH SADNESS THAT I REPORT the death of John Ingate who lived and farmed at Chapel Farm, Chediston. Because of the anomaly mentioned in paragraph one, his family are interred in Linstead and thus it was that John was buried there as well. It is one of the ironies of life that you never really know someone until you have attended their funeral service and heard the story of their life from their friends and relatives. John was our next-door neighbour of 45 years. He was an interesting person; he had visited farms abroad; he had an encyclopædic knowledge of local wartime airfields and local history generally; but most of all, he was a conservationist par excellence. It is not surprising that there was standing-room only in the church at John's funeral because he was very well liked and respected by the farming community. His sister summed it up beautifully when she said: "You may think that John was not married, but he was. He was married to his farm and to the land". He will be missed.

But now I am retired I can indulge in "holiday reading" any time of year and one of my favourite genres is the clerical "who (or why) dunnit" happily combined with a historical setting for preference, Brother Cadfael for example.

According to Philip Grosset, who's created an invaluable compendium on clerical detectives on the website detecs.org, (*not* a literary site but a resource for private detectives and lawyers in the USA!) there are nearly four hundred clergy-detectives in English literature, and several of these have made it as TV series too.

Another interesting website is https://www.mysteryandsuspense. com/amateur-detectives-in-the-clergy/ where can be found a brief analysis of the enduring appeal of the cleric as amateur sleuth, largely of the more florid American variety, it does cite G K Chesterton's Father Brown stories and James Runcie's Grantchester series. The author, R T Lund, points out "most of them (fictional detectives) operate under a strict moral code of right versus wrong and good versus evil when it comes to dealing with crime and criminals, a moral code that most clerics would appreciate...The best clerical detectives have varying body types, religious affiliations, and temperaments, but most have this in common: unlike classical detectives like Sherlock Holmes and Hercule Poirot, who pride themselves on the use of deductive reasoning, the clerics solve crimes using intuition and their understanding of the evil side of human nature." Perhaps the *religieux* as amateur detective is more like ourselves and we become more invested in the narrative. I have recently discovered a new series by V M Knox, where the clergyman is enlisted as a wartime spy, and therefore a type of saviour of his nation, chosen probably because of his strong moral compass: is the clue in the name the author chose for him - Revd

In September 1940 Britain stood alone facing an imminent Nazi invasion. Clement Wisdom, a country vicar, has been co-opted as leader of the East Sussex Auxiliaries, one of the covert Auxiliary Units set up by the government to resist the expected invasion. Burdened with the tension between his faith and his patriotic duty, he sets out to eliminate the Police Inspector, in theory the only other person who knows of the unit's existence, only to find him dead already. While assisting Lewes Police to find the Inspector's killer, events take an ominous turn as one by one, members of Clement's team are found callously murdered. Priorities shift and every aspect of life is called into question when Clement becomes embroiled in the murky world of espionage, where nothing is what it seems.

**1941.** Clement's wife has been killed in an air raid, so under the cover of taking up a new parish in far northern Scotland, Clement is sent to the remote village of Huna, in Caithness, to locate a possible enemy agent who is sending out encrypted radio messages. Perched on the edge of Great Britain, the isolated community is wary of strangers. Struggling to gain trust from the locals and where even his assigned Government contact, the local Postmistress, is antagonistic, he becomes entangled in a web of silence. When the husband of his contact is found dead, the body horrifically impaled on a shard of window glass, Clement is at first unsure if it is an unfortunate accident, or a gruesome warning. As more deaths are uncovered, Clement realises he is facing not only an enemy spy but a ruthless killer. With limited time, Clement must act quickly, and, **if necessary, alone**.

In the dark days of 1941, Britain fights on. Invasion threatens and fear hangs in the air. Some yearn for peace and an end to the relentless Nazi bombing. Others are spurred on to fight for victory, no matter the cost. And some will manipulate a divided country for their own ends. On a winter's night, a German spy parachutes into the Cambridgeshire fenland while another man is secretly murdered in the same field. Is he another enemy spy or has he been sent to his death? Either way, a killer lurks. Major Revd Clement Wisdom, now a member of the SIS, is sent to discover the dead man's identity and almost immediately uncovers a sinister network of conspiracy where kidnap, murder and revenge threaten not only the safety of the country but Clement's life.

In late 1941, Japan threatens and vast numbers of Imperial Army spies have infiltrated throughout the Pacific Islands in readiness for conflict.

His previous assignment having finished in Australia Major Clement Wisdom is seconded to lead a small guerrilla force. Their mission: to secure a vitally important person in Singapore and take him, and the secret he carries, back to Australia, but while enroute, Clement learns that Malaya, Singapore, and Pearl Harbour have all been bombed and war with Japan declared.

With no up-to-date intelligence, and leading a group of men he barely knows, much less trusts, Clement's orders leave him with no option but to proceed.

His fears are compounded when one of his men dies in an apparent suicide and it seems likely that there is an enemy spy on board; one who will kill to evade discovery and who is motivated by the oldest of reasons: revenge.

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

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

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# From the Ringing Chamber



I'm pleased to report that, in the last few weeks, we successfully completed two quarter peals of Single Oxford Bob Minor, both at Wissett, as the culmination of our project to ring a new (to us, including me!) method from scratch. We're now moving on to another method called Single Court, which has a lot of similarities to Single Oxford, so hopefully we can knock this off in a few weeks.

Incidentally, the names Single Court Bob and Single Oxford Bob were originally just Court Bob and Oxford Bob (Bob means that there is some energetic dodging involved; Minor means on six bells). Then someone realised that you could make things more "interesting" by duplicating what was going on at the back (second half) of the row in mirror image on the front. Thus were born Double Court and Double Oxford (they are next on our list!), and "Single" was added to the original method names for clarity.

We've also rung a couple of quarter peals for Sunday evening services, at Halesworth and Heveningham. To ring a quarter for a 10am service means an early start — not good for me and not good for local residents, but evenings are more doable and, as explained previously, this enables me to spread the net wider than just the Blyth Valley, to such an extent that I was the only resident out of eight ringers in the quarter at Halesworth!

Our weekly practices, usually at Blythburgh, continue to be progressive, not just for us but for the regular visitors from other towers in the District. Our newer ringers are making steady progress: Kari rang for her first services this month while Joanna is now ringing rounds, helped by a number of visits to the enterprising Mancroft Ringing Discovery Centre in Norwich.

We can be seen in action soon at our annual open day on September 16th for the Heritage Open Weekend, and I hope that one or two more may be inspired to begin the long and slow but thoroughly enjoyable and rewarding journey to become a ringer!

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

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
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
