On Saturday 14th January, around 30 bellringers from the North East Suffolk District of the Suffolk Guild of Bellringers met at Chediston for a two hour practice. Ringers came from our own Blyth Valley, Beccles and Aldeburgh. As with any musical group, bellringers need to practice together as the bells can only be rung as a team, with one person to one bell. Getting the rhythm and striking right can only come with practising together and taking the advice and teaching of more experienced ringers.

Chediston has a lovely ring of six bells restored and re-tuned in 2009. Bellringers from all over the county and country want to come and ring them – we are very fortunate to have such an asset in our village.



From the Rector...

February begins with Candlemas or the Festival of the Presentation of Christ at the Temple. It can be remembered on the nearest Sunday which is what has happened this year. We had a fifth Sunday joint service at St Mary's Halesworth, which I hope will be increasingly supported to become a resource church for the whole Blyth Valley in terms of worship, skills and fundraising.

As a concept, the festival speaks of the circle of life – for you Lion King fans out there! As its name suggests, it remembers the occasion of the child Jesus being presented to God. He would have been redeemed at the cost of two doves for a normal hard-up household.

You can see this depicted on the bottom right of the stained glass window above the top table in St Mary's Halesworth. Recalling the Exodus, better-off families were supposed to give a lamb as God's people had to buy back their first born male from God. Jesus would have been bought back in this way. He would have also been circumcised. This marks him as a Jew in the Jewish religious culture. He is initiated into that ethnicity - one of God's chosen people. Mary, likely, would also have been restored to her place in society in the manner of the churching of women. Sadly, historically, in some faiths, sensitivities have excluded rather than recognised women's reproductive cycles and regenerative energy. Blood was held to be life and God's gift in its proper place. Kosher animal's life blood is drained in respect. The regular bleeding and loss of blood at childbirth meant women were deemed unclean. So, the festival of the presentation is a both a restoration and a committing at one end of life.

Suffolk Diocese has therefore dubbed the occasion 'Growing Younger Sunday'. Engaging with children and young families is messy. Demands from children and work are often chaotic. Responsibilities are spontaneous. Sitting quietly and still through an hour of worship may not be everyone's idea of a good use of a Sunday morning, even if there is no football happening then. Yet, Gini, *Open the Book* and others are engaging with youth and children's work across the town to promote opportunities outside school to chill, belong and contribute. I used to think younger people would inevitably be more aware, kind, generous as they learned more about

the mistakes and hang ups of the previous generations. However, it seems the church's contribution is still very much needed as faith gives the humility and self-confidence required to counter the isolating insecure hatred of people like Andrew Tate which is so influential for young men in our day.

The church's contribution is where the circle of life comes back around. The other main characters in the Luke 2: 22 – 40 Gospel reading for the festival communion service are Simeon and Anna. They meet and speak about the child with the family and those gathered to worship. All we know about Simeon is that he was a Gandalf character. He was righteous, devout and the Holy Spirit rested on him. Whether he actually said the words of the Nunc Dimittis or whether they were a liturgy already in use attributed to him, I don't know. He says I can now die well satisfied now that I have seen God's answer.

Anna was 84, and had been married once, but only for seven years. She is a faithful regular attender at the 8am Prayer Book Mass, if you will. Prophet Anna preaches to everyone present who were interested about 'the child'.

The wisdom and the life experience of older folk, especially when seasoned with faith, is invaluable. So are the ancient traditions of the church, such as Candlemas when candles are presented for blessing so that like Christ they may give light to our lives in worship throughout the year. Old or young please do come along to all or any of our illuminating events in church or outside; working parties or worship, concerts or committees, food or fundraising. You are welcome here!

Revd Jon Sermon – Minister

Dear Friends,

Like you all, we have just engaged with Christians from various churches in the 'Week of Prayer for Christian Unity'. This year, it included gatherings at venues around the community. As we came together to pray, by doing so at key local places, we were symbolically, and spiritually 'acting out' the unity God calls us to. But also 'grounding' what we were doing in the community. If you want the technical (theological) term — we were being 'incarnational'.

This is important: Whatever church/denomination/background/tradition we are from, what we share is the key truths of Christianity and the key experience of a journey into personal relationship with God through Jesus Christ.

I was recently asked (by someone who genuinely wanted to know) what is the difference between us (the URC) and the Anglican church? There are, of course, differences that can be brought out, but the conversation flowed much more into what we hold in common: treasures indeed!

Our unity is important: Jesus prayed for his followers (John 17) and not only those at the time but those who would come to believe through their testimony. In other words: us! We are all included. And the theme Jesus prayed was that we should be one 'just as he and the Father are one'. Christian unity, therefore, is at the heart of this prayer, which Jesus was praying on the very night he was betrayed – knowing what he was to face, yet concerned for us.

And as we pray for Christian unity, we also pray for each other – both within local congregations and across different churches and denominations. And as we pray for each other we also learn to love one another, Remember that Jesus said this was how we would be known as his disciples, if we love one another (John 13:35).



Friends of St Mary's - St Mary The Virgin Church, Halesworth - A little bit of history: Monuments of all shapes and sizes - Part 5

Ledger stones, monuments laid into the floor of churches, usually flat stone slabs marking the place of burial of deceased people of sufficient importance to warrant their resting place inside the church. That this perhaps does not matter is humorously hinted at by the epitaph on the ledger stone of one Thomas Docton (d. 1618), originally placed in the churchyard outside the chancel door of St Nectans' Church, Hartland, Devon, and which reads:

Here I lie outside the chancel door; Here I lie because I'm poor:

The further in, the more they pay; But here I lie as warm as they.

The term 'ledger' derives from the Middle English words *lygger, ligger or leger,* they from the root of the Old English verb *liċġan,* meaning to lie down. An inscription on stones and recording the salient details of the deceased, not uncommonly a family group, may be accompanied by incised coats of arms or other decoration. Stones with inset brasses first appeared in the 13th century. Ledger stones were chosen by important but less well-off families, being cheaper than a tomb, and gradually gave way to the familiar upright inscribed gravestone.

It is not clear what criteria qualified a deceased person to be buried within a church (rather than in the churchyard), and/ or to merit a ledger stone; examples range from the aristocracy to country gentry, from clergy and doctors to merchants and tradesmen.

Throughout the UK, over 250,000 survive mostly dating from the late 17th - late 18th centuries. Stones used are often from a local source, with the carving of the letters, largely in Latin up to about 1740, and any decoration of high quality, a demonstration of the letter cutter's art.

The Ledgerstone Survey of England and Wales aims to record all the ledger stones of England and Wales with partners in the scheme, The Church Recording Society, and The Church Monuments Society.

St Mary's has its share of ledger stones; in the sanctuary are three. For one Thomas Shortrudge, 'Clerk lately Rector of this Parish who Departed this life luly ye 8th 1722'; Latin text for Anna Sparham (d.1682 aged 19), wife of John Sparham; and, poignantly, the sons of Thomas Anguish, Rector, and his wife, Mary, - William aged three (d. 1728), and his brother, Edmund aged seven (d. 1735).

On the floor of the Lady Chapel are the ledger stones of Sir William Argentein (d. 1418) and his wife, (moved here when the organ was installed). Their brasses perhaps removed by the iconoclast William Dowsing and his men when they visited St Mary's on 5 April 1643.

In front of the font are several ledger stones, not all legible. That of William Cary (d.1686) and of Thomas Carver (d.1708), a 'D'. of Physick', which records the latter had 10 children, of whom two sons and three daughters survived him. His wife (d.1713), has a separate stone as 'Relict'; relict being an archaic word for someone surviving after the loss of another, often used on monuments about a widow, and, less often, a widower. Their son, Thomas (d.1719), is buried in the north porch.

Next are ledger stones for the Jermyn family; James Jermyn (d. 1778), a local attorney described as, '...an Ornament to his Profession, Stranger to Parsimony & Extravagance and a real Friend to Mankind. Truth & Justice require this Acknowledgement of his Merit.', and his wife Martha, (d. 1772) who died 42 years to the day after her marriage, each event on a Tuesday. She is described thus: 'Reader! Her Piety & Goodness of Heart were not unworthy of thy Imitation.' Also, interred here is their son, Peter Jermyn (d.1797 aged 31), also an attorney, who left wife Sarah, 3 sons and 3 daughters.

Lastly is the small ledger stone of Charles D'Urban born 17 March 1769 and dying less than 3 weeks later on 3 April. Charles was the infant brother of Lieutenant General Sir Benjamin D'Urban (1777-1849) whose name was given to Durban, formerly, Port Natal, chief seaport of South Africa, where he was governor of the Cape Colony 1834-37.

Near the north porch is the stone of Jacob Keble (d.1660), with a shield at the top and four indentations which presumably held brasses.

The wooden flooring of the inner north aisle covers ledger stones for James Turner (d.1820 aged 34), his wife, Mary Ann (d. 1812 aged 24), and, 'Two of their Children are intered by her side.' – did she die in childbirth, one wonders.

And, lastly, the ledger stone where, 'Heere Under Lyeth Buried the Bodie of John Pricke Gentleman whoe was Some Time Practitioner of The ER^t of Physicke In This Towne of Halsworth'

Do pause awhile at these fascinating glimpses of inhabitants, once of Halesworth, buried under our feet in St Mary's.



On revisiting old favourites

How happy I was shortly before Christmas to discover this book had recently been published, I had to treat myself in case none of my family and friends decided it was a suitable Christmas present!

I came to the original *The Hawk and the Dove* series quite late and enjoyed them immensely, feeling quite bereft when I'd finished the last one – it seems many others, including the author, felt the same.




This Brother of Yours by Penelope Wilcock The series is set in a Benedictine monastery in Yorkshire at the beginning of the 14th century, a setting where striving to live a life closer to God and in harmony with one's fellows is entirely believable and not cringeworthy, but as challenging for these oh so human men as it is for us today. Picking up the narrative where

the previous series ended, with a slice of life that can be enjoyed without having read all the first series, the main protagonist returns to his former monastic life in very poor health after the death of his wife: contentious circumstances indeed. Can he be accepted? Will he be accepted? Will the bishop find out, with dire circumstances for the whole community? He is "hidden" in the infirmary to heal and later to serve (apparently the bishop has never been known to enter the infirmary on any of his visitations). So this novel is about the return of a prodigal, second chances and above all healing of mind, body and spirit. (I learnt some very surprising things about medieval medicine!).

The author herself writes "My aim in writing is to make goodness attractive. I love simple human kindness and gentleness, and I am moved by human vulnerability. I am fascinated by the power that is within our grasp to lift one another up, to heal and strengthen and encourage each

other - our power to bless." For me, she succeeds with all *The Hawk and the Dove* series.



Where the Light Fell by Philip Yancey. The author is probably familiar to most of us for books such as What's so amazing about Grace?, Soul Survivor, and What good is God? Honest, empathetic and wise, and, as it turns out, grounded on his lived experience, they are an encouragement and inspiration to thousands. Where the light fell is Yancey's very readable early years autobiography,

coming-of-age story or, as the blurb tells us, a 'meditation on the bonds of family and the allure of extremist faith'.

His young parents had a dream they would become missionaries in Africa, instead his mother found herself scraping a living as a Bible class teacher after her husband's tragic death, bringing up her little sons in trailer-park poverty; perhaps unbalanced by grief (and guilt?) she dedicated her boys to God and brought her sons up (we would say harshly) in the 1950s US bible-belt to take their father's place in the mission field, a way of life which eventually led to rebellion and a family split the boys barely survived. Then, at College, despite his upbringing, Yancey says "I realise I don't know much about Jesus, apart from the stories I learned in Sunday School. Churches in my childhood focused mostly on the Epistles and the Old Testament". The light fell. Eager to learn more he studies the Gospels, drawn to a relationship with Jesus, the God of Love, not the crushing God of Wrath taught by his mother's fundamentalist church. He walks into the light. Great stuff. Pleasantly surprised to find this book in Halesworth library, I'm glad I borrowed and read it.



Feel no guilt in laughter, he'd know how much you care.

Feel no sorrow in a smile that he's not here to share.

You cannot grieve forever; he would not want you to.

He'd hope that you could carry on the way you always do.

So, talk about the good times and the way you showed you cared,
The days you spent together, all the

happiness you shared. Let memories surround you, a word someone may say Will suddenly recapture a time, an hour, a day,

That brings him back as clearly as though he were still here,

And fills you with the feeling that he is always near.

For if you keep those moments, you will never be apart

And he will live forever, locked safely within your heart.

Finally and very sadly we held a funeral service for a three month old baby at the end of January.

Father, you know our hearts and share our sorrows. We are hurt by our parting from those whom we loved: when we are angry at the loss we have sustained, when we long for words of comfort, yet find them hard to hear, turn our grief to truer living, our affliction to firmer hope in Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

May Jenny, John, Beryl and the three month old baby, rest in peace and rise in glory. Amen.

On Sunday 15th January we held a service of reflection focused on refugees and asylum seekers. World Refugee Day is marked on June 20th each year. It enables us to reflect on the issue of migration and to pray for refugees and asylum seekers. However, our reflection and our prayer need to be year-round. With readings from Matthew 25. 31-40 and Ruth 2.1-13, prayers with the response 'The Lord bless you and keep you, the Lord make his face shine upon you. We prayed for those living in places of conflict in fear of violence, facing starvation, suffering the effects of climate change, those who have been oppressed and discriminated against, those who have lost their lives in the quest for sanctuary, drowned in small boats, died in lorries, killed at border crossings. Copies of the full order of service are on the back table of St Mary's entitled When You Dwell In The Exile Of The Stranger.



Once again we approach Lent. The Archbishop of Canterbury writes "It's important to remember that the word 'Lent' itself comes from the old English word for 'spring'. It's not about feeling gloomy for 40 days; it's not about making yourself miserable for 40 days; it's not even about giving things up for 40 days. Lent is springtime. It's preparing for that great climax of springtime which is Easter - new life bursting through death. And as we prepare ourselves for Easter during these days, by prayer and by selfdenial, what motivates us and what fills the horizon is not self-denial as an end in itself but trying to sweep and clean the room of our own minds and hearts so that the new life really may have room to come in and take over and transform us at Easter".

Finally from me, a date for your diaries in March. We will once again be hosting a Mothering Sunday lunch following our service on March 19th.
