

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The Revd David Sochon writes...

Rather than the altruistic desire for the welfare or success of the whole community, "Self-fulfilment" and "happiness" seem to be the watchwords and guiding principles of today's society.

Many years ago I was talking with a group of teenagers about what they wanted from life. Without exception they all wanted "to be happy".

"Oh, yes, and what will make you happy?"

Some wanted a big car or big house, some wanted success in their chosen profession, some wanted money. It was generally "things" that they sought.

I said, "If you could be granted a million pounds, but have only one day to enjoy it before you died would you be happy?"

Suddenly they changed their opinions and now they almost all wanted to see their family and friends and share their love with them. When the chips were down it was not things, but people that they wanted.

One of the greatest pains of today's pandemic situation is that we have become more and more isolated, we cannot meet people. It is this restriction which is causing so much heartache and mental stress. We cannot, in person, share our love – to let others know that we love them and rejoice in that love reciprocated. We begin to feel detached and perhaps, after a while - despite phone calls or messages - even slightly less-cared-for ourselves.

Being unable to go to church or to share in fellowship and communion, may cause us temporarily to fear losing touch with, or being forgotten by, our mortal friends, but there is not the slightest fear that we shall be forgotten by our Creator and Heavenly Father. After all it is an illogical nonsense to imagine that God, who has sacrificed so much through the death of his Son to save his creation, would ever cease caring for it.

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That we are loved and cared for is the great certainty for all Christians and the great hope that we share in these troubled times. Though we now walk through the valley of the shadow of death we are not alone for Christ walks with us and we are comforted by his presence and his promises for the future.

As we commemorated the saints of the past on All Saint's Day, Bishop Martin reminded us that we are all saints in our own time today and have the same responsibilities and share the same privileges as the saints of yesteryear. We pray regularly that we may follow their good examples and replicate their good deeds even through times of difficulty and suffering.

St Paul suffered many tribulations during his travels — both physical and mental; he was ostracised and plotted against by former friends, flogged, beaten, stoned, imprisoned, starved, cast adrift, shipwrecked You name it, he suffered it — and yet through all these troubles, some of which make our anxieties today seem rather trifling, he was convinced of the one great hope that Christ gives to all who believe in him and his promises — that we should be with him for ever.

"Can anything ever separate us from Christ's love? Does it mean that he no longer loves us if we have trouble or calamity, or are persecuted, or hungry, or destitute, or in danger, or threatened with death?... No despite all these things, overwhelming victory is ours through Christ, who loved us. And I am convinced that nothing can ever separate us from God's love. Neither death, nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither our fears today nor our worries about tomorrow – not even the powers of hell can separate us from God's love. No power in the sky above or in the earth below – indeed, nothing in all creation will ever be able to separate us from the love of God that is revealed in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Romans 8 35 – 38 NLT).

One of the support agencies and charities close to the Revd David Sochon's heart is WaterAid. Living, as we are in the midst of a pandemic made him think of others who are suffering not only Covid, but the ever-present threat of cholera.

He imagined what would be the effect if the following headline appeared in the national press ...

DISASTER - 400 DIE IN AIR CRASH WORST EVER INCIDENT

For days the world's media would be agog. The world would be shocked. Hundreds of reporters would be sent to survey the scene. Investigators would be sent to find out what went wrong. There would be much hand-wringing and wailing.

And yet... and yet... 800 children die every day from drinking polluted water collected from foul or stagnant ponds or streams infected by animal waste and it doesn't receive even a passing mention in the media. Women (generally) and children have to walk for miles, facing injury or danger from animals and other humans who may attack them, in order to collect an essential of life which may actually kill them.... and we, who have water enough and to spare at the turn of a tap, do little or nothing to help.

In the mid nineteenth century (1854) Dr John Snow reasoned that it was polluted water that was causing the death from cholera of thousands of Londoners and this discovery led to movements and legislation to improve water hygiene and sanitation until it reached the standards we now enjoy. In 1981 the water industry in this country established WaterAid as a non-governmental international charity to improve the situation for people living without safe, purified water, initially in Sri Lanka and Zambia - and now in many other countries. But forty years on and thousands still are dying every week from the lack of a basic essential of life that we take too much for granted.

Times are hard for all of us at the moment as we suffer under the many resulting effects of the Covid epidemic, but they are even harder for those suffering from both Covid and the threat of cholera. If we can find it in our hearts (and in our purses!) - apart from our many other commitments - to spare just a little something for WaterAid it would be a wonderful way to celebrate our giving this Christmas.

Blue Christmas Service

This year, Mothers' Union members in Suffolk have recorded their 'Blue Christmas Service' so that it might be shared with those who would otherwise not be able or feel safe to come to church this Christmas. A Blue Christmas Service is a guiet and reflective service for those for whom Christmas 2020 is not going to be a happy and joyous time. This year has been a challenge for everyone, with many grieving for friends and family members who have died due to Covid-19. The pandemic has also resulted in many people losing jobs with resulting financial difficulties. Anxiety, fear for the future and depression have affected many people. All of us have experienced loss of physical contact with family and friends.

The service can be viewed from their website, www. musuffolk.org.uk from 5pm, on Monday 21st December, which is when the longest night of the year begins. The service will remain on the website until December 31st.

It has been a very strange and unsettling year for us all but I trust that you will enjoy a peaceful Christmas in whatever form it takes, and I hope that it won't be too long before we can resume our meetings. In the meantime, stay safe and well. With love and prayers.

Diocesan President's Report for Zoom Council - 18/11/20

Branches have continued to meet via Zoom, and others are meeting in social groups of up to six. One Branch has reported that during Lockdown they have "raised the profile of the Branch in the parish and community, through project work, magazine articles, and virtual fund-raising....". Another branch reported that following the reprint of their first edition of the very successful Prayers from the heart, they are about to launch a new collection of Scripture Verses and Bible Readings. Sheran Harper, our Worldwide President, has even mentioned our Book of Comfort in the latest issue of Families First. I've been encouraged by the stories of Branches holding their membership together through regular visiting, telephone calls, emails, branch newsletters, and even the odd "Bags of Love" being delivered. Another imaginative and innovative meeting included a special "Bingo" session! In spite of everything around us, MU is still working away in the parishes and communities they serve. Congratulations to all, and a huge thank you to our Branch Leaders, their committees and the membership for all they are doing on behalf of MU.

Our Trustees too have been working hard - thinking up new ideas and ways of "doing MU", attending MSH webinars, promoting MUe sales, and sorting out MSH database queries and our own website. Much hard work is going on behind the scenes: Cathie sorting out the Charity Commissioners; anniversary cards and cheerful letters sent out to our members; Diocesan members, whose numbers are increasing, receiving current information and thoughtful reflections, and the work of AFIA still reaching out to those less fortunate and to keyworkers. Our links with the Women's Refuge are on hold at present due to Covid-19, but we still hold them in our hearts. There is just so much more going on.... and all of us praying for the work of Mothers' Union here and overseas alongside, of course, our Prayer warriors in the Prayer Chain. Bervl has continued to hold the fort and been a tower of strength, keeping us aware of all those who are unwell (including our own trustees and officers and their families in these difficult days),

those who have recently lost loved ones, or their jobs or security (flowers have been sent to Angus Travel who have served us well over the years) - our thoughts and prayers go out to them, and especially for those who have lost so much.

Disseminating information: The latest edition of Families First has recently been dispatched to all members on the database. Our November DP Conference at High Leigh has been cancelled and will now take place on Zoom. Representation in the Diocese has been exclusively via Zoom. A pop-up Mary Sumner Day service, although well prepared with MU resources, was not a success. One branch has closed due to dwindling

Our bi-monthly newsletter, produced by Trustees, is going down really well with Branches. During Lockdown, it has been amazing to learn of all the things that have been going on in Mothers' Union in our Diocese. Working alongside others, fund-raising and support for parochial activities on behalf of the local church has included the Historic Ride and Stride challenges, foodbank deliveries, and supporting local clergy and pastoral care.

We are in a time of transition, and as Trustees in our Diocese, we have much optimism about the way ahead. We want to maintain our small groups meeting regularly together, but maybe now in new and different ways. We want to "Rebuild hope and confidence" - our MU theme for 2021; and we want to grow our fellowship, caring and supporting one another. There will come a time when all the MU members across our Diocese will be able to affirm our identity as MU members, meet up again face to face and "rejoice and give thanks for all the blessings that we have received". Take heart - things will change for the better! **Linda Ginn MBE**

Mothers' Union at i-Chameleon

The MU NSA (North Suffolk Area) Committee have now met and have discussed how to allocate the money we raised at i-Chameleon at the beginning of October, which amounted to almost £1200. We considered how to use the money in supporting and empowering families in our Diocese, the UK and Overseas.

£100 will be to purchase £5 and £10 Gift Tokens for the mums and their children in the Women's Refuges in Ipswich and Bury St Edmunds. £300 to the MU Overseas Fund. £300 to the MU Britain & Ireland Fund. £150 to Selig's 'Hope into Action' for 15 previously homeless people who are now living in 'permanent' accommodation, to provide Christmas stockings; each pair of socks containing items such as a handwarmer, diary/notebook and pen, pack of tissues, torch, chocolate coins/bar.

We provided Christmas stockings in 2019 for the 30 people who were in the Ipswich Night Shelter on Christmas Eve, which were very much appreciated.

The deposit has now been paid for I-Chameleon for next year 21st to 27th Oct. The balance will be kept in the MU NSA account held by our MU Diocesan Treasurer. Some monies are also held in reserve for the various Open the Book Teams across North Suffolk to buy Lion Storyteller Bibles and Handbooks for new members. 

Gathered worship in Eight Team Churches

The Team has been deepened and enriched over the year by some of the challenges we faced

Dialogues des Carmelites

At the front of the stage some fourteen women, former Carmelite nuns, stand huddled in a group. Some are old, barely able to walk. Others are middle aged, and one or two stand determined and resolute in their youth and strength. All have been told that they are no longer permitted to be nuns, but are compelled by the French Revolutionaries to return to secular life. The youngest in the group, a novice nun named Constance of St Denis, looks around as if waiting for the arrival of someone else.

The date is July 1794 and the French Revolutionaries, having abolished the monarchy and the aristocracy, have now turned their attention to the Church, which is under a period of intense persecution, with priests, monks and nuns the prime target. The dreaded guillotine has been set up in central Paris and the Carmelites have been condemned to death by this cruel method. Off stage the swish on the guillotine can be clearly heard as, one by one, beginning with the oldest and most infirm, the Carmelites begin the long march to martyrdom, with the abuse and catcalls of the enemies of the Church echoing in their ears.

Dolefully, they begin singing as they walk. The tune and words of the *Salve Regina* echo round the stage, becoming more and more reduced in volume as the grim procession continues. Only one or two Carmelites are left and Constance is waiting to begin her walk. As she looks round one more Carmelite joins her, Blanche, and together they make their way to execution and martyrdom. We hear the guillotine fall for the last time, the crowds go home wondering, the music dies away to silence and the audience break out spontaneously into wild applause for the orchestra and singers before they take their bow on stage.

Such is the final scene in the opera composed in 1956 by the French composer Francis Poulenc and first performed at La Scala, Milan, on 26th January 1957. La Scala had asked Poulenc to compose a ballet for them, but the composer replied that he already had the subject of a new opera in his mind and so the Carmelites made their first appearance on the stage, at what must be one of the most moving operas composed in the twentieth century.

The story opens shortly before the beginning of the French Revolution when Blanche de la Force informs her widowed father and her brother of her decision to become a novice nun. Her father and brother are appalled – Blanche is very quiet and shy and they don't know how she will cope in the convent. But she is accepted and on her first day another novice nun, Constance, informs her that it has been revealed to her that they will die on the same day, and in the near future

After some time has passed it is clear, even in the convent, that the French church is destined for a time of unparalleled persecution. Blanche's brother visits her and implores her to join the family and travel to safety in Switzerland or England. But Blanche is determined: she will not abandon her vows. Similarly the convent chaplain holds the final service in the chapel. The nuns suggest that he, too, finds a place of safety, but he tells them that this would be a gross dereliction of his ordination vows to leave his flock at such a perilous time.

The inevitable day comes when the nuns are arrested for not accepting the rules of the Revolution. One of the soldiers confides in Constance and Blanche that he too is a Christian believer. He used to serve as Sacristan in his local church and regarded the parish priest as a brother. To his shame and regret he has compromised his faith and become one of the Revolutionaries.

In the confusion of the arrest, Blanche slips away and returns to her old home. But she finds it empty and ransacked by the Revolutionaries. She realises that her place is with Constance and the other Carmelites waiting to suffer martyrdom. And so she returns to fulfil her destiny.

We are told by those who have studied the history of the French Revolution that, whatever their hostility to the Church, the people were thoroughly disgusted with the pointless execution of the innocent Carmelites. The Reign of Terror could not continue, a new form of government was introduced and a few years later, Napoleon became Emperor and Christianity was restored throughout France. Churches, cathedrals, abbeys and monasteries were re-opened.

But the memory of the Carmelites lived on, and their burial place can be found in Paris to this very day. As we read of severe persecution of Christians throughout the world, maybe Poulenc's message is more relevant today than it was when the opera was first performed 63 years ago.

As well as the course the bible study group are following, we are running a short Advent course on three consecutive Thursday evenings in December. The sessions will include images, poetry and bible readings for reflection.



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



think of Laocoön struggling with the serpent Covid.



I'm sure we all sympathise with him as we try to plan forward.

REMEMBRANCE **SUNDAY** WAS memorable for its limited and low-key commemoration, with no service at Linstead. More than ever before, our watchword has to be 'Lest we forget'. Linstead does have a claim to fame in that it has, according to the Commonwealth War Graves recorded only Commission, the embroidered war memorial in the world.



The absence of a visible external War Memorial has engendered a tradition of planting Poppy Crosses just by the church gates (or where the church gates normally are). So here, amidst the autumn leaves and in the pale November sunshine, is Linstead's



garden of remembrance. The crosses commemorate the five sons of the parish who died in the First World War. With them are four crosses in memory of the four German airmen who died when their aircraft crashed in Linstead whilst attacking Metfield Aerodrome. Theirs was the last enemy aircraft to crash in Suffolk and it happened just a few days before hostilities ceased in Europe. The last cross is a personal one and represents my uncle who died in a raid on Brest in 1940. I never met him and my aunt remarried later in the war. He was, in the family, very much the forgotten man and this, I feel, brings into sharp relief, the importance of Remembrance Sunday. So many who died are forgotten, not least because all who remembered them personally, are now dead themselves. It is just so important that the memory of their sacrifice continues, even if they themselves have passed out of memory. I would urge anyone in Linstead who has a particular person that they want to be remembered, to add a cross of their own, next year.

I NOW HAVE TO WEAR MY CHURCH Treasurer's hat. This year we have to raise £5628 as our contribution to the Diocesan Quota. This pays for all the running expenses of the Diocese, including the stipends of our priests (when we have any). Remarkably, for a parish of just over a 100 souls, each year we raise our Quota, or at least get very close, There has been no opportunity to hold fund-raising events this year and we are looking at a considerable shortfall. Meanwhile, most of the expenses of the Diocese continue. I am therefore making a special appeal for funds to help us pay as much of our quota as possible (this year we have £4,128 still outstanding). Please send cheques to me, payable to Linstead PCC. Very many thanks.

SO WHAT ABOUT CHRISTMAS? I HEAR you all cry. What I am proposing is this: Our regular Carols by Candlelight will be held (Lockdown(s) permitting) at 3pm on Sunday 20th December. Now we will not be able to accommodate our normal church-full, so those of you who would like to attend, please contact me. It will be on a 'first come, first served' basis, and all seats will be reserved. I cannot be specific about numbers, because it will depend on the size of family bubbles. Mindful of the requirements of social distancing, I will juggle around with applications to get

as many in safely as I can. Masks must be worn. Lessons will be read as normal, but there can be no congregational singing. However, this gives us a golden opportunity for some very interesting music. The PCC held their annual meeting in the open air and all the church officers remain in place. Thanks very much again to Jane and the PCC members for all they do to keep the church in good shape!


Due to exceptional circumstances with Covid-19, the church is not open and there are no services planned until next year, just support and worship at other local churches as detailed in the magazine.

Not for long, but we did have our candlelit Souls Commemoration traditional fashion, and we did have an outdoor Remembrance Sunday Service led by both Churchwardens, gathered round the porch decorated by Susan Fitch; Hugh Spink tolled the tenor bell and Tobin Lambert read the names. The weather was fair, 26 people and one dog came, and it was good to see that the ceremony was much appreciated by some of the 'wider church community'.

The church is still decorated with red

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Halesworth & District Museum From the Archives

It seems that Christmas this year may be very different from usual as the world continues its battle with the Corona virus. Prime Minister, Boris Johnson, has said, "Plan for the worst and hope for the best.", before adding that, hopefully, it will be all over "...in time for Christmas". This echoes WW1, when ...the British public thought that the First World War would be 'over by Christmas' in 1914...such a common feature of war fiction, memoirs and histories...* An enduring image is that of British and German soldiers playing football on Christmas Day during unofficial ceasefires along the Western Front. We wage a different war now with lockdowns, tiers (and tears), face coverings, (Happy Birthday) hand washing and the social-distancing dance.

In its archives the Museum has an autograph book that belonged to Mrs Ivy Moore, Red Cross volunteer, with entries from soldiers recuperating at the Patrick Stead Hospital during WW1. Private J McLough, who was wounded at Neuve Chapelle, wrote:

"When you take this little book And read the verses through. Will you think of the one who wrote this, As he often thinks of you".

It is dated 19th November 1915 so he almost certainly spent Christmas at the hospital.

And, undated, DW Ryan, of Royal Field Artillery, wrote:

"A Merry Christmas to all Patrick Stead Nurses".



PLENTY OF FOOD TO SHARE

Some 40 years on and Christmas at Patrick Stead 1953 was reported as follows:

"Christmas week commenced on Sunday evening with carols sung by the Revd Hulbert and St Mary's Church Choir. On Tuesday evening the Beccles Salvation Army played and sang carols. All the carol singers were served with refreshments. Carols were sung in the wards on Christmas Eve by the staff. The entrance hall was decorated as a Swiss Village Scene, the general wards as Swiss summer and winter scenes and the maternity wards with scenes from Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs. An illuminated Christmas tree (originally given to Holton School by the Earl of Stradbroke) stood in the entrance hall. Christmas Day started with each patient finding a stocking on the bed. The Revd Hulbert conducted Holy Communion in 'A' Ward. Visitors during the morning included Sir Robert and Lady Gooch. Dr Cursham carved the turkey for the patients' Christmas Dinner. The turkey was cooked and delivered by Mr. Ellis. Father Christmas (Mr Clare) visited the Hospital at 3.30pm and distributed presents from the Christmas Trees to each patient and each member of staff. He had a special stocking for Gail Thompson who was born on Christmas Day. Patients' visitors were entertained to tea. Music was enjoyed during the morning and evening with the aid of an amplifier supplied by Mr Ian Carter. On Boxing Day, the patients in 'A' Ward enjoyed a quiz session during the morning and a film show was given in the afternoon by J W and D A Newby. A baby was born on Boxing Day – Stephanie Calver. The staff all worked very hard to make Christmas time a happy one for the patients. The Nursing Staff Party was held in Matron's sitting room on the 1st January".

It would be brave to try to predict where we shall be and how we shall be able to celebrate Christmas 2021. An unknown author wrote:

"What is Christmas? It is tenderness for the past, courage for the present, hope for the future.... It is a wish that every cup may overflow with blessings and that every path may lead to peace".

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


Jolabokaflod

Have you heard of *Jolabokaflod* (literally Yule, or Christmas, Book Flood)? One of Iceland's winter traditions sees everyone give their family a 'flood' of books on Christmas Eve. Introducing the tradition over here would have many benefits I'm sure (not that I'm biased, or anything!) — and what is nicer than curling up with a good book in those days between Christmas and New Year. To help you on your way to establishing your own tradition here are a few suggestions.

Is it only we old 'uns who remember the catchphrase "a Christie for Christmas"? Television has embraced it although it's several decades since a new book has been a possibility, but a good mystery is always welcome.


And now for some 'useful' books. We are probably fed up with hearing these are unprecedented times, but to help us navigate the challenges could be:



The Thursday Murder Club Only published in September, this is already a runaway bestseller and my favourite read of the year. Reviewers have given it glowing reviews "such a beacon of pleasure" (Kate Atkinson); "So smart and funny. Deplorably good" (Ian Rankin). Four energetic and intelligent pensioners living in a rather posh 21st century retirement village have kept their minds active by trying to solve


photocopied "cold cases" contributed (illegally) by one of their number, a retired police officer. (The others were a spy, a psychiatrist and a Trade Union leader with a dodgy family.) When a real murder affects their community, they enthusiastically deploy their freshly honed skills to keep one step ahead of the police to solve the crime. The characters and plot are multi-layered, the resolution surprising. Meanwhile we all learn a bit more of love and loyalty in trying circumstances.

An Elegant Solution Theo, who is autistic, is a Junior Research Fellow in Number Theory at Cambridge. Prompted by an academic supervisor to demonstrate how to trace the provenance of bitcoins he happens across a shocking revelation, with embarrassing ramifications for the whole University. Being unable to dissemble due to both his Christian faith and his autism Theo places himself in some danger, escalated by a




terrorist plot engineered by a childhood acquaintance, a ruthless plot to rock the seat of power, murder the innocent and change the face of Cambridge forever. How all these threats are resolved makes for a gripping read, ending with the 'elegant solution' of the title.

Where is God in a coronavirus world? Is a question that troubles many, and many have felt their faith shaken. John Lennox is both Emeritus Professor of Mathematics and a lecturer in Christian apologetics, his writings are intellectually rigorous and faith - and Bible - informed, and in this case accessible and comforting. It is also a tiny book of just

60 pages, ideal to pop in all your loved ones' Christmas stockings.



Saying YES to life. For everyone who hopes we can 'reset' the world, slow down and respect the environment, and for those who wonder 'how?' Using the six days of creation as a framework, this study and meditation relates resurrection hope to matters of environmental, ethical and social concerns, and shows what it means to be human and a

Christian in this context.



In September I introduced We need to talk about Race (in the church), in my own reading I followed this with Why I'm no longer talking (to white people) about Race, by Reni Eddo-Lodge, which is most illuminating (and very well written). The writer explains that however sympathetic, supportive and non-racist we are we just don't 'get' black experience how it is lived: this goes a good

way to putting that right. This book sparked a national conversation and won many awards.
