The day before Liz and Dominic came to see the lambs at Bridge Farm, our second set of triplets arrived, with a bit of help.

Liz is holding the dinky day-old ram lamb triplet, who has a couple of bigger sisters, and Dominic has one of these ewe lambs.

Liz described holding the little lamb as "Lamb Therapy", remarking on the ears of the Norfolk Horn lambs which stick out horizontally and noting how soft the wool on a lamb is.

Working with sheep and the business of lambing helps in understanding the analogies that Jesus often used with shepherding and the Good Shepherd looking after his flock of sheep. The little lamb maybe small, but he is very feisty and mum is looking after all three lambs well without supplementary feeding of the lambs. **Veronica Downing**



From the Rector...

April opens half way through Passiontide with Holy Week, the first Sunday of which is Palm Sunday. We begin our main service of Holy Communion on that day with a procession along the Thoroughfare from the library. This presents us with the opportunity to celebrate that God is here and in charge. Even if that is not overly obvious just yet we are jubilant that everything will be sorted out. Then - even before we get to the breaking of bread - we hear the reading of Jesus' betrayal, mock trial, torturous death and burial. That was not how we thought it was going to work out, is it? How can that be good news? One reaction to that question is that because the greatest story ever told is the God-man going through that, then the injustice, hurt and exclusion of our time and experience are held, have purpose and will be redeemed or resolved. If you are a Christian, that will happen under God's covenant with us, in Jesus and through the Spirit as we worship, walk and witness together. If you believe something else, then your faith will have its own avenues and structures to sustain the hope embedded in the truth in this story.

Another reaction is that we now know that from the start the community of individuals that make up the church's neighbourhoods and peoples had their failings. Even then we were prone to get things wrong, change our minds, not realise the implications of our faith, miss God's methodology, not believe in our hearts what we said with our mouths. Whether or not God exists as an external personal entity, if we have the words to describe the fundamental source; the concept is clearly very real for very many over a very long time. We are faced with a global historical phenomenon.

As we gather for Palm Sunday this year there will be those for whom February's Church of England General Synod did not go far enough on Same Sex Marriage. There will be others for whom it went too far. Our denomination calls the process Living in Love and Faith. Just like the Palm Sunday service the issues cause celebration and pain. Some seek to honour God by holding their view, whilst others are hurt by it. It may be a short lived commotion on the media stage on the one hand, but on the other there has, arguably, been a fundamental shift.

It is my hope and prayer that with my role as Cure of Souls, I can hold and provide space for all the creative conflict that will arise from this decision across the Blyth Valley. First, we should all recognise that there is in our church no one view. Second, that we are all biblical Christians. Third that wherever anyone looks for support of their view they will find it. After the reformation the Church of England decided to base its thinking on scripture, tradition and reason. I would add that as we approach each of these arenas for guidance, we do so prayerfully as we will not find the truth unless God's Wisdom, or Spirit, reveals it to us. We need to recognise, as Gini does having sat through the debates at Synod, that there are many diverse contradictory valid views within each of these evangelical, catholic and liberal strands of Anglicanism. Each is life-changing, compelling and nonnegotiable.

It is worth remembering that in the first part of the last century the church was in the vanguard of those seeking the decriminalisation of homosexuality (the word had only recently been coined). It is for many a good thing that the language in the papers put to General Synod were more generous in spirit as they addressed these matters than they have been. Nevertheless, there are both gay and straight who are practising or celibate, agnostic, lay and clergy, barren or fruitful, who will be agonising profoundly, even as they celebrate Easter. Let us all accept the hard truth that we are a complex, mixed-up muddle of joy and injustice. Then, pray, cast ourselves into the wounded open hands of the life giver who overcame all this for us, for all things and for all time in His name on the tree of life.

What is the Pastoral Ministry Group and what is it up to?

The Pastoral Ministry Group (PMG) is a group of people from across the Blyth Valley Team who meet once a month to learn and develop their skills in pastoral care. The group consists of people who have been involved in pastoral care in the past or are currently supporting people. Some of the group completed a training course with the Revd Jane Held. However, anyone who is involved in visiting or supporting someone in their community is welcome to attend.

We are hoping the Blyth Valley Team will adopt a simple three level model for Pastoral Support:

Level 1 – The ordinary informal support that goes on all the time in our congregations and communities: visiting people, phoning people, giving lifts, shopping etc.

Level 2 – More targeted support at a time of difficulty e.g. illness, bereavement, losing independence. This level of support is likely to include spiritual support including Home Communion, prayer or bible reading. It is usually carried out by a member of the PMG or with some level of clergy support. It may be part of a wider package of support in partnership with other organisations.

Level 3 – Clergy support - Sensitive complex issues, funeral visiting before and in the weeks following the service, if appropriate., individual confession, issues around healing, deliverance, exorcism.

The PMG is currently working on the following:

- 1. Updating training for taking Home Communion to people.
- 2. Producing an information leaflet for our congregations to support people who are giving informal support.
- 3. Exploring different safeguarding issues connected to pastoral care.
- 4. Encouraging all our parishes to keep a simple record of who is visiting who to avoid overlooking people and to be able to step in if a visitor is taken ill themselves.

We meet on the third Monday of every month at 3.30pm at St Peter's Church Room, Holton and would welcome anyone who feels they would benefit from joining the group (including men, as we're all female at the moment!)

Dear Friends,

As this is published, Easter will be almost upon us...

Those who adopt spiritual disciplines or aspects of self-denial during Lent may well be counting the days: I have a friend who would give up chocolate for Lent every year. Her interpretation was that she could break her 'chocolate fast' as soon as she had been to worship on Easter Sunday. She would phone me and ask to join with our church's sunrise service. The moment it finished she'd be passing out cream eggs!

If any of you have similar thoughts, you'd be welcome to join the ecumenical sunrise service at Lowestoft: I am the preacher this year.

As we transition from Lent to Easter, the mood of celebration takes hold. Good Friday marks perhaps the 'darkest day' in human history. As the Son of God, God the Son, was brutally executed! Even so, we call it 'good'. Why?

I suppose the fact that such tragedy led to forgiveness, sealed in resurrection – and the invitation to new birth (as Jesus explained to Nicodemus, John ch 3) – gives us the reason.

Some years ago, when we were host to an Alpha group of mostly teenagers, one of the young lads suggested singing alternative words to the Bee Gees' hit "Tragedy" with lines including:

Tragedy, when Jesus Christ was crucified

Tragedy, the cruellest torture of all time

But also a refrain of "Victory, when Jesus Christ was crucified" in verse bringing out what the sacrifice of Jesus has achieved.

If we can really appreciate what this actually means for us, we have cause to celebrate indeed!

Romans 1.11 Trust is a small, UK based charity fostering mutual encouragement between the UK and Africa. The Chair of Trustees is Rev Jon Sermon, the local URC minister here in Halesworth (me).

Our work is currently centred on Uganda where we support church based schools and orphanages, partner with local churches and development projects and run a training scheme for pastors.



Here, I was presenting certificates at previous graduation at Wanyange, Jinja in the Eastern part of Uganda. Our child sponsorship schemes result in contact with an identified child but funding for pastor training - without such

a link - has always proved less attractive. Yet the need is growing: there is a Government move which threatens forced closure of churches if the Pastor cannot demonstrate a level of training. At the same time, the Gospel is advancing, new believers are constantly being added (as in Acts 2:47), churches are being planted and people are being called to lead but cannot access training.

To help Boost the funding to keep training viable, we are launching 'Boost 100'. It is the generosity of ordinary folk, seeing this need that makes such provision possible. Our prayer is that 100 (individuals or congregations/ organisations) will make a 3-year commitment of £10/month to boost the training. They receive certificates with our logo, and a photograph.

My visit to Uganda this year will include mentoring sessions with the current student pastors in three centres across the country. (I am also going to Zimbabwe and Kenya for mutual encouragement). Anyone wanting to know more about Boost 100, or any aspect of our work, please get in touch.



Friends of St Mary's - St Mary The Virgin Church Halesworth - A little bit of history: Monuments of all shapes and sizes - Part 7

Not immediately seen as a monument, perhaps, are the chantry chapels in many a church, not least St Mary's. Dr Judith Middleton-Stewart (d.2010), historian, described them as follows: "A chantry was an earthly endowment contracted for a spiritual benefit. At its most basic level, a chantry carried the implicit obligation of intercessory prayers to be said by a priest for the soul of the founder, in return for endowment."*

The derivation of the word is from Old French 'chanter' and Latin 'cantare' (to sing). Established during pre-Reformation mediaeval England, those able to, would endow a sum of money to employ a priest to sing, or chant, a stipulated number of services as part of the deceased's atonement for sins committed whilst alive.

The doctrine on which chantries were founded was swept away when Parliament passed The Chantry Act in 1545 during the Reformation in England, initiated by King Henry VIII. This defined chantries as representing misapplied funds and misappropriated lands. The Act provided that all chantries and their properties would thenceforth belong to the King for as long as he should live. This was followed by the Chantries Act of 1547 which abolished the remaining chantries and confiscated their assets. This latter act was specifically aimed to stop the last remaining institutions that were dedicated to praying for the dead.

In St Mary's we see the north transept, the oldest part of the mediaeval build, more obvious before the Victorian addition of the outer north aisle. Here was formerly the chantry chapel of St Anne, dating from earlier than 1469, and strongly associated with the guilds in the town. According to Christian apocryphal tradition, Anne was the mother of Mary and the maternal grandmother of Jesus. Saint Anne is patroness of unmarried women, housewives, women in labour or who want to be pregnant, grandmothers, mothers and educators; also of horseback riders, cabinet-makers and miners, the latter arising from the mediaeval comparison between Mary and Christ and the precious metals silver and gold.

The chapel was endowed by Edward Mylls and Robert Randolph with lands which produced a rent of £4 12s (£4.60p) per annum. The

north transept chapel was added after the vestry was built, but obliterated by C19 work. This chapel is thought to have been dedicated to St Anne in which Piggot's chantry and a communal obituary were celebrated. Two guilds also celebrated in St Mary's Church, that of St John the Baptist which had its own chapel and that of St Antony and St Eligius (St Loy in the vernacular).

Behind the organ is a space, originally the Lady Chapel, erected by the Argentein family in the perpendicular style. As this architectural style came in after 1350 it is not certain whether to attribute the build to John Argentein (1318-1383) or William (1350-1419). However, it could be significant that William and Margery, his wife, were first entombed there, before later being moved to the St Loy Chapel (now the Lady Chapel). The 1602 *Chorography of Suffolk* tells us "He layeth pictured in brasse in complet Armour treading upon a lyon about his neck a collar of SS", the latter signifying his allegiance to the Royal House of Lancaster. William made his will in Halesworth in 1417 and left £5 for the repair of the church.

The Lady Chapel, formerly known as the St Loy, or St Loye Chapel, is where the Guild of that name had their altar in the C15. A plaque to the memory of James and Fanny Jane Parry and dated 1920 calls it the chapel of St Louis. However, St Loy would have been more appropriate to a late medieval English market town as he was invoked to cure sick horses and is the patron of blacksmiths, farmers, farriers, labourers, saddlers, veterinarians and wheelwrights, amongst others. On the floor are the Ledger Stones of Sir William Argentein and his wife (moved here when the organ was installed).

These chantry chapels seem imbued with the presence of many a person over hundreds of years of quiet contemplation:

"This is the nourishing room for a soul to prosper...

...[and] Allows them to pray to find grace and equanimity, And to recognize the interconnectedness of all..." Je'free Y

For several years Shirley had been attending and writing the reviews for FOSM recitals. From the many tributes to Shirley I have read online, Shirley has been described as a powerful presence, her warmth, enthusiasm, her love of

Baroque transposition for her was unalloyed joy. Shirley was a kind, gentle lady who had a passion for music, she will be greatly missed. One tribute reads "off on her next great adventure but taking so much love with her, rest well Shirley". We thank Shirley for her support and time she gave to events at St Mary's. May Shirley rest in peace and rise in glory. Amen.

Back in December I gave the last recital of 2022, as a tribute to Shirley, we publish her final review...

"It was worth waiting an extra week (owing to the excessive cold on the scheduled date) to hear Jason Busby's uplifting organ recital on December 21st. After being greeted with carols as we took our places, we heard Philip Stopford's meditative music for the song Do Not Be Afraid and the Carol of the Bells, a joyous piece by the young German composer, Paul Fey. The cleverly arranged programme then gave the audience a chance to sing familiar carols, each of which was followed by a prelude based on the same carol. Noel Rawsthorne's prelude gave us music woven round on Hark the Herald Angels Sing; the plainsong melody Of The Father's Love Begotten formed the basis of Stanley Vann's prelude Divinum Mysterium; another gentle prelude by Noel Rawsthorne followed the audience's singing of It Came Upon the Midnight Clear. The tune Forest Green, a folk melody collected by Ralph Vaughan Williams, was used for the singing of O Little Town Of Bethlehem, but the corresponding prelude by Paul Fey also referenced the alternative tune by H Walford Davies. The recital concluded with O Come All Ye Faithful and the prelude by Richard Lloyd on Adeste Fideles (the original Latin words of the carol).

Not only did the audience enjoy the opportunity to hear and sing these well-known carols and the use of them made by 20th century composers but they were also able to learn about the organ which Jason was playing. He explained the use of the three keyboards and 'stops' or voices which the different sounds produce; he even moved the camera (which had enabled us to see him on a screen as he performed) so that we could see how the pedal organ worked, illustrating this with a reprise of the Carol of the Bells. This recital was a fittingly exhilarating finale to this year's series organised by the Friends of St Mary's. We look forward to a similarly varied selection of musical performance in 2023".

8TH MARCH REVIEW by Jason Busby

I was thrilled that the Laxfield All Saints Singers came to Halesworth and opened the 2023 FOSM Recital Series on March 8th. Chris Cliff, director of the singers and organist at All Saints Laxfield (for decades!) is in fact the person responsible for my organ playing. Chris was my piano teacher from age 7 through to my teens seeing me gain my grade piano with the associated board of the



royal school of music. You will also recognise Chris and her husband Frank (who sang bass) as they have accompanied the Team Choir at the town choir service on Viola and Cello in recent years. The All Saints Singers for over forty years have sung at Church Festivals and local events raising money for good causes with their concerts. The recital was a blend of song and reflection given by Linda Sherman. I particularly enjoyed the story of Thomas Weelkes, composer of a piece called Tomorrow is the marriage day which the choir sang. The career of Thomas Weelkes is punctuated both with celebrated artistic achievement and personal hardship. His music is regarded as the most innovative and experimental of all the English madrigalists, yet his inability to secure stable or reputable patronage and his reputation as a belligerent alcoholic even saw him dismissed from Chichester Cathedral as organist! The recital began with the beautiful words of Psalm 23 sung to Brother James' Air arranged by Gordon Jacobs. Moving onto a piece which was sung as a three part round called Now I see thy looks were feigned by Thomas Ford. The other highlight of the recital was a little bit of Gilbert & Sullivan Oh, rapture from the Gondoliers sung by Soprano and Tenor Julie Theaker and Steve Holmes. A much enjoyed recital by the 32 people who came and supported them. THANK YOU TO THE ALL SAINTS SINGERS.

The next recital is on Wednesday 12th April, 12.30pm, given by The Kirkley Trio, we will see you then.

Why should churches be taking action?

The mission of the Church is the mission of Christ. We can see this when Christians demonstrate these five 'marks' of mission:

- To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom.
- To teach, baptise and nurture new believers.
- · To respond to human need by loving service.
- To transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind and pursue peace and reconciliation.
- To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation, and sustain and renew the life of the earth.

The following two quotations help us understand how action to protect the environment should be a fundamental part of our Christian faith in the 21st century:

- 1. It is human behaviour that is at the heart of the problem. Christian values and our Christian faith offer an alternative way to live which cares for both humanity and the natural world: "I used to think the top environmental problems were biodiversity loss, eco system collapse and climate change. I thought that with 30 years good science we could address those problems. But I was wrong. The top environmental problems are selfishness, greed and apathy and to deal with those we need a spiritual and cultural transformation and we scientists don't know how to do that." Gus Speth, American environmental lawyer and Dean of Yale School of Forestry and Environmental Studies.
- 2. "Spirituality is the integration of our beliefs, values and actions. It draws on the wisdom accumulated in a religion and culture. Christian spirituality is shaped by Scripture, tradition and reason, and is made active through thought and prayer. Spirituality is at the heart of individuals and communities. It motivates us, addresses questions of

what we truly want for ourselves and for one another, and holds us to account... faith and spirituality are important resources to mobilise people in response to climate change and the care of God's creation".

"Sleepers Wake – Getting Serious About Climate Change" Bishop Nicholas Holtam, retired Bishop of Salisbury and former church of England lead on environmental concern

The scale of the challenge that faces us can seem overwhelming. Here's what we CAN do:

Churches are already doing a lot and our worship regularly addresses protecting God's creation and climate injustice. One thing we can all do is to think about how we can involve our communities in what we are doing.

- 1. Reduce the harmful impact of our own lives and the life of our church on the environment. Some examples of this:
- Make adjustments to our own lives that will reduce our carbon footprint and limit negative impacts on the environment. This can include promoting organisations that help reuse things rather than throwing them away, switching (if we can afford it) to products which are "environmentally friendly" or use recycled materials.
- Sign up for the Eco-Church Award scheme and publicise this in your community. Better still, get people outside the church to help.
- Calculate your church's carbon footprint. The Church of England is aiming for Net Carbon Zero by 2030 (ambitious) and has plenty of information on its website.
- 2. Encourage our communities to engage with God's creation so that they want to protect it. Some ideas are:
- Provide opportunities for the community to engage with nature locally: nature survey/children's activities in the churchyard.
- Display in church information about encouraging wildlife/ wildflowers in their own gardens.
- 3. Campaign for Climate Justice. Encourage congregations and the local community to support the campaigning work of charities such as Christian Aid, as well as raising money for them.

Raising money for the Village Hall and the new Village Meadow.

Bridge Meadow Community Area

A steering group comprising five people from the village has now been established to oversee fundraising and project management. The Village Hall (Charity 304710) will assume ownership and governance of Bridge Meadow when sufficient funds are raised to conclude its purchase, holding it in perpetuity for the benefit of the village.

At a recent village meeting residents told the steering group what they wanted from a new community area. Villagers expressed their views on various features including fencing, landscaping, recreational facilities, and the type and frequency of events.

The emerging vision the community has defined is exciting and clear. Wild flower and wildlife areas, fruit trees for a small community orchard, bird and bat boxes, children's and adult's exercise and play equipment, benches and green space for games, goalposts for 5-a-side football and a basketball net. Desired events include village picnics and fetes, a school sports day for the village school and a range of seasonal events including Christmas carols and Morris dancing in the warmer months.

The proposals have been met with excitement and enthusiasm across the community, resulting in offers of help with all aspects of the project; such as free labour for fencing, tree planting and landscaping, as well as administration, planning, design and ongoing maintenance.

For those of you who were unable to get to the meeting, we will be circulating another survey for you to have the same opportunity to have your say.





When this magazine comes out it will still be Lent, coming up to Holy Week, and we may not be feeling very joyful, we may have lost that joyful anticipation over the years, with the pressures of modern life and, maybe, with the over familiarity of the Easter story.




Bill Crowder, the author of Windows on Easter writes he has 'a great fear of the kind of overfamiliarity that can jade us and cause us to lose the wonder of the mystery of God. If this can be true of the Christmas story it is ten times that for the events of the Saviour's passion. Those moments that opened eternity for the undeserving ... must never be allowed to grow stale'. So he opens seven windows:

surprise, sin, significance, sorrow, strength, scripture and our own, giving the reader a view through to the different perspectives of eyewitnesses of the events around that very first Easter. Interesting, thought-provoking, even challenging and life transforming, this is also quick and easy to read at only 124 pages long.

This little book has been around for a few years and sadly is not available to purchase in print form in English, but it is still obtainable in English from 'you know who' as an e-book for screen or Kindle.

I'm currently enjoying another book that's been around a little while, **Risen by Angela Hunt:** perhaps you saw the film starring Joseph Fiennes, Tim Felton (years ago he played Draco Malfoy in the Harry Potter series) and Peter Firth? Both book and film are a brave, well researched and largely successful attempt to tell the resurrection story from an alien point of view. The protagonist is a Roman senior officer charged by Pilate with ensuring the



body of the controversial Yeshua is not stolen for political ends. When it goes missing his job, career, and even his life are on the line, he must hunt it down, and time is of the essence. Suffice it to say the hunt is successful and life changing.

In their very different ways both these books bring an immediacy to the Resurrection story.

May you be blessed with a Happy Easter.




