

From the Rector...

I wonder why it is that we remember in November? It can't just be because it rhymes so well:

'Remember! Remember! The fifth of November!'
Do the longer evenings with a book, an open fire, a hot chocolate, or spirit, shared with family and friends lend themselves to story telling and reminiscence? Is it that as the season comes around again we realise who is no longer here?

Long before Christianity came to our shores, the death of the year turned our ancestors' minds to the death of their honoured and loved ones. Indeed, as food became scarce and the cold became insufferable, awareness of their own mortality would have been pressed upon them. For one reason or another, the first and second of the month have become Christian festivals: All Saints and All Souls respectively. As our 6pm *Remembering Loved Ones* service on November 5th, with lighting of candles, will no doubt prove, these festivals resonate deeply with our otherwise buried sense of loss and grief. Do please make a note of this date in your diary and come along if you think it would be helpful to you. One of our local Funeral Homes may be inviting you to a similar ceremony later in the year.

You are, of course, also welcome to Armistice at 11am on the 11th of the eleventh month in the Thoroughfare, Halesworth. Together with the British Legion, we will again be marking the time when the politicians decided they would neatly end the carnage of the, so called, Great War. Then at various locations across the valley, people will gather at 10.50am (2.30pm in Halesworth) to walk to, or attend, ceremonies at war memorials, or in church, or both. These acts of remembrance add the names of those killed in action in World War II and offensive and defensive military interventions since.

'At the going down of the sun and in the morning, we will remember them'.

As these events and the work of The Pear Tree Centre and other organisations in the town attest, a problem shared is a problem halved. Death is usually a shock even if a diagnosis and subsequent decline have presaged it with some determination. It can be made all the more harrowing through lack of experience. Most of us spend most of our lives free from grief. We may have lost a pet as children, and

grandparent in early adulthood and a parent or two in middle age. Time was when most families would have suffered the death of a child or two; most streets an adult in a pit, down the mills or to tuberculosis. Yes, we often see multiple deaths on screen in boat, 'quake or train, but it can still shock when it's the local biker's fatal collision or our police officer's suicide.

Being with others and sharing our experiences, whether in a spiritual context or not can help. So, too, can being prepared. It may seem grim, but letting families and friends know whether we want to be revived, or to decline radical intervention, can help them help us in our time of need. Knowing what we may have wanted in our funeral, cremation or burial can take a weight of decision making of our loved ones' minds. If you are caring for someone who is dying, make sure you look after yourself. Usually, people take their last breath in their own time, either once every one is with them or when you pop to the toilet. When the unthinkable happens, do get in touch with a funeral home of your choice at the earliest opportunity. They are there to help arrange the details of funerals, whether you come to us as church, or go to one of our excellent officiant colleagues. Don't worry, it is not unusual for it to take some time for those feelings that they are still around, or just in the next room, to become less insistent.

Finally, just as our forebears gathered to remember their lost, they also remembered together - through their spirituality and faith - that the hard times would pass. They, with the church, lit candles of hope, feasting and celebrating in the face of cold darkness. Do join us for all, or any, of our November services to reminisce with tears and laughter, as together we warmly look forward to a brighter future.

What has your Team Vicar been up to?



As I am writing this, the Holy Land is once again gripped by turmoil and seems further away than ever from any kind of resolution. Recriminations and justifications come from all sides — everyone has had enough. If it is ever possible that anger can stop meeting anger, there may be hope of better

times ahead. At the moment that feels a long way off. This is the time of year we remember the millions of people who have died in war and conflicts around the world and continue to do so. I have faith that prayer keeps the light of hope alive in the darkest of times and places.

Closer to home, we are in the middle of a flood which seems to have taken us all by surprise – another reminder that we never know what is around the corner.

I spent the first few days of October deliberately alone and quiet: reflecting, reading, praying in confusion about what my ministry might look like after my diagnosis of MS. It was well worth the effort. I was reminded why I was so excited about being a Team Vicar here in the first place to work in the margins between our churches and communities. And while I have lots of ideas for new things and how existing things might be done differently, there is enough to be done bedding in the things I am already doing.

In terms of events, the Climate Action Conference was a great success. Hundreds of people visited the exhibition and

all three days of the conference. Ideas were shared and new connections made with numerous plans being made for future activities and events.

The Halesworth Scarecrow Fortnight saw a Mad Hatter's Tea Party set up in St Mary's with some ambitious scenery painting happening during Tots' Time. We are hoping to increase our offering to children and young people: continuing our Tots' Time every week an St Mary's, Halesworth and holding various events in our village churches especially linked to wildlife in our churchyards. We are all part of some sort of family and we are planning to offer monthly family services in Halesworth with a more relaxed atmosphere and contributions from all ages!

Christmas plans are underway and we are starting in November with the Halesworth Christmas Lights event — Santa Claus will be visiting St Mary's Halesworth again this year. We will also be entertained by the Pearly Singers at our Community Lunch on November 29th.

Halesworth Climate Action Conference review

Halesworth's first ever Climate Action Conference took place from September 29th to October 1st, with enormous success. It comprised a week-long exhibition showcasing local groups either mitigating climate change or scrutinising development that challenged climate change, to which local schools were invited to for a day; a panel discussion in the 'Any Questions' format; a day-long conference with experts in diverse fields sharing their experience; and finally, a 'What next' meeting on Sunday, in which a committed group of people proposed three future strategies.

Over 200 people came to the Friday Night Panel discussion. Over 300 people have watched the live recording on YouTube. Over 100 people came to the Saturday Conference and our website (www.halesworthash.com) had over 2,000 hits over the weekend. Both the Town Council and Blyth Valley Churches (the joint organisers) were delighted with the response, and are already planning a follow up series of events.

Under the church arches, running for a week, there were 25 individual exhibitors, showcasing local projects and a science corner. Some groups met up for the first time and connected. It was creative, with information displayed on bicycle wheels (by the Millennium Green which encompasses Sustrans Route 1), and an exhibition of photographs together with a looped film by Bill Jackson. A White Elephant encompassed Sizewell development, and LionLink's map displayed the potential effect of diverse energy developments along the Suffolk Coast. Swift calls could be heard echoing around the space. Free trees were given away by Halesworth Town Council, who were also creatively promoting 're-used banners turned into bags'. The Repair Café mended and sewed throughout the week.

On the Friday, over 100 school children and staff were creatively entertained and challenged by the Revd Alison Alder for a day.

Aided by much media attention, the church was full for the Friday night "Any Questions Panel". It was a lively discussion with "an august and impressive panel" as described by the Bishop of Edmundsbury, who Chaired with grace and knowledge. As he said at the end, the audience had made their feelings felt in many different ways.

The panel included the Secretary of State for Environment and our local MP, Dr Thérèse Coffey and Adrian Ramsay, coleader of the Green Party and standing as the Green Party candidate for the new Waveney Valley constituency. These two enjoyed a few spats particularly over high E.coli count in the Blyth river water.



Thérèse Coffey (who had earlier visited the nearby Holton Pits as she'd been supportive of their successful bid for Community Ownership Funding) praised the local community for their work to save this open space.

The Revd Dominic Doble opened the conference, setting the tone, urging us to agree to disagree with an open mind and kindness and learn from each other's diverse views.

Professor Peter Hobson was replaced at the last minute by Darren Tansley from Essex Wildlife Trust, fresh from discussing climate change with farmers along the Stour Valley.

Eight questions were distilled from many submitted. The panel included: Dr Thérèse Coffey (Secretary of State for Environment, Conservative MP for Suffolk Coastal); Darren Tansley (Essex Wildlife Trust); Adrian Ramsay (Co-leader of the Green Party); Adrian currently leads MCS Charitable Foundation which advocates for renewable energy and green homes; Professor Catherine Rowett (County Councillor for West Depwade, former Member of the European Parliament for East of England and campaigner for solar in Churches and community energy schemes); David Kemp (Environment Agency), Coastal Team Leader (coastal flood warning and resilience) "The Eastern Front of Climate Change"; Richard Rout (Suffolk County Council Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Finance & Environment); Josaih Meldrum (Cofounder of Hodmedods, a business that supports farmers as they bring diversity to their arable crop rotations).

The whole conference was captured graphically by Rebecca Osbourne. Concentrating for over six hours, she captured each speaker's message (with their portrait), in remarkable drawings.

It was an inspiring event for Halesworth Town Council and Blyth Valley Churches. It was important for the community to hear these options, to engage in this vital and life-changing conversation, to feel a part and to be informed.

Present at the conference were two representatives from Wymondham, who relayed that they're planning just such a conference for their town.

What next?

Out of the conference, three distinct groups have formed.

- 1. Halesworth Ash (An umbrella group), co-ordinated by Halesworth Town Council and Blyth Valley Churches to oversee future events and distribute information.
- 2. Halesworth Community Energy Group Steering Group has formed. Our aims would be to engage the community in measuring the thermal efficiency of our homes, developing plans to de-carbonise housing stock. We would work with existing groups in the area and take forward the environmental aspects of the neighbourhood plan. We are talking thermal imaging, insulation, air-source heat pumps. Interested? - An Open Space Group is to meet with Alan Miller to link the open spaces initiatives together and share knowledge and expertise. If anyone is interested in joining these groups or wish to start other initiatives, please let us know. We have work to do!

Dedicated duo bid farewell



A husband-and-wife team who have helped raise tens of thousands of pounds for the Pear Tree Fund are retiring after together clocking up nearly 45 years' service with the charity.

Ted and Jane Edwards stepped down as trustees of the much-loved Halesworth-based charity at the end of September.

Jane set up the charity in 1989 alongside fellow district nurses Nikki Sawkins and Barbara Kell after recognising that the families of patients who wished to die at home needed extra support. Originally called the Halesworth Community Nursing Care Fund, it provided additional care in the last days of life so that people could die in the place of their choice.

The charity expanded in 2020 when it opened the Pear Tree Centre, on land next to Cutler's Hill Surgery, which offers information, support and advice to patients with a lifechanging diagnosis, as well as their families. The development was made possible thanks to a successful £900,000 fundraising drive, with the centre now welcoming around 550 people each month.

Jane's husband Ted joined the trustees in 2012 after retiring from his job as an accountant. After developing a business case for the Pear Tree Centre, he became the project chair and helped to overcome several challenges to steer the construction work to completion.

Despite retiring, the duo remain passionate supporters of the charity, and are urging the community to continue raising money to help meet its £280,000 annual running costs.

Jane commented, "The work the charity does is incredibly important. Living with long term illness can be very lonely, financially draining and hard on family and carers. The centre is there to inform and support, as well as providing a much-needed venue to meet others, share experiences or just have fun.

"Dying in your own bed at home with the family around you is the preference of most people. That is why the extra practical support and care the Pear Tree Fund provides is so important – it can help make a sad experience emotionally fulfilling and less exhausting."

The recital began with Handel's Care Selve, which means 'come beloved', from the pastoral opera Atalanta composed in 1736, one of the sweetest pieces Handel ever wrote, and sung so delicately by Katalin.

Venanzio Rauzzini was an Italian castrato; after hearing Rauzzini's voice, Mozart wrote Exsultate, Jubilate expressly for him. In modern times the piece has been adopted by female sopranos, Exsultate Jubilate means 'rejoice and be glad.'

The recital moved onto three pieces, all about various kinds of love from intoxicating love, overwhelming love and devotion. I became distracted by the piece called Zueignung by Strauss, it means 'love's devotion'. The song spoke of the love that hurts, sometimes the love that breaks the heart, but as Vetta said, wouldn't we rather have that pain than living without love. Katalin's expressive singing captured us

Then it was Tanya's opportunity to calm things down from the explosive expressions of love that Katalin had been singing about. Tanya played her favourite piece of Beethoven - the Adagio Cantabile from Sonata Pathetique Op. 13, a very familiar piece to so many, a moment of beauty and sincerity played so majestically by Tanya on the old Rud Ibach piano in St Mary's.

The recital concluded with two arias from our diva of the day. Musetta's aria from La Boheme, also known as Musetta's Waltz. Then the tour de force, a showstopping piece to finish, a piece to test a soprano's endurance which Katalin breezed through, making it all seem so naturally easy! Glitter and Be Gay by Bernstein from Candide.

I say again WOW WOW! In what will be the tenth anniversary year of the 'Friends of St Mary's' lunchtime recitals in 2024 we will most definitely be inviting Katalin and Tanya back.

Friends of St Mary's - St Mary The Virgin Church, Halesworth - A little bit of history: 3 The Military Connection.

The Argentein family, Lords of the Manor of Halesworth (c1130-1424) give us our first military connection. The family were benefactors of the town and St Mary's with the entry to the Argentein chapel being where the organ now stands. Sir Giles Argentein (d.1283) fought and was imprisoned in Wales, soldiered in Gascony, and fought in the battle of Lewes in 1265 with Simon de Montfort. On the floor of the Lady Chapel are the ledger stones of Sir William Argentein (c1350-1418) and his wife, (moved here when the organ was installed), their brasses missing, likely removed by the iconoclast, William Dowsing. The North Porch was reputedly built by Sir William Argentein in thanks for his safe return, and that of his son, William, from the Battle of Agincourt fought on 25 October 1415.

Some 300-400 years forward and we meet Sir Benjamin D'Urban, born on 16 February 1777, and baptised in St Mary's. He was born in the house in Quay Street that later became the Temperance Hotel, where his father, John D'Urban, practised as a doctor, moving from there to Mansion House. Benjamin joined the British Army in 1793, enlisting as a cornet in the Queen's Bays at the age of 16 making rapid progress and winning numerous honours. He married Anna, daughter of William Wilcocks of Norwich, when she was 18 and he 20 and they had two children. He served with the Dragoon Guards and fought in the Napoleonic Wars, rising from Lieutenant in 1793, Captain in 1794, and Major in 1799 to Brigadier General in 1811.

After the wars he was sent to the West Indies as Colonial Governor of Antigua in 1820, Demerarra in 1824, and Guiana in 1831. From 1833, as the first Governor of the Cape of Good Hope, he was responsible for the abolition of slavery, setting



up the first Legislative Council and the annexation of Natal. Benjamin was a popular governor and Port Natal was renamed Durban in his honour in 1835; Pampoenskraal in Cape Province that had planned to use the same name, adopted the variant of Durbanville. Durban, a village in the Eastern Cape, Durban Deep, a mine on the Witwatersrand, Durban Street in Uitenhage and Durban Road in Pietermaritzburg are other places in South Africa named after him.

Anna died at Cape Town in 1843. Benjamin later became Commander-in-Chief of British forces in Canada, but riots and wintry conditions in Montreal took their toll and he died there in 1847, and was buried in the Papineau military cemetery in Montreal. His remains were moved to the Last Post National Field of Honour at Pointe Claire on Montreal Island, with D'urban and his obelisk at the centre and the graves of reinterred soldiers around it; it was re-dedicated in 1945.

Under a small ledger stone in front of the font lies Benjamin's infant brother, Charles D'Urban, born 17 March, died 4 April 1769, died aged barely three weeks. In Halesworth, the road, Durban Close, remembers the family.

Another military connection is the Johnston family, first by way of the Rifle Hall. Originally built as a theatre in 1792, it became a Volunteers' drill hall with a tablet inside reading, "This Hall was placed in trust in the year 1862 by the children of Andrew Johnston of Holton in memory of their father for the benefit of the town of Halesworth and especially of the 7th Suffolk Rifles whom for the last two years of his life he commanded". In St Mary's, a tablet at the east end of the outer north wall of the church, placed as a memorial to Andrew's son, Captain Fowell Buxton Johnston, records that the north aisle and the chapel were built and enlarged as a memorial to Andrew.

Lastly, on the same wall, is a Memorial Plaque to Andrew Johnston, son of Fowell Buxton and grandson of Andrew. Available records show that Andrew II, when he would have been just 17 years, was a private in the Royal Flying Corps in 1914 and a corporal in 1916. The record states that he was, "Accidentally killed while flying." A truncated propeller contributed by the flying club to which he belonged hangs below the plaque. Four blade propellers, with three blades truncated, were quite often used as grave marker crosses; (the propeller actually misspells his name as 'Lieut A Johnson'). His half-brother, Edward Johnston, was famed for designing the typeface used throughout the London Underground system and redesigning the famous roundel symbol.

From the Ringing Chamber

Well, the Open Day came, and went. As usual it was an enjoyable day with lots of people showing an interest, venturing up the tower to see the bells, and having a (closely-supervised) go on the end of a rope. A couple of people showed real promise, but alas do not seem to have any spare time to join us.

The Harvest season has meant lots of services at funny times, but it has given us the opportunity to ring more often, up to three times on a Sunday one week. That included a quarter peal at Heveningham in a variation of the standard Plain Bob called April Day, rather inappropriate for October but there we go. We've also rung at Chediston, Bramfield and Wenhaston, as well as ringing a quarter peal for the first Sunday Evensong at Halesworth, even though the service was taking place at Linstead! This quarter was of a commonly-rung method called Grandsire Triples, yet another first for Keith.

Our weekly practices at Blythburgh continue to be progressive, and we have rung a number of more complicated methods with some success. Everyone comes with the intention of improving, and looking back over a few weeks it is clear that everyone has. The rumours of me being a hard taskmaster are of course greatly exaggerated: nobody has broken down in tears for months, at least, not that I've noticed. 

Although very well matched in cannon power, Broke's expertise in gunnery resulted in disabling and capturing the American ship Chesapeake, despite receiving a near mortal wound to the head by a cutlass blow. Shannon's victory created a sensation in both the United States and the United Kingdom. As always, a delicious tea was enjoyed by members afterwards.



Prepare your heart for Christmas*

The shops are already preparing, pressurising us to get caught up in the material clamour of Christmas, the commercial and competitive spirit that spoils the true spirit of Christmas for many of us, believers or not. How much more important therefore to prepare, and yes, even protect our hearts for Christmas. The season of Advent (the beginning of the Church's year for the liturgically minded) provides a period for reflection, for preparation, a time to recover that thankful and joyful anticipation of our Saviour's birth. As John has written 'A commemoration of something as big as Christmas – the infinite God becoming a few pounds of human flesh - could not be allowed to just happen; people needed to be prepared for it. In Advent Christians celebrate Christ's coming in three ways. First, we celebrate His coming in history; secondly, we look to His coming again in the future; and thirdly, we look to His coming into our lives. Advent looks forward to the world being utterly changed in every way by the coming of Christ.' (God with us: 25 Advent reflections)

There are various devotional aids published every year, some for personal use, some for group study: here are a few of this year's offering – but nothing wrong with sticking to old favourites, of course, if that is part of one's own familiar (and familial!) Christmas tradition.

An Advent Manifesto: daily readings and reflections from Isaiah and Luke, by Martyn Percy This year's BRF publication. Using the lectio divina approach to passages drawn from Isaiah and Luke, the author encourages us to pray and practise that

most ancient Advent prayer, 'Come, Lord Jesus, come'.

Nearly 3000 years ago Isaiah 9v2 prophesied: "The people who walk in darkness will see a great light". Are we not in the same predicament, needing the same miracle today? How can the light of Christ illuminate this present darkness? Engaging with two great Christmas hymns: the Magnificat and



Benedictus, and rooted in the prophets, this book shows us Advent is a time to reckon with Hope from beyond, sent to the present, 'right into our present pains, panics and predicaments'



Waiting in Joyful Hope: daily reflections for Advent & Christmas 2023-2024, by Susan

An annual publication, and this one comes in a large print format too.

Based on the Lectionary readings for the Advent period, these are brief, down-toearth reflections for busy people by Catholic

writers, bringing prayer and Scripture into everyday life in a thought-provoking and hopefully lasting way.

Stick with love: rejoicing in every tongue, every tribe, every nation, by Arun Arora. (Bishop of Kirkstall in the Anglican Diocese of Leeds.)

If we are honest, we are probably too sentimentally attached to our traditional Christmas celebrations, which are wintery, northern and western: this book is a timely antidote. The author helps us consider the



biblical picture of the Church as the people of God, drawn from every tribe, every tongue and every nation. Beginning with reflections from Isaiah and Revelation, the meditations lead us on to consider the missionaries, martyrs and mystics from all over the world who light our Advent way. Themes of racial justice, hospitality and welcome are explored alongside the stories of saints from across the globe.

The title is from a quotation of that great visionary, Martin Luther King Jnr: 'I have decided to stick with love . . . Hate is too great a burden to bear'.
