May you find God's blessing of joy in Jesus through the hope of the Easter story.


With thanks to Dominic for arranging the week-long events and the team supporting him. "Holy God, holy and strong, holy and immortal, have mercy upon us".













From the Rector...

On Saturday 20th of this month there will be a St George's day parade and service in Halesworth. From 2.30pm, you are invited to join in carrying a St George Cross flag from the library, up the Thoroughfare to St Mary's. After a civic service, we will fly it from the church tower. Uniformed organisations, public employees, councillors and the King, will be thanked and celebrated. As part of Great Britain, we will remind ourselves of the British values of: democracy, rule of law, individual liberty mutual respect for, and tolerance of, people of different or no faith. It is my hope that the event will once again become an established local tradition. It is also my hope that this event will make its contribution to calling for just, open and informed politics making the case that we all ought to engage due to our collective responsibility whatever our creed, colour or name. Sadly, all too often, the English see their Patron Saint and our national flag hijacked by extremists. He shouldn't be. He was probably a Palestinian by ethnicity, a Greek by culture, a Christian by faith and a Roman soldier by trade. He was sentenced to death in Lydda for his belief. His association with dragon slaying, and whatever that may signify, is possibly a case of his identity being mistaken both for St Michael, often depicted wearing armour, and Persius associated with the death of a sea monster in local legend. He became the English Patron Saint when crusaders returned home having been moved by experiencing his veneration there.

Instead of inspiring bigotry, the symbolism associated with this complex character should be reclaimed to inspire everyone to fight against the monsters of our day. One such, our increasingly narrow national and personal perspectives. Let us put on our armour and bravely consider the woes of the land of his birth. The English/British sent Lawrence of Arabia to win the hearts of various groups to help wrest the region from the Ottoman empire. The British were later able to gift a chunk of land to a recreated Israeli state through the Balfour Declaration - resulting in the Nakba. Arming the state in self-defence lead to the current working boundaries established during the Six Day War. Today there are Anglicans and other denominations of Christians within both the ethnically Jewish and Arab Self evidently, not all Israelis support the current minority coalition government. The vast majority of Palestinians are not members of Hamas. As this year's World Day of Prayer stories from that land show, before radicalisation, people of all faiths and ethnicities had learned how to live together <www.wwdp.org.uk> We have not noticed the discovery of, and increased US-UK interest in securing, the oil and gas reserves under Gaza. We have not remembered the Ben Gurion Canal project and the awkward

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position of Gaza in relation to it. Is what we are seeing there today simply a US-UK resourced colonial land grab dressed up as support for a righteous, if murderous, crusade against kidnappers?

Whatever your views, our World War II military fought the monster of Nazism and our Lord and Saviour vanguished sin that we might be free from tyranny. So then, the church needs must prophetically remind us of our common responsibility to use that freedom. We must not allow ourselves to become corrupted by the tyranny of false or half truth. Put your armour on and see what other views there are out there. They may confirm you in your position. They may cause you to change your opinion. It is really interesting how popular *Traitors* is at the moment. This is a game show in which people win by both working together and against each other by presenting faithful or treacherous traits. The aim is to 'murder' or vote out either those deemed too perceptive or too villainous. It is an interesting study of gullibility and manipulation. Would that we learned from watching it how to discern fact from fiction in other aspects of life. For example, is it true that 'the boats' are the reason for the disastrous decline of our public services employing those we applauded during Covid. Or, is it merely a myth spread by monstrous media moguls to shield us from the truth that it may not be in our best interests not to pay taxes or shirk our responsibilities to vote for how they are spent. It is all too easy to remove from our party, church, social media feed or community, world views and people with whom we may disagree or differ. Does that make us stronger and more resilient? I fear St George would say it rather makes us the weaker and less impressive.

That brings us back to our parade to celebrate the diversity he represents in our community and country and those who serve it. May I encourage those of you who are proud to be English to join me in flying the flag of those British values of: democracy, rule of law, individual liberty, mutual respect for, and tolerance of, people of different or no faith. As we stand strong together we may slay the monster of lies, apathy and disrespect.

Dear Friends,

Well, we have just had Easter! Resurrection!

And the atmosphere of celebration continues. In church calendar terms, we still have the 2nd Sunday of Easter right up to the 6th Sunday of Easter to come, making a whole 'season of celebration'.

Perhaps that helps point to the even bigger theme that resurrection, new life in Christ, is to be celebrated for the whole of our lives?

During Lent, our Bible Studies have begun to explore the concept of 'whole of life discipleship'. We recognise that our coming to Christ is the start of a life-long journey (and beyond). We have been exploring the link between discipleship and mission, even addressing the question of whether it is possible to grow in discipleship without a context of mission?

We might grow in understanding the Bible, and in our confidence around church activities. But do we need, also, to appreciate God's purposes for the world and the part we - all believers - are called to play in it? Letting that sink in can really kick-start our spiritual growth.

One of the 'penny dropping' moments has been the realisation that we can easily think of mission in terms of overseas work, or raising funds, or indeed structured evangelism programmes. That can lead to thinking it is part of our 'spare time activity'. But, as Spirit filled disciples of Jesus, don't we carry the presence of God wherever we go? Can we grow in understanding that for all of us, our mission field is everyone we encounter in our homes and families, work places, clubs and societies, on the bus or on the street...

My prayer is that the Lord will open our eyes to His potential, through us all in the whole of life.

May we grow in such discipleship.

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What has your Team Vicar been up to?



Lent feels different every year and every year there is something new to learn. This year I was struck by the scripture for Passion Sunday, the week before Palm Sunday, as we get closer to remembering Christ's awful ordeal on the cross followed by his joyful resurrection. In the bible reading from John 12, some

foreigners ask the disciples if they can speak to Jesus. They are curious to see this person who has been causing such a stir. The disciples, unsure themselves if he will see them, ask Jesus and, as usual, he does not reply with a straightforward yes or no. Instead, he says, "The time has come for the Son of Man to be glorified" and speaks of dying in order to live.

Jesus is preoccupied by the events to come, but in the context of whether or not he will see these two strangers, it is like he is saying – if they want to see me, this is what they will see. This fulfilment of his calling on earth. It is only through his death that he can be raised into glory. This is how they will know him – this is after all how we all know him. The tough message for us is that we can only truly say we know him by acknowledging his death and resurrection. It is not just by his words and deeds but by his sacrifice once for all on the cross.

While on the cross he says a number of things, among them: Forgive them Father, they do not know what they are doing. Guiltless and suffering a most hideous death at the hands of so many who have rejected him, Jesus shows us nothing we can do is beyond God's forgiveness. We get things wrong all the time: sometimes we know better and sometimes we

don't, but we all get stuff wrong however well-intentioned we are, but we can all ask for forgiveness and strive to do better. This after all is what the cross is all about: Jesus Christ's love for all humankind, past present and future. And whatever we may think about it, however worth or not we are God loves each and everyone of us no less or more than anybody else. God is love. Simples!

These are the things I have been pondering this month, especially in terms of my own failures, one of the worst of which is pride. It has brought me pain but also joy in the consolation of God's love. I pray I will do better in passing on the consolation I have received, as I should.

Maybe my membership of the Diocese's Disability and Inclusion group will open up yet more opportunities for this. I attended my first meeting yesterday. We discussed how churches are getting more support to improve accessibility so that everyone is able to be actively involved in church. Not only addressing physical obstacles but making adjustments for neuro diversity, visual impairment, hearing loss and so on. We all have different things which make us feel included or excluded in different ways and no two people living with the same disability experiences life in the same way. We need to offer God's love in equal measure to all and do what we can to make adjustments. This may be a challenge in our medieval churches, but they need to be open to everyone; vibrant and welcoming to all. A true sacrament - God's grace made visible on earth.

If you have any ideas about what we can do to make our churches more accessible, please let me know.

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From the Ringing Chamber



When I was at primary school I got very excited (and very nervous) about taking my Grade 1 violin exam. Subsequently my parents were no doubt very pleased and proud when I received my certificate showing that I had met the required standard. A generation on and I was the proud parent when my children successfully negotiated their Grade 1 piano.

In the last 12 years the Association of Ringing Teachers, of which organisation Pete and I are members, has developed a learning scheme (unimaginatively called Learning the Ropes) whereby the stages of learning to ring have been broken down into five achievement levels. In the same way that, while lots of my contemporaries passed their Grade 1 violin, not many reached the dizzy heights of Grade 8, so it is that, while over 4,000 ringers have their Level 1 certificate under their belts, the achievement rate for subsequent levels roughly halves each time.

So I take great pleasure when our ringers move on from Level 1 (I **expect** everyone to get Level 1!). Just before she went off to university, Rosie successfully rang the quarter peal required to achieve her Level 3. Now Joanna, after ringing for less than

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a year, has passed her Level 2, and I anticipate that level 3 will follow shortly at the current rate of progress. Finally Erika has been awarded Level 5 to finish the LtR scheme altogether, the first person Pete and I have taught who has done so, and only the 251st worldwide. Congratulations to all of them!

We have continued to attempt a quarter peal at Halesworth for Evensong on the first Sunday of each month. Unfortunately we met short in March (name of the guilty available for a fee) but managed to ring a decent quarter on seven bells, leaving out the second and ringing changes on 6 with the tenor "covering" behind, not ideal but a good achievement in the circumstances.

Friends of St Mary's: St Mary The Virgin Church, Halesworth A little bit of history: 5. The Slavery Connection

A plaque on the outside of Bank House at 35 Thoroughfare in Halesworth reads: *PRISCILLA BUXTON Resident 1839 – 55.* The campaigning daughter of Thomas Buxton Brt to liberate all slaves. Married Andrew Johnston agent for Gurneys Bank on 1st August 1834 the day emancipation Act was passed.

Three monuments on the outer north aisle wall in the church commemorate members of the Johnston family. At the east end of the aisle is the monument to Andrew Johnston (1798-1862), who was elected Whig MP for the five burghs of East Fife in 1831. In 1834 he married Priscilla (1808-1852 - the plaque mentioned above is incorrect), an ardent anti-slavery campaigner and daughter of Sir Thomas Fowell Buxton MP and Hannah Gurney, and in 1839 Johnston was appointed Director of the Gurneys Turner & Brightwen Bank in Halesworth, later part of Barclays Bank. Sir Thomas Fowell Buxton piloted the Emancipation Bill abolishing slavery through to Law in 1834, assisted in this by Andrew Johnston amongst many others.

The women, daughters, wives and widows, involved in antislavery activities usually came from similar, well-to-do, middle-class backgrounds to the men, and they had to fit their efforts around their particular responsibilities – housekeeping, the direction of household servants, bringing up often large families of children, and caring for the sick and elderly, as well as, for many, some input into a family business.

Abolition of slavery was often a family concern as can be seen by Priscilla's involvement. Thomas Fowell Buxton and Samuel Gurney, amongst others, were both on the national committee of the Anti-Slavery Society, whilst their wives and

daughters tended to local ladies' associations and supportive activities of their male relatives. From 1832 Priscilla was cosecretary of the London Female Anti-Slavery Society, not being able to join the Anti-Slavery Society, part-founded by her father, which was only open to men. She was her father's confidante, later described by abolitionist George Stephen, as 'guardian angel' to Buxton, 'his secretary, his librarian, his comforter, and often as his adviser and guide'.

Women were not allowed to view proceedings in the Houses of Parliament and Priscilla could only hear her father speak via a ventilation shaft! However, women could raise petitions and, in 1833, Priscilla helped to organise one of the first, 187,000 signatures against slavery. It was the largest ever abolitionist petition and took two people to carry it, but was nevertheless laughed at in parliament. Her husband and her father lost their seats in the 1837 election.

A little after her wedding in 1834, at a reception for men to celebrate the emancipation of slaves, a toast was raised to Priscilla, 'that she might long rejoice in the fetters put on that day as well as over those which she had assisted to break'! Priscilla and Andrew had four children. They were parents of MP Andrew Johnston and grandfather of designer Edward Johnston (the son of his younger son, Fowell Buxton Johnston). Edward Johnston, was famed for designing the typeface used throughout the London Underground system and redesigning the famous roundel symbol.

Have you noticed the stone carving of an African head on the exterior of the south aisle? Is it a reminder of the abolition of slavery?

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


HALESWORTH WI

Members listened attentively as David Wollwebber told us of Halesworth in the 1840s. It appeared to be completely self-sufficient with bakeries, butchers, cobblers, watchmakers, tailors etc. Halesworth did not come high on the list of having a majority of law abiding citizens compared to nearby towns, we obviously were more lawless in those days, perhaps this was not helped by the numerous public houses situated around the town. We, unlike today had banks, there were many places of work and most transport was by foot or horse

We looked forward to our next meeting a slideshow of the Galapagos Islands and were not disappointed as Chris Parfitt told us of his trip to Ecuador and something of that country, we were amazed to learn that most of the roses we buy are grown there then sold







through the flower markets in Holland. Ecuador is on the equator, having many volcanoes most now extinct but which supply excellent soil for growing crops, some transported to market using llamas which are still used as pack animals. The sunrises at 6am and sets at 6pm every day. We saw the making of the famous panama hats and a wide variety of local beautiful crafts. We then moved on to the 12 Galapagos Islands, which lay 600 miles off shore, he was only able to visit four during his trip and numbers allowed are limited so as not to disturb the wildlife. You have to follow the paths and not wander as the wildlife is unused to modern life and is completely tame, No interaction is allowed with the animals or birds which is very difficult as they tend to approach people. Seals lay across paths, iguanas bask in the sun and giant tortoises lumber past. There are seven different Darwin finches and three booby birds, blue footed, red footed and masked, tame enough to sit in a bush, when you pull back the branch to inspect them they remain seated and unafraid.



A wonderful eulogy was read by Lindsay, his niece, who not only gave a moving, touching and humorous portrait of a real 'character', but also played traditional tunes on the squeezebox accordion as Reggie was brought into the church and as he was committed to his final resting place. Thanks to all involved in organising this memorable occasion in village life, including a cortege of three tractors from Wissett to Spexhall. Woodpecker thinks they were all Massey Fergusons, but not quite sure of that.

Memories abounded at the wake in memory of a hard working family who had been in the area for generations. May Reggie, and his family, rest in peace.



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
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Waste not, want not and the healthy life

Last week I diligently counted every piece of plastic used before sending it to the recycling bin or the outright rubbish bin, and I expect many of you did too. This count was initiated in 2022 by an organisation called Everyday Plastic together with Greenpeace and in just one week 6.5 million pieces were counted by a quarter of a million households, the amount collected by every household in the country is horrible to contemplate, especially as only 12% was actually recycled, so as Greenpeace reported "our findings made it clear: recycling can't fix the plastics crisis", there is just way too much being manufactured every day. It will be interesting to see whether this year's count shows an improvement or a worsening of this national situation, and it's to be hoped The Global Plastics Treaty currently being negotiated at the UN will take notice of the data.

But there is another waste disaster that we can individually do more about. At a time when so many have to rely on foodbanks, where there is famine in much of the world caused by climate change and war and commercial greed, it is a shame and a scandal that a **third** of worldwide food production goes to waste. Maybe that's why a review of this very new book caught my eye.




Leftovers: a history of food waste and preservation, by Eleanor Barnett

How did we become so wasteful? Mrs Beeton thought it was becoming a (moral) problem in the 1860s and during the World Wars when rationing was introduced the wilful wasting of food fit for human consumption was illegal.


Leftovers links its central historical focus to humanitarian and environmental issues of urgent

contemporary interest - including climate change, globalisation, scientific advancement, poverty and inequality. And surely it fits in with the church's eco-drive.

But how do we find the head and heart space to live more simply and thoughtfully? A good place to start might be **The Ruthless Elimination of Hurry, by John Mark Comer,** helpfully subtitled 'How to stay emotionally healthy and spiritually alive in the chaos of the modern world'. I love this book, every easy-to-read paragraph is quotable and just what I need. Hurry sickness, according to the author leads to irritability, hypersensitivity,



restlessness, non-stop activity, emotional numbness, out-of-order priorities, lack of care for your body, escapist behaviours, slippage of spiritual disciplines, and as a consequence we miss out on closeness to God, and with everyone else, leading to isolation. Among other gems the author recommends four practices for unhurrying your life: silence and solitude, sabbath, simplicity, slowing; what's within those practices is a wealth of wisdom for good living, for example too much "stuff" adds to the clutter and stress in your life; shopping should be intentional with thought given to how much harm it is causing to society, the climate, the individuals making the goods.



Intentional interruptions, by Jonathan Thomas. In a way this could be a companion to Comer's book above, indeed the author does reference Comer from time to time. Sub-titled 'learning to be interrupted the way God intended', it could be said to be for those like me too easily distracted by stuff, the world, rambling thoughts, to-do lists etc., that God's interruptions are missed. As one reviewer said

"... a gentle nudge from a friend to allow yourself to pause in your own plans to wonder at God's world... and to reconnect meaningfully with your Lord" This book will be in Sign of the Fish.




