# THE SERVICE OF CLIPPING — ST ANDREW'S WISSETT, SHROVE TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 13th, 7pm

The word "clipping" is Anglo-Saxon in origin, and is derived from the word "clyppan", meaning "embrace" or "clasp". Clipping may well have its origin in the mists of time, well before Christianity came to this island. We can imagine ancient pagans linking arms in a wide circle around a sacred site, but perhaps the intention was to contain and confine a fearsome pagan deity rather thank show affection for a sacred place!

In clipping, as in many things, the Christian Church took over, adapted and 'baptised' this ceremony. Clipping is known of in some places up to Reformation times, but would certainly have been denounced by Puritans, along with Christmas and other festivals, as being far too much fun!

Clipping was revived in Victorian times, and takes place in different ways according to the tradition of particular places. Now it is seen as the whole community embracing their church building, the House of God, in which generations have worshipped, been baptised, married and buried.

In some traditions, people link hands in a very large circle around the church, encompassing as much of the churchyard as possible, and perform a circle dance (again of Pagan origin!) whilst singing. Historically, church clipping often involved a chain dance including 'threading the needle' where the line of dancers goes


under the arch made by the leading couple, a larger version of some of the barn dances we still do today.

Those gathered at the clipping ceremony, are asked to embrace St Andrew's church, where prayer is still valid, which speaks to all who live near it of the things of the Spirit, of One who is almighty and everlasting, who reaches out to humankind in tenderness and love.

Please come and join us for the Clipping Service at St Andrew's Wissett, one of only a few churches still to enjoy this old custom.

After the service, as is the tradition, pancakes and light refreshments will be available.



### From the Rector...

Apart from our regular worship this month; as usual, we have two seasonal specials on offer. Both in the same week, these are:

7pm, 13th, Shrove Tuesday, Clipping Service, St Andrew's, Wissett

6pm, 14th, Ash Wednesday, Holy Communion with Ashing, St Mary's, Halesworth

They are both very topical and helpful as we look at the signs of the times. This may surprise you as you may think church is irrelevant and the vicars should keep out of politics. Let's take a step back and unpack some of what these services are about and then come back to that in a bit.

Even today, our Morning Prayer reading was from Chapter One of Genesis. That's right that first book in the Hebrew scriptures which says God made everything in six days. Whether you need it to be literal or are happy for it to be metaphorical, the key messages in the end are the same. They are: spirituality is part of creation, and as humans are part of creation, spirituality must be part of our DNA. It is a religious text so that shouldn't surprise us. And: we all have responsibility for it all. You may believe we have responsibility because we are called to it by God. Or you may know it as someone who can see the consequences of our cutting the branch on the trunk side of where we are sitting. Either way we must surely agree we are culpable.

That collective spirituality and common responsibility or reliance is what these two acts of worship are about. The Clipping Service is a traditional acceptance that we are the church and the church is us. Or as our benefices motto has it: we are church in community and community in church. A part of the ceremony is to form a human shield around the St Andrew Parish Church building. Holding it safe. Acknowledging our responsibility for it as community at this time having had that charge passed on to us by those who have gone before and entrusted to us by those who are yet to be. It is simply not possible for one person, or the few on the committee to do that practically, liturgically, let alone legally, financially and so on and so on. Part of our response to that collective consciousness of care is to celebrate together our realisation that we can give up our demands and our striving for stuff, ease, attention, exemption. We eat pancakes to use up our store cupboard ingredients before Lent. It is the second of our annual Christian fasts, observed in preparation for the feast of the resurrection, Pasch or Easter. This demonstrates that we have chosen not to consume all we can but to consider the consequences for our community and all creation for those who do. It's not just the church that we have a spiritual connection with, responsibility for and reliance on but the world it represents in time and place - and beyond.

This leads us on to Ash Wednesday. It seems that there are two types of people today. Those who care and those who don't Though I don't claim to understand how it works, I know it does: Holy Communion, offers those who dare to care a place to nail their colours to the mast. We literally kneel or stand together to demonstrate our acceptance or belief that Jesus was right to die for what he believed in. He showed that unless we have faith to heed the messaging of the activists or prophets we will not get up. If we do not get up and get out of our comfort zones we will remain enslaved to those whose wealth is notionally based on futures' value in the face of global insecurity. Sufficient to buy but not for tax. Crusading to colonise but not for country. We'll die waiting for trickle down, levelling up, net zero, or for the boats to stop. Ash Wednesday, sort of bookends Lent, over against Maundy Thursday. The liturgy compels, and allows, us to spiritually accept our collective responsibility, by each individually receiving a mark on our foreheads of burnt palm crosses to the words: 'Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return. Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ.'

If we can step back – get out of our silos – and participate in these acts of connection with 'The Name' we may find the inspiration and strength not blame others for our woes. We may find ourselves not so ready to blindly accept that woke protestors or the Hunt, Israelis or Hammas, sub-postmasters or Horizon IT, are the sole reason we are not happy. Lent is prime time to reflect on our acceptance that together we do have enough if only we are prepared to share our spiritual responsibilities.

### What has your Team Vicar been up to?

January, the month where advertising moves from "Go on, you know you want to!" to "New Year, new you!" while faced with the cold damp grey months ahead. Happily, we have had some sunshine and I myself am rather partial to a cold, crisp, bright day. I had a week off which was welcome, but I am

not sure how rested I felt on coming back to work.

It feels like I am simply not getting things right yet. It has been a major readjustment since being diagnosed with MS and just when I think I have found my new normal I get overexcited, overdo it and end up back at square one. I think it's during holidays when I feel most disabled. I can't walk as far, do as much, visit as many interesting places and whatever I do takes its toll.

The fact is that I have a limited energy budget, so I need to choose carefully what I want to spend it on. And there needs to be a balance between ministry, family-time, self-care and social-time. It all takes energy. There are a number of helpful analogies around, such as the spoon theory or the phone-battery charge. You wake up each day with a certain number of spoons or a certain level of battery charge and you can decide how to use them before running out. I find the spoon theory more useful because once you have used up a spoon, no amount of rest gives you more spoons, it just stops using up the spoons you would otherwise be using.

### Walk the Way of the Cross with the Blyth Valley Churches this Easter!

This Spring, the churches of the Blyth Valley are giving you the opportunity to visit the Holy Land without leaving Suffolk! Across their fourteen churches they are presenting an exhibition of original paintings by nationally acclaimed, local, religious artist Iain McKillop. These Stations of The Cross focus the attention of visitors on the last known movements of Jesus, among them; his mock trial, him meeting women in the crowds and his execution.

During the Crusades, Europeans visited the Holy Land and discovered the actual places they had previously only read about in accounts of Jesus' final hours.

This was such a moving experience that upon their return the practice of Stations of the Cross arose. It involves the setting

up of images anticlockwise around a building, so that worshippers may travel virtually with these early pilgrims and their saviour.

The Queens Head, Blyford, will be open afterwards so people may stay and buy refreshments. A copy of each of the images will be prayerfully presented in each of the fourteen churches of the benefices for the following week. From 7.30pm on Friday 22nd March, the artist lain McKillop will talk about his creative encounters with the Stations concept. Again, refreshments may be purchased at the Queens Head afterwards.

On Saturday 23rd March Team Rector, Dominic Doble, and colleagues will lead a pilgrimage presenting a short contemplation at each parish church in the benefices.

'It is always a joy and a challenge to be confronted by beautiful art work that explores difficult aspects of life' writes Bishop Mike. 'I am so grateful to lain for his remarkable Stations of the Cross sequence. He says he 'looks forward to offering some thoughts alongside these images to honour the injustice, isolation and pain of our own experiences.'

Iain McKillop said 'It has been special creating a new Passion series for my local parishes, hoping that neighbours can find through them, meaning in Christ's self-offering, which reaches into their own lives and the world in which we live today.'

All fourteen churches in the Blyth Valley are open during daylight hours. There is no charge for any of these events. However, our church committees are grateful for your generosity towards maintaining the parochial ministry that underpins events such as this.

### A Healthy Church is a Happy Church





Who doesn't love a church wedding, church as a jazz band venue, singing carols at Christmas, or using the building for a clothes swap? If you don't this isn't for you! Only the other day, someone said they felt strongly that churches were not just for Christians. ### No faith in fossil fuels!

Jim and Sue Green, of St Mary's Halesworth, are giving up some of their time during Lent for a 10-day climate justice prayer vigil outside the Houses of Parliament, and at home, and possibly at one of the Blyth Valley churches if there is interest.

The event – which will run around-the-clock from February 14th-24th - has been organised by a coalition of charities including A Rocha UK, Christian Aid, Christian Climate Action, Green Christian, Operation Noah, the Salvation Army and Tearfund.

Starting on Ash Wednesday, Jim and Sue from Halesworth will be joining others taking part in the vigil at Westminster, as well as in their homes and churches.

Jim said: "I feel very strongly climate justice is something we should all be taking action on, and none more so than those with the power to create worldwide change and bring justice for our global neighbours.

"People in the world's poorest countries have done the least to contribute to the climate crisis and yet are paying the harshest price. We need bold action now – we need the Government to make the UK's biggest polluters pay for climate action; deliver and build on the UK's international climate finance pledges as well as pay into the UN's Loss & Damage Fund; and ban new UK-based fossil fuel projects."

People will be holding vigil and praying 24 hours a day for 10 days outside Parliament to highlight the call for politicians to Make Polluters Pay. Those praying at church are also encouraged to invite their MP to a meeting or service.





We manage well with the sweeping and dusting, decorating with flowers, no incense but sometimes the smell of polish spray left in the air.

I wonder if George Herbert knew of Church Clipping? Quoting from "The Country Parson" again he advises to be, " a Lover of old Customes, if they be good and harmlesse."

As the cover article of this month's *BVTimes* reports, Clipping is certainly an old custom and the word is Anglo Saxon in origin, derived from "Clyppan", meaning to embrace or clasp. To clip the church is to encircle, embrace, hug

The tradition of Clipping is rare. Wissett revived it in 1998, I believe, and has carried it on.

# Friends of St Mary's - St Mary The Virgin Church, Halesworth - A little bit of history: 4. The Clerical Connection: Part 3

Our next clerical connection is Robert Edward Hankinson (1798-1868), from a family of clerics, who studied, as did his two brothers, at Cambridge. After several curacies, he became rector at Halesworth cum Chediston 1850-1863, also through the patronage of Elizabeth Badeley. He officiated at the marriage of his daughter, Marion, with Revd Samuel Blois Turner, previously described who mounted the John Browne brasses at the church. Revd Hankinson instituted many of the changes made to the church building, including restoration of the chancel, replacement of the highbacked pews, removal of the north and south galleries, rebuilding of the outer north aisle and replacement of the inner north aisle roof; he himself gave the glazing for the new aisle windows. The railway came to Halesworth during Revd Hankinson's time, and a little point of interest is that on 13 March 1959 he baptised George Lansbury, the son of a railway timekeeper, who was born in Halesworth and went on to become an MP and led the Labour Party 1932-1935.

After this restoration, the service at the re-opening of the church was conducted by Revd Vincent Stanton (1817-1891) who succeeded Revd Hankinson as rector. Revd Stanton also studied at Cambridge; he worked as a tutor in China, was imprisoned for four months by the Chinese during the Opium War and served as the first colonial chaplain of Hong Kong until ill-health brought him back to Britain. He was rector of Halesworth cum Chediston from 1863-88.

Revd Stanton was followed by the Revd Abbot Roland Upcher (1849 -1929), again the son of a cleric and who followed his father to Cambridge, where he was known for his sporting prowess. Ordained in 1874, and after various curacies he was inducted at Halesworth cum Chediston in 1889, where he and his wife, Alice née Winstanley, added two sons to their family of four daughters. Whilst Revd Upcher was at Halesworth, even more restoration was carried out, including preparation

for the installation of the present organ in the former chantry chapel of the Argentein family in 1893. In 1889 the curious Dane Stones were found in three broken sections behind rubble inside the old chancel arch; they have been dated as late 9th-century, possibly from the Saxon church which stood on the site at the time of the Norman Conquest. They have been interpreted as hands grasping leafy boughs to ward off evil, and may be part of a cross shaft, but, if rearranged, bear a striking resemblance to figures of mermen grasping double tails found, particularly around fonts, in other churches. Revd Upcher had them randomly re-set on the south side of the altar under the credence table where they can be puzzled over today. And, a little aside, Upcher is also remembered, as a keen angler, for the invention of the 'Upcher Fly'!






# Happy and Blessed, or Strength in Weakness?


February already, "Christmas" has been packed away for another year for nearly a month, and new year's resolutions probably forgotten for nearly as long. I always feel a little... sad? flat? deflated? when the twinkling lights around town and in the home go out, how lovely it would be if we could remember the light of the world a little longer, throughout January as did our ancestors who didn't take down their Christmas greenery until Candlemas, 40 days after Christmas (February 2nd), when they commemorated the presentation of the infant Jesus at the Temple in Jerusalem; but after all we are modern and cannot afford the electricity, and have to worry about our carbon footprint, and 21st Century everyday life has to go on!

For many Christians part of the rhythm of everyday life, apart from church attendance and personal devotions is meeting regularly with Christian friends in fellowship groups (aka home groups) to study the Bible in more depth. We are studying The Beatitudes, (with the help of) eight reflections exploring the countercultural words of Jesus in Matthew 5 by Beatrice Smith: by January we had reached verse 5, blessed are the meek, or humble, depending on which translation one is using. The original New Testament Greek word was praus, which has no direct equivalent in English and is much more nuanced than either "meek" or "humble", both of which have changed in emphasis since the 17th century, so we had plenty to chew over and discuss, certainly there is nothing wishy-washy, weak or passive in the concept. If we are to emulate Jesus "servant leadership" may give a better idea of the qualities required, which leads me neatly on to the very readable Lead like Jesus, by Ken Blanchard et al. (there is a copy in Sign of the Fish bookshop). Anyone who has been on a management course at work has probably come across Ken Blanchard's work and theories: I was enormously encouraged, somewhat late in the day (I have been retired quite a while now!) to learn Blanchard has found that all successful leadership characteristics are modelled on the leadership style of Jesus. In our success-oriented world we are expected to "sell" ourselves, to "big ourselves up": this is neither humble not meek, nor will it bring the blessing of an

abundant life, as **Pete Portal** explains in his recent book **How to be (un)successful: an unlikely guide to human flourishing.** This comes highly recommended by a friend who received a copy for Christmas, and I'm looking forward to reading it myself, meanwhile the author has written an article with the same title for the January issue of **Christianity** magazine, giving some of his back story.


