Next year's Lammas Festival is already being planned!





Blyth Valley Times From the Rector...

Once upon a time I used to attend a Baptist house group in my village. The Anglicans in Cottenham didn't meet on regular weekday evenings for prayer, study and support. One of their teenage members asked me why my denomination built their worship spaces in graveyards! I could have said "We didn't, they are only there because so many people do themselves to death getting into a state about them!"

His question actually opens guite a can of worms for any organisation that is out there in the public square. Does it walk the talk? The church is supposed to love its neighbour as itself as an expression of the love of God incarnate. If we start there, what are we doing making visitors walk through the rain drenched gothic horror of zombies and screeching owls to get to whatever event or respite they are seeking? Who knows whether church buildings in the valley here are open to visitors, morning to evening, seven days a week - as a rule? Who has even noticed that there is a church there at all? Who knows when the next service is? Once we arrive. can we find peace to sit? Can we find information about our great, great aunt or what that doorway halfway up the wall is all about? Is there a number to help us escape slavery or address it? Some places are offering books and school uniforms to buy, swap or borrow, alongside some simple refreshments. What would encourage you to return to visit, worship, seek or give support when you retired, got a new relationship or job in an area, if you were to visit a church somewhere?

Of course there are many who actually find that the particular character of churchyards, specifically, offer just the right environment to rest in peace. This character is primarily secured by the Diocese, or county-level, agreed regulations. They basically limit the stones to headstones and flat tablets in natural unpolished stone matching the church. Any vases built into the design, given approval, must only support cut flowers and not plastic ones. No other mementoes are allowed. Aside from the stones then, there should only be natural grassland and trees. The tiny overstretched Parochial Church Councils (PCCs) are independent charities made up of two or three of your neighbours who jointly own the land as trustees. Each PCC must maintain a burial register and plan of the graves as part of its terrier. They may also have responsibility for management of the churchyard. However, if the churchyard is full and so called 'closed', then East Suffolk steps in. Across all our churchyards, our aim is to maintain a balance of naturalness and accessibility that respects personal and public expectation. Ideally, someone on the committee will have the headspace to deal with the churchyard. Ideally, there will be a PCC-approved zoned plan made in consultation with the village and the Suffolk Wildlife Trust.

This ought to stipulate that the whole will be cut and raked at least once a year. While, some areas, such as around visited graves and paths to them, ought to be kept accessible at all times. Ideally, there will be funds to pay for works. The aim of all this is to maintain the unique character of churchyards against public cemeteries. As you can see, we frequently and often ask ourselves - Why did we build our churches in graveyards?!

So coming back to my teenage friend, in fact, the fullest answer would probably have been that the graves are there for the same reason the church building is. The location may have been used to connect with the transcendent since forever, due to a mixture of social, spiritual and physical These may include trading practice, land attributes. allotment, alignment, energy, height, and or springs. The ancients would have met en plein air under the heavenly bodies. Stone and earth, then wooden structures would have been replaced in time by the inspiring Norman and later architectural styles that we see today. Bones, bodies and ashes of at least the brightest and best that belonged, would have been placed in or near those special places as expressions of their being given over the care of those topside.

We would welcome your views and opinions on our management of these privately-owned, publicly valued spaces. We would be pleased to receive any contributions you may feel able to make in terms of your time, talents and money.

We would love to meet you at gift days, on working parties or at one of our PCC meetings. Do keep in touch, keep the faith and enjoy the space.





HERITAGE OPEN DAY 16th September 2023



This year's theme for the Heritage Open Days is "Creativity Unwrapped" and the Friends of St Mary's church (FOSM) will be putting on a wide-ranging display of creative talents, together with several live performances and demonstrations. Please come along to the church to sample these between 10am and 5pm on Saturday 16th September. Note there is only one day this year. Tea and coffee will be available.

Static displays will show photography and art from Bungay High School; art from members of Artbox at Chediston and Mencap; linocuts and handmade books inspired by nature from Lark Images (Chris and Valerie Wheeler); photos from Halesworth and Beccles Camera Clubs, with some prints made into cards to buy; colourful royal heraldry from 1066 to 2023, to celebrate the recent Coronation; and a rolling slide show of local artist, writer and eminent philatelist Gerald King's "Alice Through the Pillarbox" stamp designs. The Knit and Natter Group who meet at the library will put on a display of work and publicity material or may hold a session during the day.

2pm; at 2pm Gerald King will talk and answer questions about his Alice book; and at 3pm Alan Greening, an architect who recently made an inspection of the church, will give a brief talk on the effect of rainwater on the walls which has to be dealt with before regeneration can be taken further.

Do come along on September 16th and admire and/or try the varied creative talents of so many local people.

Celebrating Pastoral Ministry in Blyth Valley Churches



At our Team Service at the end of July, we celebrated all that is going on to care for people in our congregations and wider communities. Here are some extracts from the talk given at that service:

"The Church in the UK today sees its communities experiencing complex problems. Rising poverty, financial insecurity, mental health issues, anxiety about the climate crisis, isolation and the pressure on vital health and social services make it seem as though we are facing an overwhelming tide of need. All of this is happening at a time when many in our own congregations are learning to adjust to the challenges of growing older, especially going from providing help, to needing assistance themselves. How are churches in the Blyth Valley Team responding to this complex picture?


Perhaps the most important thing we are doing is carrying on with what we have always done: seeing someone in need and offering help. The simplest acts can make all the difference to someone who is isolated and struggling: a chat over the phone, a cup of tea in the garden, a card to show we are thinking of someone and praying for them. Picking up shopping or medication, taking someone to a hospital appointment, are practical ways we help someone who is no longer able to do these things for themselves.

The leaflet that the Pastoral Ministry Group has produced celebrates how vital this work is. It also draws attention to the importance of recognising when somebody's needs are becoming too great for their friend or neighbour to manage. The leaflet provides



information about local organisations that can offer support. It also gives advice about what to do if you are worried about someone's deteriorating health or their safety. Clergy and members of the Pastoral Ministry Team are happy to offer advice and support."

In September, every member of our congregations will receive a copy of "A Guide to Pastoral Ministry in the Blyth Valley Team". Copies will also be made available in all our church buildings and sent to local support organisations. The Pastoral Ministry Group will also be compiling a prayer list of people for the Blyth Valley Team and we will pray for the people on the list at our monthly meetings. 

HALESWORTH STATIONERS AND ART SUPPLIES



Friends of St Mary's - St Mary The Virgin Church, Halesworth - A little bit of history: 1. The Schools Connection

Over the years there have been many interesting connections between the people of Halesworth and St Mary's. These are such as the obvious, the clergy, and the less obvious, medical and legal for example, and the, perhaps, unexpected, like slavery. Many of these can be teased out from the book by Michael and Sheila Gooch, *The People of a Suffolk Town:* Halesworth 1100 - 1900, others by wider research.

Gooch takes us back to the time of John Argall (c.1542– c.1609), Rector of Halesworth from 1580 until his death. On 2 February 1580, and again in 1582, Argall recorded the presence of Mr Henry Cocke, Schoolmaster, in the Communion Book. In about 1587, Thomas Popson (b.1532) took over the school, followed by George Kinge, described in Bishop Redman's *Visitation* as "He teacheth a schole".

In the vestry of St Mary's is a worn memorial slab, "In Memory of Henry Kifford Clerk late Rector of Dennington. Prudence his Wife was buried .. 1752 .. 1719". Gooch research found that Kifford was granted permission on 17 April 1704, "...teach boys the art of reading, writing and the rudiments of grammar, within the Archdeaconry of Suffolk".

Moving forward we come to Thomas Tangueray (1763-1841); born in Tingrith, Beds, to parents of Huguenot descent who were gold and silversmiths, he opened a school in Gothic House in Halesworth sometime before March 1798. The Ipswich Journal, 6 July 1799, carried the advertisement: "At Mr Tangueray's school in Halesworth young gentlemen are instructed in the Greek Latin and English languages and the useful branches of the mathematics. The vacation will terminate on 15th July. N.B. The number of pupils is limited to 24 boarders." By 1809 ill health led Tanqueray to enter the church; a notice in St Mary's on 19 November 1809, witnessed by Isaac Avarne the Rector, William Nichols and John Hatcher, churchwardens, amongst others, read, "Thomas Tanqueray of the same parish schoolmaster did intend to offer himself as candidate for Holy Orders at the ensuing ordination and that no objection was alledged".

Tanqueray's school was briefly taken over by a Mrs Parker of Norwich, and then, by 1816, Joseph Harvey (1797-1861) had set up his Academy. The gravestone in the churchyard, of Joseph's first wife, Mary, can still be read, "Mary, the Wife of



Joseph Harvey died Augst 16th 1830 : Aged 38 Years."; it lies next to the eastern footpath where it could have been seen from Gothic House. The school flourished, taking boarders as well as day pupils. Harvey developed other business interests, including as a coal and timber merchant and owner of a ship, *Iron Duke*. He ran into some financial difficulties, but by 1850 had moved out of Gothic House and re-opened the school in what is now Castle House, Holton Road.

Harvey also became involved with the Independent church in Halesworth, and was one of the committee formed to manage the building of the chapel which is now the United Reformed Church in Quay Street. Joseph was succeeded at the school by his son, also Joseph, and an advertisement in 1864 in the *Halesworth Times* announced his plan to open, "A preparatory school for young gentlemen of 6-9 years of age." Joseph, the son, also continued in the Independent movement, moving with several others to form a Free Independent Church, when a disagreement broke out, meeting first at Castle House and then in the Corn Hall behind the Angel Inn, until the factions were reunited at Quay Street in 1877.

In December 1850, the Mechanics Institute was established in Quay Street and contained, "...an excellent Library and is well supplied with periodical literature of the day." It was renamed, Halesworth Institute for Moral and Intellectual Improvement in 1870, with some 1500 volumes in the library, along with a recreation room of games and pastimes; the Revd V J Stanton, Rector, and Revd R R Young were Chairman and Secretary respectively. In 1891 there were 95 members.


The Suffolk Directory of 1879 notes, "...in the Rectory lane is a school for girls & infants, erected by the inhabitants of the town in memory of Priscilla, wife of the late A. Johnston esq; Miss Lucretia Agnes Hughes & Miss Lucy Bird, mistresses." Built in 1853, the building still there today, 300 pupils attended in 1891 with an average attendance of 276 in 1912. We shall read more of Priscilla and the Johnstone family in a subsequent article.

Finally, Mary (1810-1887) and Fanny Crabtree (1814-1890) are remembered in St Mary's west stained glass window. Sisters of John Crabtree, who endowed a memorial home in memory of his wife, the sisters sold the land on which the Patrick Stead Hospital was built to the trustees for a modest £200. They also contributed to the building of the Town Room in the Market Place, where a Men's Adult School, intended to give the illiterate the opportunity for betterment, met on a Sunday morning.



WORLD SPECIAL OLYMPICS

These are games for all ages with intellectual difficulties (Simon's being autism) which allows athletes to compete against others of a similar standard in their field, irrespective of age.

Simon, a gymnast, travelled with the GB team of 82 athletes representing 17 sports. A week of activities and entertainment was arranged, where competitors from all over the world met before the games opened, with the typical parade of teams entering the Olympic Stadium.

Simon performed his routine in front of assessing judges, who checked every competitor was in the correct grading for ability. He caused a bit of a headache for the judges as he was too good for the younger age group, so he was put into the highest grading for his ability, where the other competitors were all adults.

Chris and Helen, along with Simon's mum and other GB members, watched him perform on parallel bars, high bar, floor exercise, vault, pommel horse and rings, without knowing that he had two large open blisters on his hand. Due to the complex scoring, they had to wait until the award presentations later to find out that he won three silver, three bronze and silver overall!

Back in July we welcomed over 40 people to our churchyard for a Moth survey and breakfast. It was fantastic to see people from far and wide including numerous excited children who were totally engaged with the topic for the whole morning.

On hand to guide us through the 100 or so moths that had been trapped was Matthew Deans. overnight, Suffolk's very own moth expert. Of the 2,500 species of moths recorded in the UK our trap revealed 30 different species, the majority being Common and Scarce Footman. Much to everyone's delight there were also several large moths, including; Elephant, Popular and Eyed Hawk moths. These are about two inches long with a three inch wingspan. Matthew also showed us a Waved Black moth which he had caught earlier in the day from the Wilderness reserve. It was the first of its kind to have been found on

the estate and only the sixth that Matthew had seen in over 30 years of moth study.

Regeneration of St Mary's Church, Halesworth Exhibition of Proposals


Saturday 9th Sept – Sunday 1st Oct 2023

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



As well as the revolutionary forms for which nineteenth-century music is usually known, there were some kinds of music which had much greater continuity with their immediate past.


These included solo and chamber music for guitar, social music with guitar, flute and voice as well as repertoire for the salon or concert.
