



From the Rector...

Recently, our second readings in Morning Prayer were from Paul's second letter to the Corinthians. These are some verses from chapter 10:

'I myself, Paul, appeal to you by the meekness and gentleness of Christ – I who am humble when face to face with you, but bold towards you when I am away! ... Look at what is before your eyes. If you are confident that you belong to Christ, remind yourself of this, that just as you belong to Christ, so also do we. Now, even if I boast a little too much of our authority, which the Lord gave for building you up and not for tearing you down, I will not be ashamed of it.' (New Revised Standard Version)

A number of his writings have been collected into his letters to the Corinthian church. The first is mainly upbeat and educational as you may expect as sent to a newly formed group wowed by his novelty and strangeness. However, those writings presented as the second letter are much more fractious and address authority, independence and expected behaviour. At this point he has settled into being a travelling preacher-man with congregations across what we now call Turkey, Greece and Italy.

As with any private, public or voluntary organisation running across many sites, when the boss is away we may be grumpy because we feel unimportant, but when they are present we may mumble because we have to toe the corporate line. Then there are other members of the Senior Leadership Team who may muddy the waters with their characters, preferences and allegiances – present or otherwise. This may, understandably, be no less true in multi-parish benefices such as ours at the Blyth Valley.

Here, we have fourteen Parochial Church Councils. Eighty plus years ago, each of which would have had their own full time Church Commissioner funded vicar. Today we share two between us – alongside a number of able, trained and experienced ministers who give their time for free. Not only that but, despite our best efforts, we can generally only pay half to three quarters of what is now being asked of us to sustain their posts. Eighty plus years ago, the town and villages would have been almost entirely Church of England and electoral rolls and numbers standing for the committee and posts on it would have made voting a necessity. Now we are covering about seven Churchwarden vacancies and about the same number of Treasurers. To be properly effective we could really do with doubling the capacity of most of our committees. Do get in touch if you are in a position to help!

To address this centrally our church now funds projects such as Lightwave in this Diocese and training to support clergy. During September I attended a residential Diocesan training event. We were sent a paper beforehand on Qualities and Responsibilities of an Incumbent leader. It included the sentence:

'The Incumbent is the focus for the vision, unity, and transformation of the benefice, discerning and articulating a common vision and determining the theological priorities that underpin a variety of missionary outward focused congregations witnessing and serving all.'

I thought it interesting to compare that with an excerpt from the ordination service which is when people are made priests within our tradition:

'Priests are called to be servants and shepherds among the people to whom they are sent. With their Bishop and fellow ministers, they are to proclaim the word of the Lord and to watch for the signs of God's new creation.'

Whether a more corporate-speak business model or a more organic peaceful pastoral construct resonates with you, we all need to work and pray. As the old adage says: work as if it all depends on you and pray as if it all depends on God. May we be kind to each other as we prioritise and nurture time, skills and energy, paid or unpaid, to maintain our church buildings and the faith they stand for as an engaging, inspiring and challenging presence in our communities.

Dear Friends,

As many of you are aware, I have been on a threemonth sabbatical, much of it spent in Africa. I have visited Zimbabwe and Kenya, as well as an extended stay in Uganda, much longer than is usually possible. And Ruth was able to be there with me for about half the time in Uganda.

There is a huge amount of news to bring – and we are working on setting dates for events to share the experience. We saw God moving powerfully in many situations and the mutual encouragement between British and African Christians was further enhanced.

And now, settling back into the Pastorate (here and Lowestoft) is almost as big a 'culture shock' as was the in depth engagement in Africa.

Although a lot of church activity reduces in the summer period, we had exceptions: a very lively Holiday Bible Club and one of the home groups continued. And the new term has brought the re-launch of toddler groups, Messy Church and breakfasts. Whilst we are still in the process of seeking to recruit a new Children & Family Worker, the volunteer team have stepped up brilliantly!

And we pray a blessing on Jo, who led this work so well for so long, as she has started on her Ordination training.

This autumn, we also have both adult and youth inquirers exploring baptism, so we hope there will be baptisms taking place soon. Home groups are getting fully under way. We have celebrated Harvest and we look forward to an Advent Bible Study series as we continue to support the spiritual growth and development of all we came into contact with.

An Abundance of Voluntary Opportunities to Maintain Local Heritage Assets and Their Community use



We are very blessed to live amongst such talented, caring and creative people. There is not one of our Parochial Church Councils (PCC) who would turn away an offer of a new councillor.

Our tasks are:

- co-operating with the incumbent in promoting the use (mission) of the church*

- looking after the financial affairs of the church including fundraising
- maintaining the church building and its contents

* e.g. for use as public space for worship, exhibitions, swap shops, carols, local produce sales, gigs, plays, community lunches, funerals, meetings, Larder collection points etc...

Each council has three main officers:

Churchwardens who look after the events and maintenance programme of the church. Treasurers who keep accounts and an eye on budgets supporting fundraising. Secretaries do the paperwork for the four or so meetings a year, the key one being the AGM, and support programme planning.

Each parish is an independent charity. Members are voluntary trustees who can sometimes feel inadequate and sometimes inexperienced. You do not need to be religious, though believing in the worth of the building and what it stands for in the broadest of terms does help!

We offer Diocesan and local training and have WhatsApp groups running for day-to-day support, and have monthly or quarterly informal get-togethers depending on the role. A number of our PCCs are either entirely new or their members are now fulfilling the officer roles for the first time.

Church Councils especially keen to hear from potential recruits are Blyford, Chediston, Holton, Thorington and Wenhaston.



FOSM Recital Review - 12th September

Our very own Jason Busby,organist at St Mary's, treated us to an exploration of the stops of the 1853 Hill, Norman & Beard organ. Featuring the music of young talented German composer 25 year old Paul Fey. Jason stumbled across Paul's YouTube channel one day during the Covid lockdowns and has been following and purchasing his releases ever since.

The recital started with a 'Tuba Tune' (or in this case a trumpet Tune due to there being no tuba stop). The audience were given a quick organ lesson explaining the three manuals with a whistle stop tour of the 25 stops all used at some point during the recital. Jason moved onto playing Paul's first organ concerto in four parts, a grand piece with a beautiful largo in the middle using the 4ft flute on the great organ to bring out the solo. One piece which stood out towards the end was a 'Trumpet Voluntary', wow what an exciting piece.

The recital concluded with a piece inspired by the 'Star Spangled Banner' and afterwards Jason told the audience the final chord sequence was FULL organ and wow did the floor vibrate under our feet. Jason had linked a television screen up for the audience to see him but a technical fault meant there was a 20-second delay which certainly mixed things up!



Halesworth Heritage 2023

Friends of St Mary's - St Mary The Virgin Church, Halesworth - A little bit of history: 2. The Banking Connection. Georgian Banking – Botany and Malting

Concealed behind the photocopier in the office of St Mary the Virgin, Halesworth, is a memorial plaque for James II Turner (1786-1820) and his first wife Mary Ann. The Turner family of Great Yarmouth in the 18th and early 19th century established both banking and malting businesses in Halesworth, and could trace their roots back to late medieval Mulbarton in Norfolk.

The Turner connection to Halesworth dates from 1782, when James I Turner (1743-1794) opened the Halesworth and Suffolk Bank. Records in Barclays Bank archive indicate that James held a private banking account with John and Henry Gurney, who founded their bank in Norwich in 1775. Not only was he recorded in their first ledger but by 1778, James's balance was the equivalent of approximately £1.5 million in today's terms. Both the Gurneys and Turner held their business accounts with Barclays Bank in London. The Gurney's eventually became a group of banks formed by a series of interlocking partnerships, which in turn became one of the founding banks of Barclays and Company in 1896. (Halesworth branch closed 2018).

John and Henry Gurney sought to inaugurate the first of these interlocking partnerships with James I Turner in 1781; together they founded the Yarmouth and Suffolk Bank, trading from the ground floor of his home on South Quay, Great Yarmouth. Turner was the active and managing partner, extending and opening an office in Halesworth in 1782, and in Bungay in 1783. When James died in 1794 he left a thriving banking and merchant business to his eldest son, Dawson Turner (1775-1858)

Just 19, Dawson left Pembroke College in Cambridge to take over his father's businesses; a 'Titan' intellect and a true polymath he also became a botanist of international renown, a Fellow of the Linnaean Society (FLS) in 1797, and a Fellow of the Royal Society (FRS) in 1802. In the same year he authored and published the title *A Synopsis of British Fuci* (seaweeds) – he penned in the frontispiece his "thanks to Sir Joseph Banks for the access he gave to his splendid library". He collected the work of such artists as Bellini, Steen, Rubens, Van Dyke and others and developed extensive interests in history and literature.

In 1796 he married Mary Palgrave (1774-1850), a skilled artist, (log onto the National Portrait Gallery to view); eight of their children survived to adulthood, their education owed much to 'Enlightenment' principles. They were tutored in Latin, Greek, French, German and Italian, also history, art and literature. Their drawing master was the artist John Crome

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(1768-1821), who co-founded the Norwich Society of Artists in 1803. Later in 1812, John Sell Cotman (1782-1842) took over this role. Dawson Turner employed Cotman full time – not only as drawing master to his family, but to illustrate his many authored volumes, e.g. *Architectural Antiquities of Norfolk* 1818.

In 1805 another Norwich man, James Edward Smith (1759-1828) who had founded the Linnaean Society, advised a certain 20 year old William Jackson Hooker (1785-1865) to seek advice from Dawson concerning a moss he had found.

Subsequently, Hooker a talented artist, in effect became a protégé of Dawson Turner, sharing his interest in botany. When Dawson and Mary toured Scotland in 1807, Hooker accompanied them – and when Dawson published his four volumes on Fuci in 1808 most of the drawings were done by Hooker.

Dawson also extended his banking operations in 1808, opening offices in Harleston, Eye, Yoxford, Framlingham, Woodbridge, Aldeburgh and Saxmundham. His younger brother James II, by now 22, moved to Halesworth to manage the Halesworth branch and its satellite offices – they were always though under the direct control of the Yarmouth office. In 1809 Dawson, James II, Samuel Paget and William Hooker purchased from the executors of John Woodcock the Bridge Street Maltings. Hooker moved to Halesworth to manage these.

In 1813 Dawson and Mary's eldest child, the beautiful and cultured Maria (1797-1872), became betrothed to William Hooker; 1814 saw the couple travel to Paris in the company of her parents, her sister, Elizabeth, and Charles Lyell. (Dawson's journal of this tour is held in the Norwich Castle Museum.)

They began married life in Halesworth in 1815, and although Maria lived in the town for just five years, four of their children were born here. Their second child Joseph, would eventually follow his father and become the second Director of the Royal Botanic Gardens at Kew in 1865; there is of course a memorial plaque for Sir William and Sir Joseph Hooker in the inner south aisle of St Mary's.


James II Turner died in 1820, the same year that William Hooker and his family moved to Glasgow for him to take up the post of Professor of Botany in the University; they moved again in 1841 to Kew. The Maltings business was sold to another Yarmouth man, Patrick Stead, however, Dawson remained a banking partner of the Gurneys until his death, and what is more, another of Dawson and Mary's illustrious grandchildren, Sir Robert Henry Inglis Palgrave, became one of the founding Directors of the new Barclays and Company in 1896.

Fortunately everyone had moved out of the ringing chamber but it gave us all a nasty turn. The Wenhaston spider is a particularly heavy solid one and we may have to consider an alternative as we can't afford to lose any ringers!


On Saturday 2nd September at St Peter's Holton, I had the privilege to play the organ at the wedding of Russell James Durrell and Lesley Ann Brain.

www.linstead.suffolk.gov.uk I AM PLEASED REPORT THAT detectorists are now a respected arm of the archæological community and that Linstead has yielded an intriguing find. Pictured below is a complete late Medieval/post Medieval gold finger ring.



It is currently on display at the Halesworth Museum which is currently running a campaign to raise the £400 necessary for its purchase.

It was found by metal detectorists in Linstead Magna. The hoop is D-shaped in cross-section. Both faces feature crude rendered, inscriptions, seemingly imitating a capitalised Roman script. On the outer face there are two lines of inscription and on the inner a single line. The ring has been distorted with the two inner sides pushed together.

This is the inscription on the ring, outside top, outside bottom and inside. The meaning of the text is unknown. If anyone has any ideas please do let us know.

HHT MAAN OA MAM H NUDUL JI AUNX +XH OtOKOHOH

I suspect that the edge of the inscription has been worn away, but a challenge for the cryptographers amongst you. Next stop; Bletchley Park!

"Who dunnit?" – 2

In August's magazine I admitted to my fondness for clerical "whodunnits", particularly those in a historical setting, and quoted Philip Grosset, who's created an invaluable compendium on clerical detectives on the website detecs.org, detailing nearly four hundred clergy-detectives in English literature, and several of these have made it as TV series too. I touched on the moral qualities and knowledge of human nature and character so important to the success (and sometimes failures) of the clergy as searchers after truth. But you will notice that all these characters have another quality which endear them to readers of mysteries and crime, a quality they share with the still popular "golden age of crime" novels: they are all set in the past, way before CCTV and scientific techniques such as DNA analysis helped police procedurals; observation, asking the right questions and having great puzzlesolving abilities were their tools and the reader can engage and perhaps develop their hunch for 'whodunnit" before the holy sleuth reveals all.

Sister Fidelma of Kildaire is **Peter Tremayne's** engaging protagonist in his now quite long series of novels set mostly in 7th century Ireland, the land of saints and scholars, a time when women in society probably had the most rights and protections than at any time since. In her convent Sister Fidelma has trained as an advocate of the Brehon Court, the legal system of the day, and despite her comparative youth is well respected and in demand, it probably helps that she's the sister of the king of Munster too!


In the first novel **Absolution by Murder**, Sister Fildema is attending the Synod of Whitby (664AD) with the leading churchmen and women of the day to debate the rival merits of the Celtic and Roman Churches. Tempers begin to fray in a most un-Christian way.



Conspirators plot an assassination, while mysterious, violent death stalks the shadowy cloisters of the Abbey of St Hilda. When the Abbess Etain, a leading speaker for the Celtic Church, is found murdered suspicion inevitably rests on the Roman faction. The situation deteriorates, civil war seems likely and Fildelma is called on to investigate the murder with Brother Eadulf, of the Roman faction. However, the two

are so unlike that their partnership is described as that of a wolf and a fox - but which is which? The partnership carries on successfully into many of the further adventures in the series.



Revenge of the Stormbringer, published this year, is currently the latest in the series. Summer, AD 672. Princess Gelgéis has arrived in Cashel with her personal bodyguard, a troop of female warriors called the Daughters of the Storm. When one of them is found slain next to the sleeping chamber of the newly married king (Fildelma's brother) and, a short time later, the stewardess of the royal house is poisoned, questions are raised

as to everyone's safety... Fidelma and Eadulf must first explain the 'locked room' mystery of how the attack took place in King Colgu's specially built secure apartment. Then they must interrogate the growing list of suspects - even Enda, the commander of the household guard, who had formed a romantic attachment to the murdered attendant, cannot be ignored...



The unquiet bones, the first chronicle of Hugh de Singleton, surgeon, by Melvin R Starr. I suppose, technically speaking, this well written, wellregarded series is not a clerical "whodunnit". Hugh, the youngest son of a minor 14th century knight, decides *against* a career in the church or at law and trains as a surgeon, however his approach is more overtly Christian in that he frequently prays for guidance and wisdom, and

for the victims of crime, inspired by Christ's words in his precious hand- written copy of John's gospel (John 14, v13-17). He is also a disciple of Wyclif. When human bones are found in Bampton castle cesspit, they are thought to be the remains of the missing suitor of the local lord's sister until Hugh identifies them as female. He is then instructed by the lord to find out who she was and why she met her end, as clearly she was murdered. The bones are identified, the most likely murderer (in the lord's opinion) is sent for trial, only (spoiler alert!) the suspected victim is not dead... A gripping story, with a number of actual 14th century characters appearing. I look forward to more of the series.

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




