

From the Rector...

So a little over a month after I arrived, I find myself announcing Jane Held's new appointment. After haring round the team on a motorbike, she will soon be on the move again to Butterton, Ipstones with Berkhamsytch and Oncote with Bradnop in Lichfield Diocese. There are many who feel that the Church as an organisation should have better rewarded her for her valiant voluntary vicaring after the death of our much-loved Edward. This appointment may go some way to recognising the effort she put in during those difficult months that we are all so grateful to her for. We hold Jane and Emma in our prayers as their new chapter begins. Though we will be seeing her on days off and keeping in touch. Do also pray for us as we share out the invaluable roles she has been undertaking over the years.

One aspect of her legacy that will live on is the Working Groups that will develop ideas generated from the Team Away day that Jane facilitated. During the day of socialising, worship, reflection and creativity we considered together those things that we may be ready to put aside at least for now. We listed all the wonderful things that we do that we would like to try and continue to resource. The other set of ideas were those things that we are not yet doing that people have suggested to us. The aim as we move forward with change, new people and a different relationship with Covid-19 is not to lose the good things we do or miss opportunities for things we might.

An element of this journey is making sure we make our decisions in a way that involves the people we should in discussions, even if some may have to agree to disagree on any particular point in relation to the agreed outcome. These Working Groups will be part of that development and operate under the Team Council. As we move to include the Cluster parishes, the Team Council's constitution is also going to have to be reviewed to include them. This will be an opportunity to recognise the relationship I have as Incumbent with the Churchwardens. This results from the

fact that both roles are Bishop's appointments with specific legal responsibilities and property rights.

One way of doing this is to start up monthly social workshops to share ideas and encouragement. Churchwardens may find themselves in the role by default or on their own. They may feel overwhelmed by the post's responsibilities for their much loved ancient buildings, their distinctive contents and the churchyards in which they invariably sit. If we can find mutually convenient times these may be by Zoom or face to face as safety considerations permit.

These are just some of the activities that we will be looking to sustain or start up again.

Others include the popular, Ofsted-approved, 'Open the Book' nursery stories from the Bible enacted by volunteers welcomed into our schools. The Halesworth Volunteer Centre and St Mary's collaboration on Community Larder will continue to grow. Work is underway to advertise and appoint a Team Vicar as a second full time paid post to join the rich and varied expertise of the current Wider Ministry Team. The role is expected to be outward facing to connect with people of faith who may be infrequent attenders or otherwise detached from the support networks enjoyed by regulars nurtured by our Holy Communions and Daily Prayer. Finally three no less exciting possibilities include setting up a new Toddler Group, partnering with organisations working together on the environment and restoring the Parochial Church Council for St Mary's Walpole. Do get in touch if you are interested to learn more, get involved or tell us how we may better serve you in prayer and practice!

A very big thank you to all who rode, strode, welcomed and sponsored across the Team and Cluster for the 2021 Suffolk Historic Churches Ride and Stride. It was an amazing shared effort that exemplified how the whole is greater than the sum of the parts.



HALESWORTH & BRAMFIELD UNITED REFORMED CHURCHES

Revd Jon Sermon - Minister

Dear Friends.

September saw the return of parent and toddler sessions and Messy Church in the building, as well as family specific Sunday work.

In my thinking, praying and preaching, recently, I have been drawn back a number of times to the section of 2 Chronicles 7 which includes (at v14):

"If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven and will forgive their sins and will heal their land."

Those of us who were excited new Christians in the '70s may well recall the musicals, written by Jimmy and Carol Owens, that made such an impact, starting with "Come Together". The 2nd one, based on this verse had the title "If my People". We became familiar with the call to do those four things that might 'unlock' forgiveness and healing in our Nation:

Humble ourselves Pray

Seek God's face Turn from our wicked ways Each of these could merit a whole item in BVT. And together, they highlight conditions that may prepare the ground for renewal and revival.

But we could easily miss the context of the verses before: Solomon is dedicating the Temple. At v12 God responds saying he accepts it as a place for (prayer and) sacrifice. Then at v13, God sets the backdrop for the promise above: "when I shut up the heavens so there is no rain, or command locusts to devour the land, or send a plague among my people, if my people..."

Without straying into the dangerous waters of whether disaster is 'sent by God', 'allowed by God', the result of human rebellion, part of the natural way of things etc. doesn't the Covid pandemic and all we have been going through feel a bit like that context? And isn't it highlighting that our need to respond in those ways, in the circumstances we now find ourselves, seems even stronger than is often the case?

It falls to believers (us!) to take a lead in this: How could those who don't yet know the Lord be expected to seek his face, without those of us who do setting out in that direction first?

Among the many ways we can seek out support as we go deeper in seeking God's face are many retreat, training & prayer opportunities. One such is coming up locally:

The 2nd session of the Dunamis Project in East Anglia "In the Spirit's Power" which concentrates on the Gifts of the Spirit, is Mon 4th – Fri 8th October. It's a chance to get away, spend time with God and grow spiritually in a safe context! It is at Belsey Bridge just outside Bungay. *This is not denominational but for the whole church*. Details are on the website: www.dunamis.org.uk

Last minute bookings may well still be possible.

The committee ran a stall in the Thoroughfare on 14th August. The aim was to publicise our work, and we were delighted at the interest from people coming past.




Updated Town Noticeboard

The Church and Politics – Revd Alison Alder



At a recent Café Church, we reflected on the relationship between the Church and political issues.

There are many people, both inside and outside the Church, who feel the Church has no business commenting on decisions the Government is making: we shouldn't interfere.

However, Archbishop Justin Welby said in an article in the *Huffington Post* a few years ago that as Christians, we are <u>not</u> called to keep quiet and avoid rocking the hoat:

"The trouble is that's not what Jesus Christ did. He was never party political. No wing of politics – left or right – can claim God as being on its side.

But Jesus was highly political. He told the rich that, unlike the poor who were blessed, they would face woes. He criticised the King as a fox. He spoke harsh words to leaders of the nations when they were uncaring of the needy.

He did this because God cares for those in need and expects those who claim to act in his name to do the same. That means action - and words." Archbishop Justin Welby 16.3.18. www.archbishopofcanterbury.org/speaking-and-writing/articles In Café Church, we looked at how, as Christians, our response to controversial issues should be based in Scripture. In Psalm 34, we are instructed to:

Keep your tongue from evil and your lips from lying words. Turn from evil and do good; seek peace and pursue it.

And, of course, the fundamental message of our faith is "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbour as yourself." In our words, in our actions and in our prayers, we are called to live out God's love. We should take care that what we say challenges rather than reinforces prejudice. We should strive to ensure the decisions we make in our lives promote equality and justice.

A good example of this is the recent letter twelve Church of England Bishops wrote to *The Guardian* about the Government's approach to migrant crossings. I hope you will read it, and ensure that the example of the Good Samaritan stays in your thoughts as you watch and respond to future news stories.

Bishops concerned by government's approach to migrant crossings

Church of England Bishops say it is time for a reappraisal which looks again at serious multilateral approaches to refugees.

As bishops within the Church of England with a particular oversight of asylum and refugee issues, we are deeply concerned about the government's approach to migrant crossings of the Channel.

The Nationality and Borders Bill currently before parliament would criminalise not only attempts to cross the border irregularly, nor even simply people smuggling, but even those who take part in the rescue of boats in distress at sea.

This would require those who see asylum seekers at risk to choose between ignoring a moral imperative (also established in maritime law) to assist them, or to risk prosecution and imprisonment. This amounts to a criminalisation of the Good Samaritan who did not pass by on the other side, and an affront to justice to put the saving of lives under any sort of legal penalty. The new "turn back" policy, which will see boats forcibly returned to France, also raises significant moral concerns. It starkly increases the risks at sea and endangers the lives of those attempting the crossing. The trend of increasing militarisation and securitisation of the border is demonstrably failing to deter attempted channel crossings (as the stark increases in such numbers over the past 24 months aptly shows). What these measures have succeeded in doing instead is forcing those seeking to make the crossing to employ ever riskier and more dangerous tactics or to rely more heavily on criminal gangs and smugglers. The proposals are not so much undermining criminal activity as reinforcing it as the only available option for those seeking asylum in the UK.

If the government's goal is to deter migrants, then the policies to date have been a failure, and there is little reason to believe the new proposals will have more effect. If the goal is to prevent people using criminal gangs, then the problem has only been exacerbated. All the while the crossings are still happening and are actively being made more dangerous, at greater cost in human life, by the government's own policies. It is time for a reappraisal which looks again at serious multilateral approaches to refugees, which promotes safe routes for those in need, and which above all values human life and the dignity of vulnerable people.

Former Chediston resident David Mantell saved the life of a drowning woman in the Thames!

David reports on his brave rescue... Friday 19th August. I was walking with



my wife along the Thames path adjacent to the bridge at Abingdon. After a short while another walker alerted us to someone in difficulties in the river. A woman had fallen in and had luckily managed to cling on to a tree branch overhanging the water but about 3m or 4m from the bank. I called the emergency services, but before they could arrive the woman became very distressed and her head was getting lower in the water. It was clear that she was giving up and time was of the essence before she drowned. I stripped off shoes and top and dived in and swam to her. The river was amazingly deep, fast flowing and cold, but I managed to support the woman keeping her head above waterline. Eventually a couple of boats came to our aid and the woman was pulled towards and into a boat. couldn't haul myself on to the boat so swam back to shore. By this time all the emergency services had arrived in large numbers including a BBC film crew.

The woman was treated by paramedics and put on oxygen and taken to hospital. I was told that she would have drowned had she not been rescued promptly. The police kindly escorted me back to my car and offered to drive me home.

I have now heard that although the NHS will not inform me or the police upon the condition of the woman (patient confidentiality), the police have said that if she had passed away, they would have been informed, so hopefully she survived.

Touchingly my daughter wrote on

Facebook 'Yesterday you put a stranger's life ahead of your own meaning they got to see another day. Whilst others sat and watched, your actions actually achieved the greatest thing ever. Mega proud to call you my Dad and the girls' Grandad'.

My leisurely walk in Abingdon turned out to be rather adventurous!

The photo below was taken at the scene as I was wrapped in a blanket by the ambulance crew!

So no problems in 20 years in Chediston. Move here and knocked off my bike, my car damaged in a car park and now this!


Firstly I must publicly apologise to Carolyn my article was four days late (again), sorry Carolyn. (Carolyn - no probs Jason, thank you!).


Now who needs an excuse for a party? Well, I do for one! I am very lucky to have two mothers, what would I, and we, do without Gwen and Simon?


Well we have set up a working party to investigate the world of Broadband providers, Tap and Go devices and all such other mysteries... watch this space I will keep you updated.

The Village Barbecue was a great


success in spite of indifferent weather. People clearly wanted to get together again, and there were more than eighty of us sitting in the churchyard, disregarding the intermittent drizzle.



When did the "we", the community we were created for, become "I"?


This shift has had a profound impact on society and the way in which we interact with each other. Traditional values no longer hold, yet recent

The influence of social media seems all-pervading and the breakdown of the family is only one result of the loss of social capital. Many fear what the future may hold.

Friends of St Mary's - St Mary The Virgin Church Halesworth - A little bit of history

Gradual lifting of restrictions bring a welcome return of extra -curricular activities in our communities. The BVTimes promotes the return of the dementia Carers' Fund regular films at The Cut, along with singing and an art group for carers and their loved ones. The Mothers' Union promises a mixed bag of events, walkers were invited to stride out during The Great Big Green Week in September and, hopefully, it will not be too long before St Mary's bells are ringing regularly again. Other attractions just gone, or to come, are Brass on the Grass at Reydon, the Suffolk Historic Churches Ride & Stride, boot sales, harvest festivals, bring & buy, home-made marmalade. And not least, the marvellous Halesworth Heritage happening with the amazing celebration of St Mary's mediaeval heritage in flowers and music, and a new Argentein trail outside and inside the church, with new information on the intriguing shields partly hidden by the organ.

And what if we look back in *St Mary's Church, Halesworth, Parish Magazine* at what was happening 60 years ago? The magazine at the time had a central insert with *St Edmundsbury & Ipswich News of the Diocese*, and the outer pages with St Mary's news. Regular meetings are shown of the Mothers' Union, the St Mary's Young Wives Group, the Working Party (presumably for the upkeep of the church and grounds), and the Men's Group. There seems no mention of any children's groups. The ubiquitous jumble sale is promised with admission at 3d (pre-decimal money), and a sale of work with a fancy goods and needlework stall and a cake and

sweet stall – proceeds to go towards the repairs shortly to be carried out in the north side of the church.

Also present are records of 'Hatches, Matches and Dispatches'; this phrase dating from around 1859-63 often in *The Times* and *Punch*, along with the alternative, 'Cradle, Altar and Tomb' column in some newspapers. So, the holy baptism of Tracey Jane Phipps is recorded for 26 April 1964, the wedding of John Larman Haward & Eileen Rose Barham is recorded for 7th October 1961 and the burial of Charles Henry Bathurst Trollope, aged 85 years, on 16th January 1962.

And, in the central part of the magazine with the news of the diocese, is an intriguing little story entitled 'The Envelope', episodes of which appear over several months in 1963-64. A summary for new readers says, "An anonymous gift of £1000 has caused much controversy in the parish. Old Martha Blount dies, and is supposed to have left about £1000 which cannot be found. Her relatives think it has been stolen. The Vicar appeals for the donor to come forward; a parishioner, Eric Jones, collapses when he hears this, but later declares he did not steal the money. At a whist drive, an invalid lady, Mrs Knight, wins a prize of a basket of groceries, and in it is found - Martha Blount's money-bag, empty." Frustratingly, the Halesworth & District Museum has no more copies of the parish magazine, so the end of the story is unknown! How often, as we pass through life, do we never hear the end of stories that touch our lives.

LORDS OF THE MANOR OF HALESWORTH

The carving of Sir William Allington has been recently discovered in the Argentine Chapel, to the East side of the North facing arch quite close to floor level, the position making it vulnerable to damage. (This was the last carving to be added to the family collection, so no other space available). The mouth and most of the jaw is missing and perhaps, also a headdress. However we can see a broad face with wide set eyes, and a man of some elegance. We imagine the sculptor was working from a charcoal sketch, and for this sitting Sir William was newly coiffed and dressed in welltailored fashionable clothes of the period. He became Lord of the Manor in 1424, the year after Sir William Argentine's grandson and heir, died. His Lordship was determined by an arrangement of marriage to the young Argentine granddaughter and heiress, Joan. Thus the blood lines were forged as a new dynasty, 'The Allingtons,' replaced 'The Argentines'. It was to last almost as long - nearly three

At the West end of the church in the ringing chamber, you will find the head stone of Sir William Argentine, placed there as his signature to the tower building project, completed circa 1415. This is on the archway leading to the tower staircase. The sculptor has captured a rugged persona in a characterful face which may well have lent itself, over the years, to being a lucky touchstone for those climbing the tower; the nose is well rubbed.

Halesworth Church has a wealth of sculptured heads, inside and outside the building, and they all have a history to tell; there are royal heads, knights of the realm, church wardens, African heads marking the abolition of slavery, amongst Mediaeval, others As I write, this we are on the final countdown to Halesworth Heritage Open Days. The weather outlook is good - HAPPILY, -since the programme includes many outdoor activities. The materials prepared, including an audio tour, 'The Argentine Trail', are available if you want have a heritage browse at some later point. The link to the latter is on the Friends' website - so do bring your ear pods and phone with you, if you come with that purpose in mind.
