The work of restoring hope through justice undertaken in Stephen's memory continues to inspire and change lives for the better.





Blyth Valley Times From the Rector...

As you read this, Christmas may seem a long time ago, although you may still have cards and trees up! Don't forget, it's not just about memories. Christmas will have its consequences for all of us too. You may be waiting in anticipation to use your new motorcycle gloves, or try out your new rose gold hair straighteners. You may be needing to look for the Slimmers' World telephone number (other diets are available!) or apologise to your children for the effect of that one sprout/glass too many!

In many ways, the consequences are what Epiphany is all about. The church season runs for the twelve days that link Christmas as celebrated in the western church with Christmas as celebrated in the east. Catholics use the Julian calendar, Orthodox the Gregorian. Those reasons, like memories, may have been forgotten - if ever known - by the rest of us. They may have little or no consequence today – save the superstitions of Twelfth Night. However, the reason for the season most definitely does have consequences.

During mass, or the breaking of bread, we use a prayer to give thanks (Eucharist in Greek) for the bread and wine. Amongst other things they symbolise God being physically present with us in Jesus by the Spirit. During Epiphany, that prayer includes reference to the coming of the group of academics (or three kings); to the christening of Jesus; and his turning water into wine at a marriage. These stories are given as testimony to the belief that Jesus is God by the Spirit. The magi saw consequences in the cosmos, in creation and recognised the implication to culture, religion and worldly power. The accounts of the baptism of Jesus tell of God saying he loves him and describe the Spirit landing on The miracle at Cana speaks of the fulfilling and him. regenerative consequences of God being in Jesus by the Spirit for culture, religion and society.


So, is Jesus real and is he really God? It is not unusual to be asked, often in a declaratory manner by someone hurt or challenged by pain, 'Why does God allow suffering?'. Sometimes the question is born of a hope that there really is a God; sometimes in the certain knowledge that there isn't; and sometimes in the style of a child's tantrum directed at a carer or parent who very definitely does exist! This in a nutshell is the consequential conundrum of believing in



Christmas as a Jew and in wrestling with that belief for the rest of us. Epiphany is the continuing unrolling of the story of God, not only existing, but being born of the earth and of woman. It is the continuing unrolling story of our response, with all creation, to the offer of personal encounter consequent on the reality of that spirituality.

That may be all very well for those who need a crutch, but "I'm not religious", you may say. Or you may claim that this is all very interesting but "my faith is private". Whilst these attitudes are perfectly valid, arguably they are divisive and isolating. Division is painful. Pain is suffering. Why does God allow suffering? Partly as a parent, or other responsible leader, to give freedom, to get things right, to experience, to go beyond, to learn and to voluntarily respond. However, like a parent on the skatepark with us or a boss who sits with their team in a open plan office, being born amongst us, God is with us in the pain and has broken the division of us and them. God does not - as we so often do - blame the striking nurses, or the immigrants, or both. God does not blame the church, the Government, or simply something else. Instead God identifies with us. With the atheists amongst us, we would do well to see in the stories of this season, the dangers of division, of blaming the other and the consequences. We would do well to receive the suggestion of the fruitful consequences of getting involved, getting to know, and taking responsibility. I would be very pleased to hear from anyone who recognises the value of retaining the real presence of church, both people and building, in their community, and are keen to build bridges and take responsibility to that end. Without us all there is no community. Without community there is no church!

Dear Friends,

It may seem that all the excitement of Christmas is over – and what a time we had: carols, Christingles, parties, celebrations of the coming of Jesus. But the Christmas season is still ongoing. And so is the **Reason for the Season!**

Familiarity can so easily dull the senses: I was preaching recently from Matthew 1:18-25 which seems such a straight forward account of the birth of Jesus. Mary and Joseph were betrothed (perhaps a bit like our concept of engagement, but also much stronger in terms of a definite commitment and contract). Before they 'completed' the marriage, we are told that Mary was found to be pregnant by the Holy Spirit!

Doesn't that need a bit more explanation? How did they come to realise this? It isn't as if the concept of pregnancy by the Holy Spirit was a normal thing: It was never heard of before or since!

Yes Luke tells us that Mary herself knew – because she'd been told by an angel. How everyone else realised or came to accept such a shocking (preposterous?) assertion, however, is far from clear. Joseph, in the first instance *didn't* accept it. His natural assumption was that Mary had fallen pregnant in the usual way, from sexual intercourse. And he knew it wasn't with him! Hence he resolved to divorce her.

His desire not to shame her publicly speaks of his love for her despite his assumptions. And he must have known that she could face more than public disgrace – potentially even death by stoning.

Yet an angel spoke to him also and he came to accept the astonishing truth.

Even more shocking is what was going on – you could say at a 'cosmic' level: Such an unusual, unheard of way for a virgin to become pregnant was itself for a reason. This marks God *breaking into* human experience. And why? To make a difference that still affects us today.

The coming of Jesus, Immanuel, God with us, is worth celebrating not just at Christmas but in life-long gratitude.

Oh, and... Happy New Year.

The three Wise Men, Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar followed the star of God's Son who became human two thousand and **** years ago. May Christ bless our home and remain with us throughout the new year. **Amen.**

Visit, O blessed Lord, this home with the gladness of your presence. Bless all who live or visit here with the gift of your love; and grant that we may manifest your love to each other and to all whose lives we touch. May we grow in grace and in the knowledge and love of you; guide, comfort, and strengthen us in peace, O Jesus Christ, now and forever. **Amen.**

Clark and Sophia France, Cancer Research's area fundraising manager.





From the Ringing Chamber

There have been some significant achievements in the last few weeks.

Firstly, Erika and Kevin, who are technically Mendham ringers but who are also part of the Halesworth band, both achieved their Level 3 of the "Learning the Ropes" scheme, equivalent to musical Grade 3. They have both worked really hard since staring to ring shortly before lockdown and have shown real commitment.

Secondly, Pete and I have both been accredited as ringing teachers by the Association of Ringing Teachers. We are the first in NE Suffolk to gain this status. Our assessor was very impressed with the learner we demonstrated with – Kari – which brings me on to the next achievement: Kari has rung her first rounds, initially at Blythburgh but then at Halesworth and Wissett, the first major step on the ringing journey. Well done everyone!

We have attempted a number of quarter peals recently, but our success rate has not been good. Oxford Treble Bob at Blythburgh failed after halfway due to conductor error (mea culpa) while the Plain Bob Doubles evaporated in a flash before the Huntingfield carol service: another attempt with a slightly different band met the same fate at Wenhaston. Ah well – if we didn't lose a few it would reduce the value of the ones we do get.

We did score a pain-free quarter of Grandsire Doubles at Halesworth when the icy roads forced cancellation of the normal practice.

Christmas is always a busy period and this year we planned, and succeeded in, ringing for all the carol services at those churches in the Team with bells, as well as the Christingle Service at Halesworth on Christmas Eve and, thanks to various ringers visiting family over the holiday, the Christmas Day service in town.


So, 2023 beckons: what are my reflections of 2022?

We've been low on numbers, but the loyalty and commitment shown by the band has been terrific. No fewer than seven of the band rang nine or more quarter peals during the year, and we've definitely moved forward.

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Friends of St Mary's Lunchtime Recital Review 21st December 2022

It was worth waiting an extra week to hear Jason Busby's uplifting organ recital. After being greeted with carols as we took our places, we heard Philip Stopford's meditative music for the song Do Not Be Afraid and the Carol Of The Bells, a joyous piece by the young German composer, Paul Fey. The cleverly arranged programme then gave the audience a chance to sing familiar carols, each of which was followed by a prelude based on the same carol. Noel Rawsthorne's prelude gave us music woven round on Hark The Herald Angels Sing; the plainsong melody Of The Father's Love Begotten formed the basis of Stanley Vann's prelude Divinum Mysterium; another gentle prelude by Noel Rawsthorne followed the audience's singing of It Came Upon The Midnight Clear. The tune Forest Green, a folk melody collected by Ralph Vaughan Williams, was used for the singing of O Little Town Of Bethlehem, but the corresponding prelude by Paul Fey also referenced the alternative tune by H Walford Davies. The recital concluded with O Come All Ye Faithful and the prelude by Richard Lloyd on Adeste Fideles (the original Latin words of the carol).

Not only did the audience enjoy the opportunity to hear and sing these well-known carols and the use of them made by 20th century composers but they were also able to learn about the organ which Jason was playing. He explained the use of the four keyboards and the different sounds they produce; he even moved the camera (which had enabled us to see him on a screen as he performed) so that we could see how the pedal organ worked, illustrating this with a reprise of the *Carol Of The Bells*.

Friends of St Mary's - St Mary The Virgin Church, Halesworth - A little bit of history: Monuments of all shapes and sizes - Part 4

Ringing in the New Year 2023, we consider one group of monuments which hold the distinction of often being heard but very seldom seen. Church Bells with their many inscriptions both commemorate and celebrate – the Gospel, the individual or an event.

When the Revd John James Raven DD penned the preface to his book entitled *The Church Bells of Suffolk*, he cautioned that, "the lists of bells cast by the various founders was not exhaustive", and that changes are continuously made when recasting or repairing. Writing from his Fressingfield Vicarage near Harleston on the 28 August 1890, he further tells us, "This chronicle is the culmination of 42 years work".

According to the Revd Raven there were fifty such bells in what are now called the Blyth Valley Churches, eight of which were housed in the medieval tower of St Mary the Virgin, Halesworth. Further, he chronicles unique bell founder identification marks.

So, for example, two of the Halesworth bells were cast in Bury St Edmunds by HS working in the mid third of the 15th century. There is a shield on these bells which provides evidence that HS was also a cannon-gun-founder. Both bells bear Latin inscriptions, one of which Raven says is rare in East Anglia – for St John the Evangelist. Is it fanciful to think the commissioners of this bell were also alluding to their medieval Lord of the Manor, Sir John Argentein (1318-1382), a benefactor of St Mary the Virgin? HS also cast a bell for St Peter, Wenhaston, its Latin inscription reads 'Sancta Anna Oro Pro Nobis'.

Likewise in the Wenhaston tower is a bell cast by the Brasyer dynasty of Norwich. Robert Brasyer was mayor in 1410; Richard the elder, mayor in 1456 and 1463; and Richard the younger in 1510. Robert was memorialised in a brass effigy in St Stephens, Norwich, the area of their bell founding premises. Raven says, "No one can see the lettering of these Norwich bells, without being struck by its great beauty". The Latin inscription on the Wenhaston bell translates to: "We pray thee Andrew, receive the vows of the servants".

Another of the Brasyer bells hangs in St Peter, Spexhall; Raven wrestles with its Latin inscription, but concludes it translates to: "Box of sweet honey, I am called Michaels bell", in reference perhaps to the box shape of the bell. Is it Kismet that the current churchwarden is a committed bee-keeper?

The Revd Raven writes extensively of Henry Jordan of London, another of the mid-15th century bell founders. In the Blyth Valley three of his bells hang in St Andrew, Bramfield. He comments that Jordan's bells are of, "a superior character". Each has a Latin inscription.

However, it is St Andrew, Wissett, which appears to garner the earliest reference; one bell bears a wheel stop considered to be indicative of William Burford of London. Its inscription reads simply, "Virgo Maria". William Burford's will was dated and proved in 1390. St Peter, Thorington, has a bell inscribed, "Samuel Owen made me for Wansted 1598". The Owens of Hounsditch were well known gun-founders, one of their cannons was raised on the *Mary Rose*, the Flagship of Henry VIII. The second page of the earliest St Peter register documents that Edward Coke, Attorney General, and his wife Bridgett, gave this in 1598.

The towers of St Mary the Virgin, Halesworth, St Michael, Cookley, and St Andrew, Bramfield, all have bells cast by the father and son team, William and John Brend of Norwich. St Mary has three, a bell inscribed Anno Domini 1611, a bell dedicated to, "Richard Welton and Daniel Barne Churchwardens 1627", and a bell which reads, "New repaired by Roger Woods Erasmus Moss Church Wardens – Jefery Barett gave me". St Michael has one inscribed Anno Domini 1593, and St Andrew has two which read Anno Domini 1621.

Of the fifteen churches in the Blyth Valley group, this short précis touches on only seven of the towers, and merely sixteen of the fifty bells, it can therefore in no way do justice to the Revd Raven's expert work. But hopefully it serves as an alert to the wonderful and rich history contained in *The Church Bells of Suffolk*.

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

We look forward to returning to the schools next term with a full team of volunteers and another story from the Bible. **GW**


St Andrew's Carol Service -18.12.22



Pastoral Care and Ministry in the Blyth Valley Team Ministry



Within the Blyth Valley Team Ministry, the Revd Linda Berry and I are taking the lead on sustaining and developing our Pastoral Care and Ministry. During 2023, we plan to work with our congregations to ensure we are offering the pastoral care that is needed, whilst ensuring that what we offer is appropriate and sustainable.

There are many ways in which we in the Blyth Valley Team Ministry are already a caring church in our communities. Within each parish there are people who visit those who are vulnerable, lonely or sick. Initiatives like online "Café Church," "Welcome Wednesdays" at St Mary's Halesworth, the monthly "Labyrinth Walk and Reflection" sessions, are all ways we connect with others in friendship and faith. In recent months, under the leadership of the Revd Linda Berry, we have restarted regular services and visiting in our local care homes.

In addition, we have a small group of people who form our Pastoral Ministry Team. These people are able to offer more focused support to people who are really struggling or who are recently bereaved. The team is small and is currently made up of people who are already have a lot of demands on their time. Members of the team had some initial training to ensure they could support others within appropriate boundaries. Moving forward, we would like to:


- Recruit some new members to our Pastoral Ministry Team (including people who are doing this sort of work already, so we can offer them support).







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An Abundance Of Voluntary Opportunities To Maintain Local Heritage Assets And Their Community Use



We are very blessed to live amongst such talented, caring and creative people. There is not one of our Parochial Church Councils (PCC) who would turn away an offer of a new councillor.

Our tasks are:

- co-operating with the incumbent in promoting the use (mission) of the church.*
- looking after the financial affairs of the church including fundraising.
- maintaining the church building and its contents.
 - * e.g. for use as public space for worship, exhibitions, swap shops, carols, local produce sales, gigs, plays, community lunches, funerals, meetings, Larder collection points etc...

Each council has three main officers:

Churchwardens who look after the events and maintenance programme of the church.

Treasurers who keep accounts and an eye on budgets supporting fundraising.

Secretaries do the paperwork for the four or so meetings a year, the key one being the AGM, and support programme planning.

Each parish is an independent charity. Members are voluntary trustees who can sometimes feel inadequate and sometimes inexperienced. You do not need to be religious, though believing in the worth of the building and what it stands for in the broadest of terms does help!

We offer Diocesan and local training and have WhatsApp groups running for day to day support, and have monthly or quarterly informal get-togethers depending on the role. A number of our PCCs are either entirely new or their members are now fulfilling the officer roles for the first time.
