GOOD NEWS TO SHARE FROM ST MARY'S WALPOLE


This month we are delighted to report that the renovation works at St Mary's church Walpole, for which we have been fundraising during the last two years, through our music and arts events, have finally been completed - we are all thrilled with the results.

The process started in July 2022 when we met up with architect Matthew Thomas, following the Quinquennial report of 2020. The report had prioritised the need for raking out and re-pointing low-level flint work joints in the exterior walls and buttresses, repairing plasterwork, redecorating the nave, aisle and porch interior walls.

The process has been a learning curve for us, including navigating the DAC Portal to determine if a Faculty or List B needed to be set up and subsequently completing the relevant paperwork. Our architect drew up the required detailed specifications and, after putting the proposal out to tender, we appointed L A Hurrell as our approved builder.

We were optimistic that the work would commence in early Spring 2024...



From the Rector...

With the month of June we are entering what is for many people, businesses and organisations, the wedding or marriage season. This is despite the Church Times reporting a halving of marriages over the last 20 years. I forget whether this was specifically those in church or mixed gender or some other category. Congratulations if you are getting married with us this month, this year. You are bucking the trend!

There are many reasons why couples choose to get married in Church of England parish churches. Most pertain to examples in rural Suffolk. They include having a family connection with the place. It may be within a vintage double-decker ride of a reception venue. In addition, or instead, the building may be beautiful, historic and or have a feel about it. These are all fine reasons to choose us over or against a tropical island, a Register office or a digger bucket- if that's your bag!

A couple came to me recently to talk about getting married. As I was settling down to collect the information I needed to get the preliminaries under way, they put the brakes on. They were, in fact, just interested in finding out what marriage was about, rather than actually wanting to tie the knot. Whilst usually couples have thought that through by the time I see them, it did make me think that everyone in a relationship perhaps ought to consider what and why marriage is, or is not, for them. Some say they'd rather rely on love than law or convention. Whilst that might be right for you, for now, such decisions have their consequences. Some on the other hand simply accept marriage is marriage. Just the other day, I read on Facebook of the parents of a friend re-marrying after 50 years. This was because one of them had been diagnosed with cancer. It turned out this gave them just a mere few days together in their re-established union.

Sometimes we don't help ourselves as the Church of England in maximising our assets. Nationally, our General Synod can not agree on allowing everyone who wants to get married. This is despite a number of Bishops and clergy not being in binary heterosexual marriages. There are also nationally set rules about who may marry in any one church. These were loosened 15 or so years ago to include what are known as Qualifying Connections. Yet still, these details may prove to be a barrier. To our peril we also unhelpfully ignore all other types of relationship in supporting applications for marriage. Then Parochial

Church Councils and the individuals that constitute them may feel aggrieved that a couple who never normally come to church, take the place over for a day or two and then we never see them again - even if they live in the village.

All this is a real shame, as our faith can offer couples such Historically, God is seen as the a great deal. believers' (singular and plural) spouse. Jesus is, famously, known for making an objectively positive contribution to such occasions when he turns formality and lack into jollity and provision. There are many scriptures that teach us how to love and how to forgive; for example, when two family cultures collide and things go awry. Our tradition speaks of how marriage is the foundation of family life, enriching society as it strengthens community. wonderful personal experience of the love covenant can lead into a new religious experience, new friendships, a new sense of place and self. Whilst not a club - save for non-members – when you marry in church you should have platinum access to practical and spiritual support. You find yourself belonging to an extraordinary institution.

As with other aspects of the great circle of life, marriage used also to be an opportunity for the church to develop new relationships with new people, engaging them with the life and work of the building and its attendant community. Whether you are having a church marriage this month or next, or if your Christian marriage is a distant dream or memory, without your parish church being loved and cherished it would not even be possible. Congratulations on your love! Thank you for sharing your love with us. And to everyone, or church or visitor, please do what you can to share the love that all may know the breadth and length and height and depth of the love of Christ (Ephesians 3: 18 - 19).

Revd Jon Sermon – Minister

Dear Friends.

We have recently celebrated Pentecost. For many years this had been a joint open-air event and we did miss the coming together of folk from all the churches of the area. Holding Pentecost worship just as ourselves in our own building was a "first" for me, since I came here as Minister eight years ago! We were sorry to lose the previous pattern, although it was good to come together at St Mary's in the afternoon for the Christian Aid service.

In our culture, indeed in many churches and denominations across the West, Pentecost has an extra importance: It reminds of God's original intention - that the empowered ministry of Jesus continues through the church. So much of Western church life lost sight of this in earlier generations! (Africa, Asia and South America can be very different. My experience in Uganda, for example, is of people far more open to spiritual experience, yet often lacking in Biblical discernment).

We are reminded that Jesus told his followers to expect to be empowered by the Holy Spirit. And that's just what happened! Throughout the Book of Acts, we see the emerging church experiencing this empowerment in miraculous healings, prophetic ministries, direct encounters with demonic spirits, and huge swathes of people coming to faith in Jesus.

In the churches in Western countries, we are on a journey of re-discovering this empowerment for the expansion of the Kingdom of God. It is an exciting journey to be on: Jesus told his followers "You will do the things I do" (John 14: 12). If Jesus doing such things a healing stemmed solely from the fact that he is Divine, how could he make such a statement? And how could the first followers find they were enabled to do the same? But as St Paul writes in Philippians 2, Jesus did not consider equality with God something to be grasped but humbled himself. In doing so, he became reliant on the power of the Holy Spirit - His gift to the church.

Lord Jesus, thank you for pouring out your Holy Spirit, May we, your followers today, be open to receive and become aware of how You are gifting and inspiring us. Amen.

What has your Team Vicar been up to?

What have I been up to? Well, I'm back on my feet, thank goodness, and enjoying the wonderful Spring weather! It's the season for fairs, fêtes, car boot sales, beer festivals and everything in between. All things I enjoy, but find difficult to get around to now. I did manage a quick drop-in

to the Holton car boot sale. It brings back such fond memories of when I began my time here two years ago and one of the first things I did was to have a stall at the car boot. It was a lovely day then and so it was again this year.

I have been thinking a lot about the events in the world, about illness and suffering and most recently about the tragic accident on Halesworth road in Wissett where one man lost his life and another has been seriously traumatised by the experience. Such a tragedy will affect both families, friends and the local community and I am sure they will be held in our prayers in the coming weeks and months. Such an event reminds us that life is fragile and we never know what is around the corner – quite literally. I had driven down the same road the week before, probably far too fast as I was worried about being late for a meeting. It could have been me: it could have been any number of people.

Taking the service in Wissett on Pentecost Sunday, it was helpful to be reminded of the arrival of the Holy Spirit, the helper and guide Jesus promised to send to his disciples after he was taken up into heaven. He knew they would face difficulties as they spread his message of love across all nations. His message was radical then and it continues to be radical now. Jesus knows they will suffer just as he did in this world. People who think following Christ is an easy option

need to think again. We need help, we need each other and above all we need to accept God's abundant and unconditional love in good times and bad. There are so many questions about the terrible suffering of innocent people — Why them? Why me? These are valid questions, but unfortunately there are no easy answers.

The things which have been bringing me joy include my ongoing work with Holton Primary School as Governor and vicar. We have plans to get some of the older children involved in our eco-friendly efforts at St Peter's church and are looking forward to the school being involved in some kind of project relating to the Climate Conference in Halesworth at the end of September.

My tricycle riding is coming on and I was delighted to get out on my own for a couple of miles. It is such a joy to get out into our beautiful countryside, especially at this time of year. I have missed walking so much and am so grateful to have found an alternative. It was also wonderful to have a ride around Holton Pits with a couple of locals to check out how accessible it might be to people like me who use mobility aids. We managed to do this before the public meeting about Holton Pits where we were able to give our feedback. There is now a website for the Pits (www.holtonpits.org) and the committee is eager to hear from people who have ideas about the site and who have skills which might be useful in all sorts of areas. It is wonderful how much has been achieved so far. There is an extraordinary amount of work involved behind the scenes to keep this lovely area open and available to the community – hats off to all involved.



From the **Ringing Chamber**



May is competition time, and this year's NE District Striking Competition was held at Theberton. Nine teams were competing, 50% up on last year. The judges had driven all the way up from Staplehurst in Kent. The Halesworth band had a hard practice session at Wissett the night before. What could go wrong?

Well, the first thing was that we arrived to find the church locked. After finding out where the churchwarden lived from a passing tractor driver, and after quizzing everyone in the pub when said churchwarden was found to be not at home, a lady eventually arrived with a key (only an hour late) and we could make a start. Every team having had a short practice, the draw took place. Halesworth were drawn to ring seventh, not ideal, as it meant an hour and a half waiting around.

The first team started off, rang their bit, and that was fine. Then, halfway through team no two's piece, an alarming clanging brought the ringing to a halt, one of the bells having smashed through the wooden slider and whipped the rope up to the ceiling, injuring the ringer in the process (small amount of blood, bit of bruising, shaken up, nothing too serious). In the absence of a local ringer (all strangely on holiday) our resourceful steeple-keeper Pete managed to find a ladder to climb up to the trap door and re-wheel the rope. He also came down clutching the remains of the slider, more woodworm than wood, which explained the accident.

The extra half hour delay didn't help the nerves, but at last it was our turn and off we went, and I'm pleased to say we rang better than we had the night before. Would Beccles (as it happened ringing next) be able to match it?

To cut a long story short the answer was no - we won by three faults (23 v 26) and retained the Trevor Hughes Trophy. So well done to the band, Judith, Erika, Sal, me (!), Pete and



Matthew Thomas highlighted a number of organisations that we should apply to in order to obtain the required funding. We were successful in securing grants from: Heveningham Hall Country Fair Trust; SHCT; Benefact Trust; Belstead Ganzoni Charitable Settlement and The Scarfe Charitable Trust - totalling £14,500. This, together with the monies raised from fundraising events enabled us to meet our final target and thus commence the work. Following the completion and certification, we have submitted an application to The Listed Places of Worship (LPW) Grant Scheme to recover the VAT on the repairs.

We have only praise for Matthew Thomas and L A Hurrell and are grateful for their regular communications and site meetings during the process. The Church was closed during April and following the completion of the specified works the PCC have commenced a thorough deep clean of the Church with the aim of restoring wood work, flooring etc. to ensure it looks its best.

We now look forward to celebrating the re-opening of St Mary's with a service on May 26th led by the Revd Vic Hopkins and also this year's

first music event on Saturday 29th June, when we welcome back the fabulous Dave Keech Jazz Quartet. (See advertisement below).

Restore Nature Now

Church groups are joining a coalition of nature and climate organisations, including the National Trust, the RSPB, the Wildlife Trusts and the Woodland Trust, for a *Restore Nature Now* march on Saturday 22nd June in Central London. Creation is in crisis. Nature in the UK is in long-term decline and without radical change we're set to lose even more precious habitats and species. This will be a creative, family-friendly and legal mass gathering that demonstrates a united call to politicians from all parties to act now for nature, people and climate.

Beccy Speight, RSPB CEO said: Here in the UK, we care deeply about nature. But last year's State of Nature report laid out a grim picture, finding that there's been no let-up in the decline of our wildlife over recent decades, with one in six species now at risk of being lost from our shores. But there is hope: while we know the threats, we also know the solutions. But we simply aren't acting fast enough or at a big enough scale to tackle the nature and climate crisis. We're calling for urgent action and a much stronger commitment to nature's recovery from politicians of all parties, because we cannot afford to wait any longer.

A Rocha UK, Green Christian, Christian Climate Action, and Operation Noah are collaborating on a *Creation Cries Out* ecumenical service of worship, 11am, Farm Street Church, 114 Mount Street, London W1K 3AH before joining the main march on Park Lane between midday and 1pm.

You are invited to join with them to pray, worship and lament in the context of biodiversity decline and climate breakdown. It is a family event with a children's nature-based church outside in the church garden.

Christian groups like Green Christian are supporting this event because God's creation is suffering from humanity's greed and lack of care. We must work to transform the unjust structures in our society that are the root cause of this.

We are called to love our neighbour (Mark 12:31) and to seek justice (Isaiah 1:17). If we take this seriously we must do what we can to call on our leaders to act for the

However, Veronica was recovering from a bad bout of laryngitis. So, after some encouragement, Wendy and Jonathan gave the recital on Wednesday 8th May.

Entitled 'A Spring Bouquet of Songs and Piano Pieces' we were treated to 45 minutes of delights. From well-known pieces like *Down By The Sally Gardens* by Britten to *Voi che sapete* from Mozart's *Marriage of Figaro* to *Getting To Know You* from *The King & I* by Richard Rodgers to the more complex and challenging piece (not that it showed), the dark and sinister story of *The Nurses Song* by Benjamin Britten.

Later, he played three short lyric pieces by Edvard Grieg, the theme of the very first piece of the collection, *Arietta* (Little Song), was one of Grieg's favourite melodies. Then he played a tune known for the 1955 *The Woodentops* theme!

I personally enjoyed the two bagatelles by Beethoven, Jonathan commented on his favourite recording of the bagatelles played by world renowned pianist Sviatoslav Richter. We can not thank both Wendy and Jonathan enough for a thoroughly enjoyable lunchtime recital.

Hopefully, we look forward to seeing the trio back together next season.

On Wednesday 12th June, we welcome Patrick Crooke and Ben Payne, who will delight with music by Mozart, Beethoven, Telemann and Bartok in a programme featuring various combinations of string duets. DO JOIN US.

remember.



Who doesn't love a party?

Actually, I know quite a few, but ignoring the outliers, June is party month in Spexhall, with Woodpecker knows, to which ALL are invited! As you know our little church is dedicated to St Peter, the day when we celebrate him every year is June

The party has been going on in Spexhall since at least 1150, and this year we want to make it a big one because we are having it on SUNDAY 30th JUNE at 10am with a special Team Holy Communion. For those not so up on the terminology it is our PATRONAL FESTIVAL.

We are so lucky that this is the 5th Sunday, so we are the only church in the whole Team to be having a morning service at that time. That's handy, because it means everyone can

make it (unless you have something pre -booked like a wedding or something that weekend, which shows lack of forward planning as far as Woodpecker is concerned!).

Wouldn't it be great to have a morning where we sing some well-known hymns, celebrate our life as a community, have a party in the pightle (field behind the church) afterwards where the champagne will flow (well, maybe one bottle unless you bring one! Other drinks and snacks/nibbles available). We would love you to come, even if you rarely visit the church, we know you love it to be here. We especially invite Parish Councillors, District Councillors, the Village Hall committee and anyone from the Huntsman who can come, or the Spexhall football team (maybe there is a game at that time, Woodpecker isn't up on the football scene!).

We would also really appreciate it if people from the other Blyth Valley churches dedicated to St Peter would come and celebrate with us. We promise not to hog this festival every

If you have a loved one buried in the churchyard, you might like to come and celebrate with us, too, or if you have moved from Spexhall and would like to catch up with old friends, come along! We even have the Team Choir led by Karen, and our organist Jason, helping the music along. Flowers will adorn the church, the massive George Flag will fly, (thanks St Mary's!) and the bell will be rung out across the village. We will even get out the Elizabethan chalice and paten.

St Peter's has had baptisms, weddings, funerals and festivals celebrated for centuries. Let's make this one a special festival. So why St Peter?

Quick CV/Obituary: Fisherman, disciple, was actually called 'The Rock' by Jesus as second in command (good name for a DJ these days), told Jesus he thought he was the Messiah and got confused when told not to tell anyone (yet!), was told he would have the 'keys to the Kingdom of Heaven', denied knowing Jesus three times before the cock crowed, at last called him Christ after the day of Pentecost, stayed put in Jerusalem most of the time as head of the first Christians as the disciples (now apostles) went out missionaries, had a row with St Paul (it's Paul's feast day as well btw, but we will pass that one by) and ended up in

If that's not a life at least worth a service, I don't know what is. *Fun fact:* the third most popular dedication for churches in the Church of England. (Roman Catholics continue his story, but you will have to look that one up!).

Rogation Sunday (12th May)

A lovely walk was held by a happy band of pilgrims (see photo below) with a service put together by Jason and Geoffrey, with stops along the way to consider the beauty of our land, give thanks for those who work on it and produce our food, and pray for those in need. Hymns sung in both Wissett and Spexhall churches, followed by a 'slap-up' tea in the village hall, with thanks to those who baked and served. Remember this is a Team Walk/Service and all are welcome. Do join us next year. We keep Rogation Sunday as the first Sunday in May if we can (or as near as possible). Woodpecker didn't know of these agricultural festivals until recently. He had to look up that Rogation comes from 'rogare' in Latin ('to ask'). We ask for God's blessing.

The Churchyard

Most know that our churchyard is a wildlife sanctuary. The wildflowers and wildlife are a sign of the beauty and wonder of God's creation. If you have a loved one whose grave you like to visit but find it difficult to walk through to it, do bring some shears and cut a path for yourself. Some paths are mown for general access. We believe that respect is shown to all the departed by allowing our churchyard to be a wild and wonderful place.

However, even the wildest things need taming and on Tuesday 9th July from about 6pm (earlier if you can make it) anyone with a strimmer, secateurs, loppers, saws and rakes are invited to help with cutting back the Spring growth, because out of that will come the glory of next year's flowers. If anyone doubts we care about our churchyard, come and visit that evening (and other evenings if it is wet) and see a team hard at work. Let's not get binary about this. It is not 'men's work'. Those of any gender are very welcome to help us out. The more the merrier (well, it's hard work, but a bit merry!).

Woodpecker has noticed that the number of artificial flowers on graves, as well as ornaments, has been increasing in recent times. We respectfully remind those who tend graves that the Diocesan rules do not officially allow artificial flowers or ornaments. Why not think of planting some Spring bulbs or other planted flowers. No flowers on a grave is not a sign of disrespect.

Compost

If you watch 'Gardener's World' you might have seen Monty Don turning over his compost and taking out lovely loamy soil (does he really do it all himself?). Well our compost bin gets old Christmas wreaths full of plastic and wire and oasis, plastic trays and other such stuff slung in it, and Woodpecker won't be around for the 500 years it would take for it to compost down. So, the 'compost bin' is being removed and there will, in time, be a green bin for compostable material only. This will be collected by the Council.

You can assist us to help the environment by placing the right thing in the correct bin. When putting other rubbish in the black bin, it helps if it is in a bin bag first. The more you take home to dispose of, the more it helps everyone. We all know how easy it is to be forgetful, or quickly get rid of something. Plastic in the blue bin, and

paper, too. Non recyclables go in the black bin, and take glass to the bottle bank. Thanks so much for helping us!



How to pray for Israel and Gaza? A few weeks ago an item popped up in one of my news feeds: What the Bible says about the Israel-Gaza war (https://www.premier christianity. com/opinion/what-the-bible-says-about-the-israel-gaza-war/ 16784.article if you would like to read it for yourself). This turns out to be a very complex question, not surprisingly. The author, Revd Mark Woods says we look to the Bible for guidance, particularly in big things, and surely it must say something about this, but if we go to the Bible for simple answers we won't find them. A knowledge of scripture texts alone is not enough, we need to understand what's happening there. Great wrongs have happened to both sides, and both sides have committed terrible deeds on the other. Woods suggests there are three things in particular we need to do to and three things that should shape how we pray (we may not agree, but they are interesting and worthy of consideration).

- 1 We need to feel, not just think: both sides are driven by an intense moral conviction that is felt in the heart
- 2 We need to know our history and current affairs.
- 3 We need to know that Christians before us have thought about war too.

And when we pray

- 1 No human being is worth more or less than another because of where they were born or the language they speak; each of us is made in the image of God.
- 2 Christians resign vengeance into God's hands. We should pray that the desire for revenge is restrained and that good prevails.
- 3 We believe the words of Jesus who said 'Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God".

I have recently read and enjoyed two books, very different in scope and viewpoint, which, it occurred to me, would coincidentally help inform our knowledge of the history and current affairs.



Bethlehem: biography of a town, by Nicholas Blincoe. Bethlehem is in Palestine. no longer the "little town" of Christmas and the Bible but a modern city with a university, and was predominantly, in modern times, an Arab Christian town until Yasser Arafat arrived. The author is married to an Arab film maker and

spends his time between Bethlehem and London. Quoting from the Guardian review, the book is 'part history, part travelogue and memoir... a highly discursive, frequently amusing, often tragic but always accessible history'. The history of Bethlehem, from stone age to the present, is the history of that piece of land that has been Canaan and Palestine and Israel and always the Promised Land to the Jews, a strip of land that was an important trade route and therefore a desirable possession to many different empires.

The Jewish Jesus: reconnecting with the truth about Jesus, Israel and the Church, by David Hoffbrand. Hoffbrand is a Jewish Christian. lives in Brighton and is a member of a Pentecostal church. In this easy, friendly, compelling book he explores with wit and clarity the answers to questions such as "what relevance does it have for us (Christians) that



Jesus is Jewish and what difference should it make to our faith?" On the way he emphasises God created and chose Israel, God loves Israel, the Church hasn't replaced Israel, God is not punishing Israel, God has a continuing plan for Israel, that gentile Christians are grafted into the tree of Israel. Along the way a positive future for Israel is in the frame, so maybe this book is an antidote, if any were needed, to the book above!






