The previous trophy, a rather dull shield, had filled to capacity with winners' plaques, and it was handed to the Halesworth team on a permanent basis because they had won it more times than anyone else (eight times in 21 years).

Philip commented "To be honest, we didn't ring quite as well as we did last year when we only came second, but it was good enough to win this year, and by a large margin, too."



#### From the Rector...

The Sundays in July are simply named as their ranked order after Trinity Sunday. That was the last special Sunday for some while. Liturgically, it is a time of year called 'ordinary time'. The word carries the meaning 'ranked order' in this context. However, in common parlance, ordinary tends to suggest the mundane and common place.

Most of us have times in our lives when we feel nothing very much is happening. We are just working nine to five (what a way to make a living), or once again waking up trying to remember what day it is, waiting for our carer, and falling asleep again. A Facebook memory or tune on the wireless, may remind us of some significant event. Whether it was a happy or sad occasion, we may mull our reactions over in our mind. We may try and number the days since or name the people present or those died or born since.

From a church community point of view, it remains common to look back to life before the current vicar or life before Covid. A word perhaps somewhat over used during the pandemic period was 'unprecedented'. Yet, for many of us and our church communities our experiences were just that. What was particularly unusual for churches was to find so many people's circumstances changing simultaneously. Normally, one or two people leave or join faith groups every so often at times of change. These may be new jobs, new accommodation, new schools, new physical situations, new relationship contexts or as for John Wesley: a religious experience. Over Covid significant quantities of people moved, died, or changed their attendance or giving habits. So, some of the few remaining members of a number of our congregations ruefully count the Sundays since the pews and coffers were a good deal fuller than they are now.

This puts me in mind of the writings of the Torah or the Law, the first five books of the Hebrew Scriptures. After Genesis, they are all about inspiring a people of hope in an ordinary time of mundane ordinariness after emancipation from slavery or restoration from exile. God's people complain. The situation gets worse. God's people moan. Only or two, of twelve, people sent to scout the future landscape of God's intention came back positive about its likely fulfilment. They wandered more. Most died in the wilderness. Yet their shoes didn't wear out. They were fed. They had some remarkable collective religious experiences. I suspect many of the weary wanderers counted the Sabbaths since they knew a warm bed, a warm heart and a warm meal.

So the Sundays may resonate with the ordinariness in our lives, individual and collective, however there are some significant feast days dotted through the month. These like families enjoying school holidays or couples getting married dot the monotonous sky like shooting stars. Like the faithful spies Caleb and Joshua they inspire us to view our circumstances with a glass half-full rather than glass half-

empty mentality. Thomas (3rd) known as doubting for quite sensibly needing more information before hanging up his brain and accepting others' stories in blind faith. Though he said he recognised Jesus as 'The Way' 'My Lord and my God' taking that message as far as India according to some Mary (22nd), was a woman used to being excluded, used and abused with a head full of chaos and internal voices. She then met a man who loved her in a way she had never been loved before, a rabbi who talked with her as an equal. Anne and Joachim (26th) Jesus' maternal grandparents. Wilberforce (30th) whose tireless work lead to the abolition of state support for slavery, encourages our work to eradicate modern day slavery in homes, farms and brothels in our villages and towns today. Ignatius (31st) whose spiritual exercises such as Lectio Divina, Examen and Visualisation still inspire today.

The annual Christian Greenbelt festival once had the theme 'Heaven in Ordinary'. In this interminable season of counting the days since whenever or whatever, or counting the number of people we don't see on Sunday, may I encourage us to count our blessings one by one. May Elisha pray for us as he did his servant Gehazi, that our eyes may be opened to the great cloud of witnesses that surround us. encouraged that as we abide in God, God abides in us. Be reminded of those parables like the lost sheep, the widow's mite and the labourers in the vineyard. These are the Bible's version of beware of lies, damn lies and statistics or not everything that counts can be counted. Further Jesus said: 'Where two or three are gathered there I am also' – and that doesn't have to be on a Sunday. Have a flick though this volume and you'll be surprised at just how much unprecedented heaven there is in what God is doing through us ordinary people in this ordinary time. **Dominic**

#### **Epic Cycle ride for Halesworth Dementia Carers Fund**

Two brave cyclists, Giles Scoble (son-in-law of our Patron Paddy Cox) and his friend Simon will be undertaking a coast to coast cycle ride to raise funds for the Halesworth Dementia Carers Fund and Pancreatic Cancer Action. Their aim is to leave St David's, on the far west coast of Wales, and cycle across to Ness Point in Lowestoft, a ride of over 400 miles. To make things even harder they will be totally self-supporting, with no back-up vehicles or mechanics. This remarkable journey will begin on Wednesday 19th July. ## Friends of St Mary's - St Mary The Virgin Church, Halesworth - A little bit of history: Monuments of all shapes and sizes - Part 10

The final part of this exploration of the many monuments in our parish church opens with a fine interior feature of St Mary's, the vestry arch over the door leading from the chancel to the vestry. A traceried arch, above which is a label flanked by two angels with a carved Latin inscription which was originally filled in with pitch forming the black lettering, this translates to "Pray for the souls of Thomas Clement and Margaret his consort who caused this vestry to be made."

Thomas Clement died in 1438 and made his will in September of the same year. The Rector, Walter Annable, was a witness, and his wife, Margaret, was the first of his five executors. Thomas requested burial in the churchyard and gave twenty shillings for church repairs, although no mention is made of the vestry.

Note the large beast head at the top of the arch, and the inscription, flanked by two angels holding shields, in black lettering; it ran out of space and the last two letters are on the shield of the right-hand angel. The renaissance style of the angel suggests the benefactor had modern and urbane taste. Head stops on the arch perhaps represent Thomas and Margaret. The four petal motif around this and other archways in the church are thought to represent a rose and may once have been painted red, signifying either the Virgin Mary or the Royal House of Lancaster, or perhaps both.

Thomas Clement was an executor for the will of William Argentein, and we conclude this look at monuments in St Mary's by remembering the Argentein family, whose arms appear in several parts of the church to which they were generous benefactors. On the exterior of the church, on the N. E. buttress is a signature statuette of a knight and his lady (much weathered), with the Argentein arms beneath, possibly of Sir William Argentein, (c1350-1419), with one of his wives.

The North Porch was reputedly built by Sir William in thanks for his safe return, and that of his son William, from the Battle of Agincourt fought on 25 October 1415, St Crispin's Day. This dynasty were Lords of the Manor of Halesworth c1130-1424. Notice over the porch the emblems of the Trinity and of the Passion, the latter cradled by sculptured roses, a flower particularly associated with the Virgin Mary, invoking a vision of the Virgin Mary holding a dead Christ in her arms. A medieval Pietà.

Inside, behind the organ was originally the Lady Chapel, erected by the Argenteins in the perpendicular style. As this architectural style came in after 1350 it is not certain whether to attribute the build to John Argentein (1318-1383) or William (1350-1419). However, it could be significant that William and Margery, his wife, were first entombed there, before later being moved to the St Loy Chapel, (now the Lady Chapel, with, on the floor, the ledger stones of William and Margery Argentein, now without their brasses).

As there is no mention of the building of the original Lady Chapel in the will of John Argentein and his wife Margaret, recent research suggests the chapel was built in John's lifetime (before 1383). William made his will in Halesworth in 1417 and left £5 for the repair of the church. John had previously left 10 shillings for the repair of the church. The arch in which the organ sits bears carved shields whose interpretation is of much speculation. Photographs taken with some difficulty by Jason Busby, organist, squeezing into the space, are displayed in the church.

The Argentein coat of arms can be seen in the elaborate decoration with large fleuron on the broad mouldings and its jambs of the perpendicular arch between the chancel and the present Lady Chapel. The arms, three covered cups, denote that the family served as royal cup bearers, a ceremonial office first awarded on the coronation of Henry II. This influential family played an important role in establishing Halesworth as a flourishing market town from the 12th to the 15th century.

The manors of Halesworth were held for about three centuries by the Argenteins, and came into the family by the marriage of Sir Reginald Argentein to Rose, heiress of Thomas de Halesworth, before 1130. The last male Argentein having died and the line being extinct by about 1420, the property passed, again by marriage, to the Allingtons. The Argenteins had manors in eleven counties in southern England, the main being in Hertfordshire, and were also the holders of many important offices from the Crown. The manor house of Halesworth, was described as 'ruinated' and its park gone by 1602.

#### From the Ringing Chamber



When not practising for the competition (featured on the front page of this issue of BVTimes) we've been working on a new (for us) method called Single Oxford Bob Minor (Minor means on six bells). It's taken a while to get this one up to scratch but we are now ringing it quite well and I hope to manage a quarter peal of it soon.

Pete and I have been helping at a new District initiative, a teaching hub at Reydon every Saturday morning. Together with a couple of other teachers we've been helping a dozen or so new ringers to hone their skills, including our own Kari and Joanna. The idea is to help learners progress more quickly than they would otherwise so they can become useful to their own bands sooner.

Finally, although we still do not have enough competent ringers to ring all eight bells at Halesworth, we have started ringing for the evening service once a month. We can do this by calling on ringers from other towers where there is no longer an evening service, and we rang a decent quarter peal of Grandsire Triples on June 4th. The band consisted of just four Halesworth ringers and two others from within Blyth Valley, so we couldn't have managed without some help from our friends, but at least it is a chance to get Halesworth's bells ringing well sometimes.

#### **Environmental Update from Waveney and Blyth Deanery**

One of the biggest developments in our environmental work as churches in the Waveney and Blyth Deanery is the growing co-operation across different parishes and denominations. Our own Climate Action Conference at the end of September will be a major contribution to this. Here are details of some of the other things that have been happening:

#### Christian Aid Week

One of the events organised for the week was a showing of the film "Thank You For The Rain" at St Margaret's Reydon. Released in 2017, "Thank You For The Rain" is a collaborative film made by Kisilu Musya, a Kenyan farmer, climate fighter and video diarist, and Julia Dahr, a Norwegian filmmaker and activist. The film follows Kisilu Musya over five years, from small scale farmer to activist on a global scale. It is a powerful film, described in one review as "a compelling, engaging, and complex portrait of an environmental activist." A group of us from the Blyth Valley Team attended the showing and discussed how we could share the film with our own churches and communities, possibly as part of our Harvest Festivals.

The Deanery has a license to show the film and I have a copy. To find out more about the film itself visit Thank You For The Rain | About | Worlds collide on the frontline of climate change.

#### Eco-Church Open Day

Several people from the Blyth Valley Team attended the Eco Church "Act for Nature" event at Emmanuel Church in Bungay on May 27th. Emmanuel Church is one of only 31 churches in the country which has achieved its Gold Eco-Church Award and it was fascinating to learn about the many different initiatives they have put in place to achieve this. During the afternoon, we heard talks from different members of A Rocha UK and the Eco Church team. One of the main messages was how Christians have the potential to make a big difference in promoting care for the environment and climate justice. There are around 50 000 churches in the UK and A Rocha UK are aiming to have 25% of them registered. A key feature of the scheme is it enables churches to work with their

#### Wilder Wenhaston Open Gardens

On Sunday 4th June, gardens around Wenhaston were open to the public to show how they are being planned and managed to support wildlife and biodiversity. Several members of local congregations opened up their gardens and encouraged visitors to appreciate the potential of gardens to attract a wide variety of plantlife, insects, birds and wildlife. The event enabled some positive conversations about the church's role in caring for creation.

#### The Climate Imaginarium

On Saturday 10th June, the Quakers held a "Climate Imaginarium" day as part of the "Big Green Week." Rather than focusing on the enormous challenges that face us as the climate changes, the exhibition focused on ways we CAN make a difference. People could record their hopes on a Tree of Hope, and everyone was invited to write a letter to the future setting out what they hoped the world would be like in 2030. The "Letters to Tomorrow" campaign is national. Letters will be sent to MPs and published to help the public reflect on what the future could be like if we address the climate and biodiversity issues that face us. Again, several people from BVT attended the day as well as Peter Aldous MP.





My Oxford Dictionary of Saints tells

My Oxford Dictionary of Saints tells me that Swithun was Bishop of Winchester. He died on 2nd July 862 and had asked to be buried in the cemetery, which he was, by the west door. His relics were moved into the cathedral on 15th July 971 on which day it rained heavily which was seen as a manifestation of Swithun's powers. I wonder if they wanted rain then in July 971?

I have been chiding myself for not getting on with making a record of all the graves in the churchyard. I started then stopped as it seemed as hard a task as the poor Miller's daughter having to spin all that straw into gold before morning in the Fairy Story Rumpelstiltskin.

I did make a start however, beginning with the graves from the Lodge Lane gate to the path to the shed. Some are very worn and really hard to read at all unless the sun is at just the right angle. One of these worn ones is for Susannah Hagger who died on 7th September 1816 "in the 97th year of her age". 97

would have lived through and what her grandparents could have told her. As Sir Philip Sidney (1554-1586) writes in his poem, Why Fear to Die?, "Our life is but a step in dusty way." I find that comforting. Susannah Hagger's grave is

#### The Elixir

Teach me, my God and King, In all things thee to see, And what I do in anything, To do it as for thee:


Not rudely, as a beast, To runne into an action; But still to make thee prepossest, And give it his perfection.

A man that looks on glasse, On it may stay his eye; Or if he pleaseth, through it passe, And then the heav'n espie.

All may of thee partake:
Nothing can be so mean,
Which with his tincture (for thy sake)
Will not grow bright and clean.

A servant with this clause Makes drudgerie divine: Who sweeps a room, as for thy laws, Makes that and th' action fine.

This is the famous stone
That turneth all to gold:
For that which God doth touch and own
Cannot for lesse be told.



I was musing on school assemblies today, day-dreaming perhaps, probably because we'd just done an Open the Book session at our local primary school. How different from my school days when we had a mini "act of worship" with prayers, a reading and a hymn (our headmaster exhorted the boys to stop growling and make a better effort). A favourite hymn was the poem opposite, sung to a quite brisk and perky tune, although I do not recall singing verse two, it's actually hard to sing in the tune we used so we were probably singing the tidied-up Wesley version.

The poem is *The Elixir* by George Herbert 1593-1633, an all-round lovely man by all accounts, loved by his parishioners. His collection of religious poems, *The Temple*, quickly sold 20,000 copies, a large number at that time. Several of them have become popular hymns; they show a warm, genuine faith, not without its struggles, and an unassuming character. He wrote his own version of Psalm 23, centuries before Stuart Townend, and *Love* ("Love bade me welcome; yet my soul drew back, Guilty of dust and sin") which many of us will have heard at least once on a radio poetry programme, or come across while studying the metaphysical poets at school (is that still done, I wonder?).

Katherine Langrish, who also sang "Teach me my God and King" at school wrote "The success of Herbert's poetry is partly in his ability to articulate things we feel we have always known but never said so well. Light can pass through glass, yet glass can also obscure what is behind it. St Paul's words 'now we see as through a glass, darkly; but then face to face' (1 Corinthians 13:12) must surely have been in his mind as he wrote that verse. For Herbert, God was the light behind the glass, the light which illumines the world."

God was, in fact, the only true elixir, the only source of eternal life.

And like Herbert we can pray "Thou who hast given so much to me, give me one more thing... a grateful heart".






