

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

From the Rector...

What does your identity mean to you? How do you identify? One of our grown up, married friends, with children, writes a blog. In a recent post they wrote about making a decision to pursue, create and or discover their identity.

In the run up to Easter, we left the altar bare, some churches remove or obscure symbols of their Christian identity. We also held a couple of events exploring the disfiguring of creation through the medium of Jesus' brutalisation – his loss of identity. As Easter unfolds, we are reminded of the ancient Hebrew stories of God's people pursuing, creating and or discovering their identity on emancipation, whilst wandering in the wilderness, wondering at their establishment. We are invited to participate in Mary's searching in the wrong place for comfort in her loss, in the face of her obscured fulfilment until her identity is called out and she, a representative of the demonised, finds a voice, role and purpose. Then, this month we celebrate the birthday of the church fifty days after the feast of the resurrection. This was the occasion when a distinctive experience that came to be used to identify believers was first witnessed.

Identity is still a hot topic. How many organisations can be seen flying a Palestinian flag? How many young people give or take their lives in desperation to be someone? How much money is spent by organisations and individuals to present themselves as the answer to our question? It is my hope, that increasingly as we wander together in the wilderness that is our world today, we will learn more of who we, and they, are as individuals and as organisations. Recognising our shared pain at disfigurement and misrepresentation. Inspiring our shared gain from collective ambition and complementarity.

All too often, any person or group may hold a view or opinion of another that is uninformed or shallow. Their presumption may come from hearsay or be extrapolated from a limited sample of one or two generalised to include the whole. Those outside the church may disregard adherents as, at best, irrelevant and boring or, at worst, slightly worryingly misguided if sincere. Factions within, may not consider others as



even being proper believers at all because they identify as this or that, or practise this or that. Looking outward, those inside the church may object to nonchurch people being involved in activities that used to be done in-house, or getting married here when we never see them otherwise.

Counter-intuitively, at least one answer to the challenge of finding and presenting identity as individual or organisation, is offered by participating in community. This is an age old ecological principle. Not so much the survival of the fittest; but, the survival of the best protected. Think flocks of birds or shoals of fish. As we connect ourselves with those with whom we largely agree, or otherwise, we are enabled to express a distinctiveness that would otherwise go unnoticed and be lost to us.

The extraordinary thing that happened at Pentecost was that people from across the known world, saw the church and some got it. And, some people from across the known world who also saw but chose not to. Even the self-confessed atheist Richard Dawkins recently famously asserted himself to be a 'cultural Christian'. This confirms my view that the Church of England is, or should be, a safe place for everyone. Those who do not really know what they do believe and those who are sure they know what they don't. If that is you, come on down. We need your practical, moral and financial support as our village and town communities to be able to express and inspire the justice, hope, faith, creativity and peace for which, I think, we all yearn. In turn, we offer vou our buildings, voice, churchyards, connections, spirituality and activities giving encouragement and space for you and your hopes and fears, aims and objectives and all that makes you, you.

One of the exciting things that happened with us was the group trip to Spring Harvest.

Leaving for Skegness on Easter Monday, 27 of us mainly from the young families' ministry spent the week with around 5,000 people, enjoying a festival of worship, Bible teaching, activities, fun and fellowship.

Our group included 17 children ranging from just over a year to mid-teens. The children and youth provision is so good for all age groups. And for parents & children - and all others who wanted to, each day included the 'Big Start Boot Camp' with actors playing fitness/sports people who get sent on a 'mini-mission' linked to a Bible story. Daily mottos and a theme song added to the feel of togetherness and sense of purpose. Then the children went to their age specific groups, which they all loved, and there were Bible sessions and seminars for the adults.

The rest of the day included many workshops to dip into, free time, access to all the Butlins facilities and all age worship plus evening celebrations with some excellent speakers.

Overall, a faith-building experience!

Now, with the schools back we have returned to 'normal' church life, The Open the Book team are back to weekly sessions at Edgar Sewter School. Home groups continue, in some cases with materials based on the themes from Spring Harvest, drawing on Paul's letter to the Ephesians.

And having celebrated Easter, we continue to live the experience of being 'Easter People' as we look forward to Pentecost.

What has your Team Vicar been up to?

It's true that Easter is probably the busiest time of the year for we clergy. There is a lot going on between Palm Sunday when we remember how Jesus was welcomed by crowds in Jerusalem and Good Friday when those same crowds were crying out for his

death on the cross. It was a joy finally to share the celebration of Jesus coming back from the dead, in St Mary's Halesworth on Easter Sunday morning. What a joy to be able to remind everyone that it was all about God's unconditional, radically generous love for absolutely everyone. Alleluia!

In Easter week, I took two funerals, which were perhaps more meaningful being so close to Easter, when we are reminded of how God is with us through the highest ups and the deepest downs, and that God loves us, and is with us, no matter what. Maybe that is what people who say they are jealous of people with faith, are missing. That consolation of unconditional love. I wonder if people find it difficult to realise that it is freely given to all, not earned, not bargained for but just there to be accepted. Surely there's a catch? I struggled with this for years in my twenties and thirties, but I gradually came to realise I was rejecting the very thing I needed most.

Back to what I have been up to recently. I took the second week of April off and was grateful to be taking a break because I was feeling a lot of new pain down my right side, especially in my leg. I spoke to my MS nurse on Monday and she said I was due a review and recommended a medication for nerve pain. On Tuesday an old friend came to see me and I finally got to take my electric trike out beyond the drive, up the road and onto the track past Kinda Forest School. I ignored the pain and was absolutely chuffed with myself.

The next day I was extremely uncomfortable and to cut a long story short, was diagnosed with shingles. A big thank you to Cutler's Hill surgery for dealing with me so kindly and efficiently. If anyone out there has been offered and not yet had their shingles jab, please go and get it. I am very glad that my new symptoms were not a worsening of the MS, but it is very painful and I wouldn't wish it on anyone. The trike will have to wait for a while – I'm resting up and trying not to get too frustrated. It's so difficult not to feel guilty.

Anyway, it is almost May, now, my favourite time of the year, when everything flourishes and nature shows off her true splendour. No-mow-May seems to be a regular thing, although last year turned into a no-mow-2024 at The Vicarage. It doesn't rhyme so well, and it may not be good to not mow at all, but the wildness has certainly added to the variety of plant and wildlife in the garden. I suppose that's what we have to remember. The world is a wild and wonderful thing that keeps turning in spite of us. Some of it is ordered, most of it does its own thing. It goes for everything I suppose: we can only do what we can where we are and whatever state we are in. Receive the love, share the love and have faith that in the spheres beyond our understanding, all will be well.

From the Ringing Chamber



The big news this month – OK, it's not that big, don't get too excited - is that we at last successfully rang a quarter peal of Single Court Bob Minor at Wissett. Single Court is not actually that difficult, but avid readers will know from previous reports that we had failed to complete the 1272 changes in four previous attempts. This time the team was determined to score. I had persuaded my little sister to help us out, leaving me to ring the treble and concentrate on putting the calls in the right place. Everything was going to plan, and we were three guarters of the way through, when the light started to flicker, not just the occasional dimming, but violently like a strobe in a disco, and it didn't stop. I was all ready to go and beat up an electrician, but fortunately the team stuck to the task, despite the migraine-inducing atmosphere, and we struggled to the end. Phew! Seldom was a pint in the Angel so well-earned!

The next day, Saturday, saw some of us hiking over to Stowmarket for the AGM of the Suffolk Guild of Ringers. Although a quarter peal attempt at Buxhall failed after some decent ringing, we enjoyed the new ring of ten bells at

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The next day we followed up Friday's success with a quarter peal of Grandsire Triples at Halesworth, ostensibly for Evensong except, with Dominic on holiday, there wasn't actually a service! There were no memorable firsts in this, but lots of consolidatory practice, and a reminder of how difficult Halesworth's bells are to ring well.

Which brings me on to the other bit of excitement this month: the visit to Bramfield and Halesworth of Mark from Whites of Appleton, one of the country's leading bell hangers. We haven't received his written reports yet, but the important news from his immediate verbal comments is that one of Bramfield's bells, the fourth, is in a potentially dangerous condition and should not be rung (except for very important reasons, like a coronation). That effectively means that Bramfield bells will not be rung for the foreseeable future. It will in theory be possible to ring the front three (the tenor of fifth is heading the same way as the fourth) if needs be, e.g. for a wedding, but otherwise they will be left well alone until such time as funds are available to carry out whatever work is required.

We didn't really learn anything about Halesworth bells that we didn't already know: now we just need some figures for how much it will cost to make them enjoyable to ring.

Finally, it was nice to be able to ring a quarter peal on the lovely-sounding bells at Chediston for the Team Evensong. Illness and band substitution meant we rang something more straightforward than originally planned, but that meant we did at least have some good ringing in places.

Do you know our next Diocesan Treasurer?



CHRISTIAN AID WEEK APPEAL, 12th – 18th MAY

Seven days, so many ways to make a difference. This is a week when we come together to raise funds, act and pray for our global neighbours in a celebration of hope for a fairer world.

This year, we are focusing on our work in Burundi, one of the poorest countries in Africa. Through the remarkable story of Aline, who overcame a long and difficult journey out of extreme poverty, we are aiming to support others in the same way. This begins with just a little support, knowledge and faith from Christian Aid supporters like you.

Poverty pushed Aline to the brink of survival Aline felt the full force of extreme poverty when an early marriage ended in abuse and violence.

Separated from her six children, she was forced to sleep on the streets of Burundi. No home. No healthcare. No security.


But Aline was determined to push back against the inhumanity of poverty, driven by hope, faith and the love of her children. She transformed her life with a little help from Christian Aid.

Life in Burundi

In Burundi, malnourishment and poverty affect more than 70% of the population, making survival a daily struggle. Jobs and food are hard to come by, and those who have homes often have no electricity or running water.

For Aline, life was a constant struggle. She was married young and gave birth to her eldest son, Fisto, when she was just 14 years old. Aline experienced constant abuse at the hands of her violent husband.

A few years later, Aline faced even more devastation. Her husband married another woman, forcing Aline to flee. He prevented her from taking their children with her, and in a further act of cruelty, told the local community that Aline was mentally ill and unable to care for her children.



"I wandered the streets, asking anyone for a place to sleep. Those who showed me kindness would let me stay for two or three days, but it was difficult. People would insult me and treat me with contempt. They forgot I was a human being. It filled me with sorrow."

How Christian Aid stepped in

Hungry, scorned and alone, Aline took her first step towards her new life. She started by participating in a transformative three-day community workshop, funded by Christian Aid.

'I came out with amazing knowledge and skills. The trainer restored a sense of hope and energy in me,' says Aline. She was taught how to form a Village Savings and Loans Association (VSLA) and establish a steady income. VSLAs mean


a steady income. VSLAs mean people can save for their future and borrow money to kick-start small rural businesses. With all



she had learned, Aline's dream of getting her children back finally felt possible.

Café Church goes shopping for Kagera

This year during Lent the Café Church congregation followed the Bishops' themed booklet on life in Kagera, Tanzania, our link diocese. Each week we learned about life in this area of northern Tanzania and how the money raised through the Bishops' Lent Appeal is used to support the growing churches and the needs of the people. Each week our Café Church service used a bilingual English/Swahili liturgy, which was a thought-provoking experience. No doubt our attempts at Swahili would have caused much amusement in Kagera. We were particularly struck by the East African Masai Creed, which captures our faith in a simple and dramatic way:

An East African Masai Creed

We believe in the one High God, who out of love created the beautiful world and everything good in it. He created Man and wanted Man to be happy in the world. God loves the world and every nation and tribe on the Earth.

This we believe.

We have known this High God in darkness, and now we know Him in the light. God promised in the book of His word, the Bible, that He would save the world and all the nations and tribes.

This we believe.

We believe that God made good His promise by sending His Son, Jesus Christ, a man in the flesh, a Jew by tribe, born poor in a little village, who left His home and was always on safari doing good, curing people by the power of God, teaching about God and man, showing the meaning of religion is love.

This we believe.

He was rejected by his people, tortured and nailed hands and feet to a cross, and died. He lay buried in the grave, but

the hyenas did not touch him, and on the third day, He rose from the grave. He ascended to the skies. He is the Lord.

This we believe.

We believe that all our sins are forgiven through Him. All who have faith in Him must be sorry for their sins, be baptized in the Holy Spirit of God, live the rules of love and share the bread together in love, to announce the Good News to others until Jesus comes again.

We are waiting for Him. He is alive. He lives. This we believe. Amen.

During Lent we discovered the joy and strength of the growing congregations in Kagera and the challenges they face as subsistence farmers living with the uncertainties of climate change. Priests and lay evangelists are not only trained for leadership and mission. They also learn agricultural skills to share with their congregations and to use for their own needs.

As part of this year's appeal, we were given a weekly shopping list to help us understand how the money from donations is spent. Our completed shopping list will be on display in St Mary's Church, Halesworth from the beginning of May. Copies of the list will be available for individual churches to display so congregations and visitors can see how we actively support work to counter global poverty and climate injustice.



FoSM review of the recital by the Aurora Consort on Saturday 6th April MY SPIRIT SANG - Time-travel with us through the glories of English a cappella

How often do you hear soaring voices of the highest quality reach to the very top of our wonderful 15th century tower? How often to be able, on a lovely spring day, to listen to a concert with such an interesting, varied and uplifting repertoire? It may be thought by some, that a cappella music is secondary to that which is accompanied. If you needed proof to the contrary, this was the concert to have attended! The human voice, our original instrument, has tremendous power, agility and emotion.

Vetta Wise, who directs the ensemble, not only chose music which traversed 500 years of English unaccompanied music, but also made full use of the talents of the choir to sing in both simple and complex harmonies, and sometimes for single voices to soar over the harmonies beneath.

Many of us are familiar with the Renaissance music of Tallis and Weekes, but adding Stanford's *Beati Quorum* made for a fascinating insight into how a 19th century composer brings back harmonic structures of the 15th and 16th century. Tavener's *The Lamb* is somehow transformative to a realm beyond, and a joy to hear a female composer: Poston's *Jesus Christ the Apple Tree.* A member of the choir, Christopher Upton's work based on a portion of the Greek Liturgy, made for a fitting part to this section of the concert.

Among the secular music the love song *Since First I Saw Your Face* brought us to the beauty and longing found in the English madrigal tradition. Holst and Finzi, two of the great collectors and interpreters of English Folk songs were represented, with Holst's *I Love My Love*, a Cornish folk song, bringing a melody of the West Country to the East of England. To hear Stanford's *The Blue Bird*, with the soaring top line of the single soprano (Janet Upton), was just beautiful.

The final song was written by our very own local composer Alex Campkin, who was commissioned to write a piece for Vetta's birthday, with words by her sister-in-law. It has an obvious special place for the conductor, but Alex's work goes beyond the personal to the universal. How privileged we were to hear the first Suffolk performance of this piece.


... Then people long to go on pilgrimages ...

On such a day as this it is, or would be, a pleasure to drive to somewhere pretty and interesting for the afternoon, perhaps make it a project this year to do so regularly, weather permitting, a modern-day mini pilgrimage maybe. **Churches of Suffolk, by Sarah E Doig** could be a useful companion for such a pilgrimage. This book



is not comprehensive, the author confines herself to 50 of her favourite notable churches and admits omitting Wenhaston and Lavenham, and I note our own St Mary the Virgin is nowhere to be seen (perhaps to come in a second volume?).
