


From the Rector...

We have a couple of unusual weddings this month. They are not unusual because of the time of year, they are unusual because the couples asked to be married with two months' notice. It is more common for people to ask with two years' notice. With legal help, we can arrange marriages at very short notice indeed.

Weddings are one of those things that eight or so couples a year ask for from our Blyth Valley Churches. You'd have to ask them why thy come to us. I guess that for younger and older alike, there is something about the building as a backdrop for the pictures. Palm trees or pillars? Sandy beach or stained glass? Though, that is not all, of course. There is something about the fact that the building has seen many marriages already. One of those may have been a parent, grandparent or aunt. The building will see many more. The building marks a place, a village perhaps, of memories where our family is, or has been. Then, of course, however much we try to put it off, there is that special, spiritual, magical value added of marrying in a God spot. The pagan handfast traditions merge with the contractual signing over of property and the echoes of the Judeo-Christian covenant between God and creation

Back in the day, only the rich and privileged got married mainly to secure power and wealth. The rest of us lived together under common law. Then church and state colluded and intervened and the institution was Marriage both prevented and protected normalised. abuses, as it does today. The Church of England is quite confused about what marriage is just now and is trying to establish one rule for all. The church recognises register office marriages and previous church marriages, but not other significant past relationships, with or without children. Whilst some Bishops and Priests are in nonheterosexual, non-binary marriages, lay people cannot marry unless they are. You can in Wales and Scotland, by the way. Some people are less accepting of same sex spouses than unmarried cohabiters. This is a shame as those who live in love, live in God (1 John 4:16).

So why should you consider getting married? What is a piece of paper after all? At one level you'd be quite right. Then on another you are missing out. At one level nothing changes. Then on another everything is different. If you are a party animal and have no long term relationship ideals, that's potentially fine so long as you have the energy to fly from flower to flower. Yet, there is something reassuring about knowing one does not have



to be on form all the time for fear of losing the knack. Even in a relationship, proper, one argument or evening meeting too many, one look or suggested interest in another, can bring the whole thing crashing down. A church wedding includes the stated support of friends and family to make your covenant work. It includes the legal vows that a registry ceremony contain. protection, making the relationship secure enough to get you and yours through the lumps and bumps of being human and living in close proximity to an exclusive other for some time! The church bit also adds the tradition, the hope, the magic and the wonder that in a small way your relationship is a scale model of God's decision to establish a self-giving covenant with all creation to bring it to fruitful fulfilment. That's not just about one biblical, traditional or social model. Nor is it just about preferences for enjoying physical intimacy. Neither, is it just about having children. Rather it's about belonging as a couple among a loving, living, breathing spiritual community.

If you are interested, do get in touch. We'll check your eligibility connections with one of our churches, your nationality and your marital status. A few months before we will publish your Banns, asking if anyone knows a reason why you may not marry. At about that time, we read through the words of the service. Then we have a walk through the day before. On the day you have the opportunity to accept you may not marry and you say you would like to. Then you say your vows to each other before friends, family, the law and God - or at least the vicar (!) - and exchange rings. A reading or two and some music complete the memories. We sign a Marriage Document for the Register Office and you head on to your venue and the rest of your life to live happily ever after! Though, we're here for you to help you through any hard times and celebrate children in baptism or anniversaries with renewal of vows or blessings.

From the Ringing Chamber



The Vestey Ring is a "mini-ring" consisting of six bells hung for full-circle ringing, but weighing approximately just one hundredth of the bells in our church towers. Consequently they can do virtually no damage to people or fittings. The average person can learn to ring them in about ten minutes rather than ten weeks and they are a great introduction to proper ringing. Experienced ringers also use them to try out things that might make a bit of a din on tower bells.

Halesworth Heritage Open Weekend is on September 7th/8th, and we have booked the Vestey Ring to be erected in Halesworth church for a week from Saturday 7th through to the following weekend. We shall be manning the installation all day on Saturday 7th, and at any other reasonable time during the week on request. Anyone between the ages of about nine and 90 is welcome to have a go. Even if you can't manage the technique (too small or too creaky) you can still make a noise.



Friends of St Mary - Recital Review

On Wednesday 14th August, we welcomed international musician (local boy) Tom Horton to his debut recital in the FoSM series. Tom's musical skills cover the entire spectrum of organs, from classical to theatre pipe (Wurlitzer), from modern digital instruments to ancient pipe organs. Watching from the back, I noticed how entranced the audience were as Tom played through his programme. Despite the organ being poorly presently due to water damage (the bottom keyboard known as the 'Choir' wasn't usable) this didn't stop Tom from deploying the entire range of what we call 'stops' (the different sounds). From the gentle stops of the lieblich gedackt and viol d' amour in Bach's Sheep may safely graze to the trumpet and horn in an arrangement by Tom of Karl Jenkins Palladio. The magic of the organ - halfway through the recital, Tom gave us a tour of all the 'stops' from the merest whisper to the FULL organ, helping the audience understand how the "king of instruments" works.

An unexpected moment of fascinating pieces from television and radio brought the recital to a close, a joy to hear our organ being played in a very different way to normal! It surprisingly worked!

Like buses you wait for a while then we welcomed Tom, but hang on a minute, he returns to St Mary's on Friday 15th November for a concert first! We will be hosting a Silent Movie night. The film is the *Hunchback of Notre-Dame* with Tom playing the accompaniment on the ancient pipe organ of St Mary's. Put the date in your diary!

A HUGE thank you to Tom for joining us - a recital muchly enjoyed by all.

HALESWORTH WI

The Mary Rose was the title of the talk given by Dr Philip Roberts who works for the Mary Rose Trust, accompanied by slides he took us through the history of the wonderful ship from its beginning to its sad end when it sank while watched by King Henry VIII with the loss of many lives, possibly only 35 saved out of the 500 aboard.

The Mary Rose was not new, having worked and served as a transport when it was rebuilt to become King Henry's flag ship and fitted with heavy cannons to become a fighting vessel to face the French. The Mary Rose set out from Portsmouth to face the French fleet laying off the Isle of Wight keeling over and sinking within sight of the shore and the King.

It was estimated that approximately sixty million viewers watched when she was raised in October 1982, so far 179 complete human skeletons and one dog have been brought up, plus more than fifteen hundred items. Many objects of every day life have been rescued, gaming dice, shoes, combs, musical instruments and gold coin etc.

The Mary Rose is now on display at Portsmouth and is well worth a visit. **BP**

In August, we got our wish and held our first Pet Service.


Chairs and hay bales were set up under the trees in the Glebe and with offers of some more unusual animals to attend we eagerly awaited the arrival of the pets.






