

From the Rector...

I hope I am not too early in using the phrase 'Back to School'? I remember as a child the clothes shops and stationers hardly waited until the summer term had ended before they started plastering it across their premises and column inches.

The good working relationships the schools have with the churches is one of the many pleasures I enjoy in serving as a priest in the Blyth Valley. Generally we have governors on all our boards and Open the Book and individuals take Collective Worship and Assemblies and offer other input. Do pray for interest in our Team Vicar advert going national this week. They will hopefully join Holton Primary's board. We learn from the schools too. The education system like other public services nationalised from Christian institutions post-war is seen as a tax-burden rather than our collective responsibility. Nevertheless, the accountable wisdom apparent in its nurturing of our pupils and their families in the three 'R's, humanities and issues related to Personal, Social and Health and Education is exemplary. This was thrown into stark relief recently when I read a prayer that adults would teach children how to be decent people. I felt I had to turn the plea around as I'm afraid in many respects it is our youth that we might pray may teach us older folk instead.

Only the other day I heard a professional trainer state that we have to hear something seven times before it goes in. I suspect that is if there are no emotional or other actors to make the message stick. Part of the challenge is that we think we know what we know, we think we've good reason to know it and we think that others think the same. The other side of the coin is what others tell us and how they tell us and what they hide from us. Knowledge is power and Wisdom is the Lord's.

A key message of the Adam and Eve account in Genesis 1 is that the two things that make God God are the two trees. The deity's immortality – the tree of life, and their wisdom – the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. The irony is that the fall, or original sin, is not physical intimacy, but rather people getting on their high horse and assuming they are speaking for God's wisdom by saying that. You know what they say: pride comes before a fall. One of the fascinating features of well educated people is that they quite often will tell you that more they learn the more they realise they need

to learn. I would argue that that is especially the case for church and national leadership. God's ways are not our ways. If this piques your interest do look out for flyers coming through your doors promoting Back to Church Sunday and join us at your local church on Sunday the 21st of September. We certainly should be very careful, if not repentant, if we find we are doing anything destructive in God's name.

At the very least we need to understand how limited our capacity to grasp the world around us is. Our senses are limited. We can only process a number of still images a second which is why spoked wheels may appear to go backwards and it is possible to animate stick men in dog ears of exercise books. We can only see a limited part of the electromagnetic spectrum, and only hear a limited range of frequencies. Much of what we perceive as solid or linear in time and space, is not! If that is not limiting enough, we are unconscious for several hours a day as we sleep!

In scripture, the inability to recognise our human limitations and live within them giving worship to the one that has wisdom and eternal life, is called idolatry or blasphemy. Those that make dead-end images, offering dead-end policies, solutions, addictions, whose eyes do not see or mouths which don't speak will become like them. Those blind who lead the blind speaking untruths and falsehood will fall into the ditch together.

So let us give thanks to our teachers in class, on the football-field, the ballroom, the physio ward. Let us agree that they should be paid and resourced to be satisfied and fruitful in their calling. Then let us recognise also our need to be humble with ourselves, understanding our lack of comprehension and knowledge. May we choose to learn more about the things we pontificate on and assert. Who knows we may realise that, not only are there more valid answers to the question at hand, but that in fact there are more questions in the first place. Rather than claiming Godly knowledge, so killing our spirituality, let us instead approach the tree of life seeking the spirit of wisdom freely given in, and through, what God has done in Jesus by the Holy Spirit: as we pray, read, serve together.

Curate's Corner

It is said that when the Emperor of Rome demanded of St Lawrence that he give him all the treasures of the Church, St Lawrence gave all of the riches under his control to the sick, widowed, and poor. When the time came for him to present the riches of the Church of the Emperor, he instead presented all those who had received alms, stating that these people were the true treasures of the Church.

This story certainly makes a good point: that for all our historic buildings and ancient traditions, it is His people that God truly regards as treasure.

Nevertheless, we are privileged in this part of Suffolk to have in our Churches an extraordinary number of rare and unusual treasures. A short column like this does not provide space to mention a treasure from every one of our Churches, but to provide a few examples: the copy of Erasmus' Paraphrase of the Gospels kept in unusually fine condition at Chediston, the effigy preserved at Heveningham, the Wenhaston Doom, and the finely-decorated rood screen which invites us towards the chancel at Bramfield.

Such treasures certainly impose a level of responsibility on those who care for them: to preserve them for the next generation, to keep them secure, and to interpret them as best we can. Yet they also stand as a testimony to the sheer weight of history that infuses our churches. At our Baptism, each of us was grafted into the great family of the Church. That family has had moments of honour and deep holiness, as well as moments which leave us rather scratching our heads. Yet it is the family we have been grafted into, and there is no other like it. Treasures such as these are our family albums. They are tangible memories of the story of the Church thus far, and they remind us that it is now our turn to play our part in that story.

From the **Ringing Chamber**

The last month has been full of quarter peals for me. Three quarters of an hour is long enough for a piece of ringing to settle down, and ringers to familiarise themselves with the bells and the method being rung, without the physical tiredness that arises towards the end of a full three hour peal.

Some ringing friends, ringing under the banner "Friends of Derick Obergene" (I thought it must be an anagram but, apparently, it's just a silly made up name) were holding their annual quarter peal week in Suffolk, based at Darsham, and I had been invited to ring in what promised to be (and were) some excellent quarters. One of these was on home turf at Halesworth and the method was Penning's Bob Triples, not at all well-known and far more complicated than anything our local band would ever ring, but like all the others I was involved in, the ringing was tip top. It should have been: I found myself ringing next to the person who had rung the 21/2 ton tenor at Bristol in the winning team at this year's National 12bell contest. The gang also rang quarters at all the other ringable Blyth Valley towers, except Heveningham where the method proved just too tricky.

Back with the locals we rang a good quarter of Little Bob Major at Halesworth for our regular first Sunday slot, but as with most of these there were only three Blyth Valley residents ringing out of eight, which demonstrates why it is so difficult to get enough ringers on a Sunday morning when everyone else is at their own tower.



It will identify the gases produced by stomach cancer cells as an early sign of cancer. A hydrogel flavoured lollipop is being developed to diagnose mouth cancer using saliva rather than invasive biopsies. Work is being carried out on a urine test that amazingly could help doctors spot lung cancer at its very early stages. News from Pauline Milsted, BV Churches' Children, Family and Youth Worker

A Church where everyone belongs: It has filled by heart with joy in the last month to see St Mary's Church in Halesworth packed with all ages throughout the summer holiday. From hosting the community lunch to having a family picnic with 75 there! To popping in in the afternoon, and having youth hanging in youth space, a group of parents and tots in the children's corners, tourists wandering around with cameras and someone quietly praying or flower arranging. This is often what I see in an afternoon whilst working in the office, or the young and old that come in and cannot help but tinker on the piano. Or the Halesworth Swifts holding an event, or MENCAP rehearsing their play. To quote one of our youth space members, "They were really good!". They will be performing soon so keep your eyes peeled for the date.

It is a good reminder to me of our slogan, Community in Church, Church in Community. But also, that God's church is for everyone, dare I challenge us to think beyond our norms. It is not just a space for the white middle-classed got it all sorted people, traditionally we may have experienced in the Church. But a space for all where everyone can find a home, a community to belong, to be loved and to feel connected. After all Jesus didn't stand with the rich and those that had it sorted, he sat with the lepers, the Samaritans, the prostitutes, the broken, the hungry. I passionately feel that is what we are called to do, yes sometimes it brings a little mess. But here's the thing we live in a messy world we cannot be immune to that, but we are called in our actions to be Christlike. To me that means feeding the hungry, standing with the broken, opening the doors for all, gently mentoring the youth, being a listening ear or simply thinking what would Jesus do?

Just today I was chatting with some visitors who mentioned something as being disrespectful. And I gently challenged them and I challenge us, also to consider what lense we look through. Instead of seeing it as disrespectful or wrong, perhaps when engaging with our community that is coming in such as our youth, we can look a different way. Perhaps, instead, let's consider that we are learning to share the space, because it's all of ours. The visitors loved this learning to share a space for everyone and so do I! Sometimes we might get it wrong, but do you know what that's okay. We are learning to share a space together and that is exciting. Sometimes, we might have to get alongside our young and new growing family of Christ and learn together, teach and share.



Thorington Steps into the Wild: We kicked off the summer at St Peter's Church in Thorington stepping into the wild of the churchyard. We wandered around the churchyard finding a variety of wildflowers including, yarrow, creeping thistles, lords-and-ladies and germander speedwell. We did some hammer art (or Hapa Zome) printing the wildflowers onto a table cloth. We also went on a bug hunt and saw lots of incredible bugs from shield bugs, to ladybirds, a wood wasp, bees of different varieties, crickets and a grasshopper. Thorington is a beautiful sanctuary to wildlife and we were so lucky to see so much wildlife, whilst we played and explored. We even saw some butterflies and tried to identify them; this was much trickier as they tend to fly away! The children also enjoyed some lovely painting and crafts in the beauty of the churchyard.

Youth Space, Your Space: Youth Space has continued to grow and grow. Not only are we reaching anywhere between 24 and 30 each week, but we are seeing our youth change and grow and as a result what we offer. It is great to see the young'uns take more responsibility. The come in and prepare their own fruit now and salad. A couple of weeks ago they completely made the cous cous themselves for dinner. We are so grateful to receive a further nearly £1000 from Halesworth Town Council to invest in Youth Space, we will be using this money to continue to follow their interests such as buying more planters for outside of church, extending our pamper station, more resources for the shoe polishing station, and more instruments such as guitars. Just to name a few things the money is going on, we are truly thankful for the support we receive from the Town Council.

In September Revd Dominic Doble and Pauline (Children, Family and Youth Worker) will be starting a course on the 17th September 2025 called is Baptism for me and my child. 



Fluttering Butterflies at Chediston:



Halesworth Climate Energy Action

Weekend 26 - 28 September, 2025

What if we never had to worry about energy price rises again? What if Halesworth generated its own electricity, reducing energy costs for homes and businesses? What if all our homes were insulated so well that our energy costs were under £100 a year?

These are the questions behind a weekend of positive, practical workshops and discussion, on the last weekend in September. The event is organised by HASH (Halesworth Area Sustainability Hub) and is hosted by St Mary's Church, Halesworth.

Whether you are interested in taking steps to reduce bills, and use cleaner forms of energy as a family, a business or at community level, this is a chance to gather information and inspiration from experts and local people who have already begun doing just that.

Why not come along and learn more?

We will also be hearing a report from sustainable energy experts, Opergy, who have been commissioned to produce a base-line study of our town's current energy use and carbon footprint. From this baseline – where we are now – we will be developing a Net Zero Pathway to help Halesworth and area reach the sustainable energy targets adopted by the Town Council – where we want to get to.

Our partners, Blyth Valley Churches, are organising a linked week of activities with local schools to engage children with the practical energy solutions to big problems that affect their futures.

Friday evening 26 September - What if? when we'll be imagining our energy futures

Adrian Ramsay MP will talk about the political dimension.

Professor Peter Hobson will describe 'Energy Landscapes' and Climate Change: adapting to extreme weather events ecosystems and natural energy

John Collins will tell the remarkable story of Charsfield Community Energy

Saturday 27 September

Pathway to Net Zero: OPERGY will present their report commissioned by the Town Council on current energy usage; they will explain the baseline and potential way forward for residents, businesses, transport, and land use.

Then there will be a **chance to join workshops** on a list of topics including:

How I changed my house: Local residents will describe how they changed their homes with and without grants, to insulate and adapt. Challenge the Landlord: How as a tenant you can safely challenge your landlord; and how landlords can benefit from retrofitting, particularly in the light of proposed government strategy.

East Suffolk Energy Strategy: councillors will explain how this informs planning decisions.

Community Energy: John Taylor (Community Energy UK) and James Rolls (Diocesan Net

Zero Carbon Officer) and the Deben Climate Centre will share the joys of community energy ventures.

FSOM Lunchtime Recital Review

This month, the Friends of St Mary's were delighted to welcome Jill Crossland to their lunchtime recital series.

It has long been said that art is a mirror for the human soul, in which we each find aspects of ourselves reflected with a clarity that cannot be found in ordinary life. Amongst the artforms, music is yet more special because it cannot be packed into a box and shipped to a museum, but relies upon the insight of the musician to interpret the music for today and to perform it in a way that breathes new life into the text.

Jill took us on a journey through over one century of composers and musicians struggling to articulate aspects of the human experience. Through her interpretation of Scarlatti she transported us to the green vistas of the Iberian countryside. In her performance of Rameau's Les Sauvages she conveyed the spectacle of the French nobility looking on at the dances of a group of Native American visitors, their obvious martial prowess clearly leaving the onlookers both enchanted and faintly terrified. Jill's final piece - Schubert's Drei Klavierstücke (D.946) – was difficult to hear as anything other than an extended meditation on the nature of mortality. In Jill's interpretation, Schubert articulates moments of consolation, experiences which resonate within the soul, and finally an enduring note of melancholy. The Friends of St Mary's and all those who gathered to hear Jill's performance joined together to offer their warmest thanks to Jill, who's interpretative skill and technical artistry breathed life into the music.
