

From the Rector...

This month, the church moves into its second season of reflection and contemplation of the human condition. It is called Lent from the Old English word for spring, possibly related to the idea of lengthening days and extending or slowing notes in a musical movement marked Lento. Its liturgical colour is purple. Its purpose is to prepare for the feast of the resurrection, once one of two main celebrations of the mass during which God was encountered. Some people give things up for the forty days and forty nights and some people take things up. These are equal and opposite valid methods of that self-assessment, self-regulation and self-improvement that the notion that that encounter may inspire.

I don't usually focus on those tabloid expressions of sin, evil and wickedness as a rule. Indeed, I have been taken to task for it in the past. However, as the set readings of our lectionary tend to become more uncomfortable and accusatory in this season I can tend to move in that direction. This is perhaps, most obvious at our Traditional Communions when it is my practice to read the whole ten commandments, not the usual summary of the law - which is much more palatable.

Many of us don't need to be reminded of our regrets, our shortcomings, our bad thoughts and the vast sums that would have accrued in our swear-boxes if we had kept them. It usually doesn't help! However, sometimes, having a diagnosis; having a word for it; can open the door to a conversation, a confession, a cure. Another, problem with words like sin, wickedness and evil is that they are very finger-pointy. They can be much easier to apply to others than ourselves. We may even feel exonerated, and quite good about ourselves as we are able to point out just how bad that other lot are. This too, is not helpful.

The stories of the disciples throughout Jesus's ministry provide an exemplary lesson. Across the years they misunderstand, are impetuous and jealous. As the final hours roll in things do not get better. 'I'll not deny you!' declares the denier. 'Ask him who is the betrayer?' His

best friend is urged. All this during his celebration of the Passover: the holiest Jewish feast celebrating emancipation from oppression. The east window at St Mary's, Halesworth not only has bread and wine on the European-ised table, but the thirty pieces of silver too!

It should not, therefore, be too much of a surprise to discover some of the evils of our day may be found to occur in our denomination, in our town and villages.

I might include on my list such things as: Domestic abuse, racism, modern day slavery, antagonism towards LGBTQ+ people, child abuse, radicalisation, county lines, exclusion of people with disabilities. (Do call 999 if you are at immediate risk of harm or a crime is being committed.)

One of the things training in all of these areas calls us to be is self-aware and observant. Another thing we are trained to do is to tell someone. Once you do disclose, the structures that are in place to help you or another victim are set in train: safely, securely and discretely.

I (Dominic) am the Safeguarding Lead in our parishes. My number is 07743 554955. Pauline Milsted is the deputy. We work with Annie in the office to continually improve our Joint Council Policy on how we train, monitor, record to make our parishes the sanctuaries we want them to be for all at risk and all victims who we live amongst and who share our buildings and events.

As we look back at the last supper in the last days of Christ before his death, we are reminded that we should reflect on our own shortcomings and challenges. Not only these but also those of the church of which we are a part as well, with all humility and indignation. Let us pray to the wounded life-giver, to be resurrected, that the saints and sinners that make up our denomination and our communities may all share the hope of freedom and justice for which he died and for which we commit to strive.


So let's continue praying for each other, for our visible unity and that all of us, as part of the Body of Christ, may shine with His light. And let's celebrate these truths!

The next Taize Service will be on Sunday 16th March at St Peter's Church, Holton. Workshops 4pm, Service 6pm.



My Role as a Children, Family and Youth Worker

As February is my fifth official month of working as the Blyth Valley Churches Children, Family and Youth Worker, I thought it was good timing to reflect on my evolving role.

I regularly still get the question of what is your role what is it that you do for the Blyth Valley Churches and also why do we need a Children, Family and Youth Worker?

As I am sat here completing my 'homework' for the connect course (that will help me to become a licensed children and family worker), I am reading the report 'We are Family'. This report looks at the ever-evolving and developing role of family ministry across denominations in the UK. One of the things the research highlights, which I love is that there are two strands to family ministry; these are:

"Ministry (concerned with matters related to faith and spirituality: prayer, worship, knowledge and understanding of Christian life and practice as well evangelistic activities) and support activities and programmes designed to offer support (practical, emotional, mental, generally related to wellbeing)." (Gail Adcock et al, 2014, p.9).

I feel these words say what we are aiming for and trying to achieve in a much more succinct and elegant way then I can. We are supporting the developing place for children, family and youth within our church through meeting their spiritual, emotional, mental, practical and well-being needs. No small feet — and as we continue to engage with our community, I am sure the journey will be windy; but also take us in many unforeseen directions. Practically at the moment this

includes, one of events such as the RSPB Great Big Churchyard Birdwatch at Holton, family picnics, toy exchanges, continuous groups such as Church Mice Tots, setting up a youth space in St Mary's Church in Halesworth and working with other groups, Starting Rite course for babies and parents to explore the spiritual faith, Eco Warriors at Holton, Halesworth and soon Bramfield with local schools and nurseries, praise parties, breakfast church or the Great Communion Adventure. This isn't an endless list, or even a permanent list, it's growing as our ministry grows and is exciting and interesting.

As we work with families, we need to remember that the 'nuclear' or 'traditional' family of two parents and two children isn't the societal norm any more. We need to challenge our thoughts and ideas, as we work with different families, we may encounter and recognise that God's love and grace is for everyone. And finally, why do we need a Children, Family and Youth Worker, because Jesus came to this world for everyone! That includes the young children, the babes in arms, the awkward youth, the lone parent, the grandparents caring for their grandchildren. We want our churches to be for everyone, to have provision and a welcoming environment for all why make walk through the door. That is why I have been chosen and put here! So that we can put in place facilities, resources that are welcoming, that we can find ways of open our doors to all and that we can make ways to make worship, the bible, and Sundays fully inclusive for the whole family. Whoever you are!

How can you support me?

Prayer is powerful and important, so pray for me, pray for wisdom in what activities to pursue, what things to prioritise, guidance, patience and energy! Pray for the activities, the regular groups, the one off events. If you have time, get involved, come to our monthly prayer group, or see how you can get involved in helping physically. Perhaps you can volunteer at tots once a month, or do the teas and coffees at a family picnic, there are so many ways you can be involved. Or even just smile at me when I am doing a service and feeling a little nervous at the front!

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
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Our Need for Hope in Lent 2025



From the Ringing Chamber





We are very blessed to live amongst such talented, caring and creative people.

There is not one of our Parochial Church Councils (PCC) who would turn away an offer of a new councillor.



Our tasks are:

- co-operating with the incumbent in promoting the use (mission) of the church.*
- looking after the financial affairs of the church including fundraising.
- maintaining the church building and its contents.

Each council has three main officers:

Churchwardens who look after the events and maintenance programme of the church.

Treasurers who keep accounts and an eye on budgets supporting fundraising.

Secretaries do the paperwork for the four or so meetings a year, the key one being the APCM, and support programme planning.

Each parish is an independent charity. Members are voluntary trustees who can sometimes feel inadequate and sometimes inexperienced. You do not need to be religious, though believing in the worth of the building and what it stands for in the broadest of terms does help!

We offer Diocesan and local training and have WhatsApp groups running for day to day support, and have monthly or quarterly informal get-togethers depending on the role. A number of our PCCs are either entirely new or their members are now fulfilling the officer roles for the first time.

WILD CHURCH BLYFORD

It was cold and wet at the end of January, but wintry weather did not stop Frank Allen and his team from carrying out much needed tree surgery in Blyford churchyard. The trees had not been cut in more than a decade, and their size was causing problems.

On the south side of the church, the shadow cast by trees, hugely overgrown with ivy, was worsening the damp in the church because the walls never fully dried out, even in the summer.

Many graves were overwhelmed by low hanging branches and it is now possible to see one of the most exceptional graves in the churchyard, on the righthand side, near the gate. This is the grave of Samuel Croft, who died at the age of 21 in 1849; his headstone shows in fine detail a team of two draught horses, a ploughman and his plough.

Elsewhere in the churchyard, Frank and his team pruned overgrown trees and removed many loads of ivy and dead wood.

The cedar was collapsing under the weight of dead branches and now looks

magnificent (see photo below). Frank and his team did a great job, and we strongly recommend a visit to the churchyard to see their work.



We are grateful to Blyford Estate for granting Frank and his crew access to the rear of the churchyard, across estate land. Many thanks also to Rodney Camp who keeps the churchyard neat and tidy by mowing the grass and the paths.

Blyford churchyard is beautiful and peaceful, but at the moment there is nowhere to sit to enjoy it! We are currently seeking grants and donations to install two benches made by a local craftsman. If you can help with this fundraising effort, please get in touch.




Bishop Martin with his wife, son and daughter, following his farewell service

Dani is the fifth member of the family to carry on the tradition of running the ferry. A ferry was first mentioned in 1236 and it would appear that some sort of method was used to cross the river from then on. We all think of the ferry as one rowing boat, but were surprised to hear of the differing sizes over the years. Steam driven, hand-cranked, chain-driven, pontoon ferries large enough to take carts, horses, cars and even, on one occasion rumour has it, a small elephant. The ferry over the years has transported the Scottish herring girls, soldiers in both wars, some who refused to pay and even the postman from one river bank to the other to deliver the mail. Every ferryman (or woman) has their own dog, which has always proved popular with customers. Now there are now 12 members of staff, all rowers have to have a boat master's licence and adhere to strict rules and regulations. Three young women are trained and help in holiday times. The ferry runs from April to Christmas and has been mentioned on several television programmes, including *Countryfile*. Their customers range from young to old and have included many famous people. They also now provide an hour long trip up the river, which is also very popular. **BP**

Eco Warriors at St Peter's Church in Holton

Holton churchyard was buzzing with the sound of children and the birds singing their hearts out. We were joined by Nursery and Reception from St Peter's School on February 4th and 6th. This is supporting the children learning about nature and also helping St Peter's Church achieve their Eco Church Award. This month was all about birds as a follow-on from the RSPB Great Big Churchyard Birdwatch and the birds we have already identified and seen.

The children enjoyed making their own bird feeders, in case the birds were hungry this winter. We had a little bird hideout tent, with a range of bird books and binoculars. Reception children did a fantastic pictogram of all of the lovely birds that they saw and applied some fantastic mathematical skills comparing amounts and how many. For example, the bird we saw the most was the Robin. We also enjoyed looking and finding facts out about the birds in a book, for example, a distinctive difference between a Turtle Dove and Collared Dove is that they have a black ring around their neck.

What is 'The Coat of Hopes'? When is it coming to Suffolk?

The Coat of Hopes is a patchwork coat on an ongoing walking pilgrimage through the UK, hoping to focus people's minds on the climate and ecological emergency.

The coat was created in 2021, to be carried from the south coast of England to Glasgow for the COP26 climate conference. It has been made by and worn and walked by many hundreds of people on a journey on foot of around 1500 miles so far.


All who encounter it are invited to wear it and (whilst the coat song is sung) take a moment to be conscious of themselves at this time, standing in connection with all those who have made or worn the coat before them and with the life and land it has witnessed on its way.

When the coat went through Derbyshire last year this is what appeared on the BBC News website: Margaret Roberts took part when the walk went through Derbyshire last year and also joined the first journey three years ago. She said "I really love the coat. When you put it on you feel its weight and the weight of the responsibility that you're carrying.

"Each of the patches represents somebody's hopes and dreams and thoughts and love for the place they come from, and their concern about what will happen in our future climate catastrophe."

Barbara Cunningham, who also walked with the coat in Derbyshire said: "When I heard that the coat was coming I thought this would be a way of talking to people and engaging people's interest in a new and different way.

We've read about the coat - to be with it and wear it is really exciting. There is something empowering about it."





The coat will be in Norwich from February 28th - March 22nd, from March 23rd-26th will be going to Lowestoft, then on April starts its journey to Ipswich, calling at Wrentham on April 7th and Halesworth on April 8th. The full itinerary is on the coat of hopes website.






